Inductees



EUGENE BRISCOE

(Class of '24)

Participated in varsity track and field for 4 years. Was one of the organizers of the Bryson Club, now the oldest of the campus organizations at TCU. Member of the Lettermen Association since 1937. Charter member of the Century Club. Served as director on Board of Alumni Association. In 1972, received the Valuable Alumnus Award.

L. D. MEYER

(Class of '37)

Lettered in football in 1934-35-36, baseball in 1935-36-37 and basketball in 1935-36. Leading pass receiver in 1935. Scored all 16 points for TCU in its first Cotton Bowl Game (16-6 victory over Marquette). Named to all-time Cotton Bowl team.



CY LELAND

(Class of '30)

Star halfback on 1929 Southwest Conference Championship team. Southwest Conference player-of-the-year in 1929. Billed nationally in 1929 as the "fastest man in football". Holds TCU record for longest run from scrimmage (82 yards). Possibly TCU's greatest track star. Tied world record of 9.4 in Kansas Relays in 1930. Member of Drake Relays Hall of Fame.



MASON MAYNE

(Class of '38)

Outstanding guard in 1935, 1936 and 1937. Captain of 1937 team. Named Horned Frogs Most Valuable Player as guard in 1937. Was captain of college all star team that defeated the Washington Redskins 14-0 in the Dallas Southwest All-Star Game in 1938 in Dallas.



DICK O'NEAL

(Class of '57)

Earned 3 varsity letters in basketball and 2 in baseball. All-American in basketball in 1955. All-SWC selection in 1955-56-57. Top career scorer for TCU — 1,723 points in 1954-55-56-57. Holds several other school records, including most points scored in single season and most free throws made.
