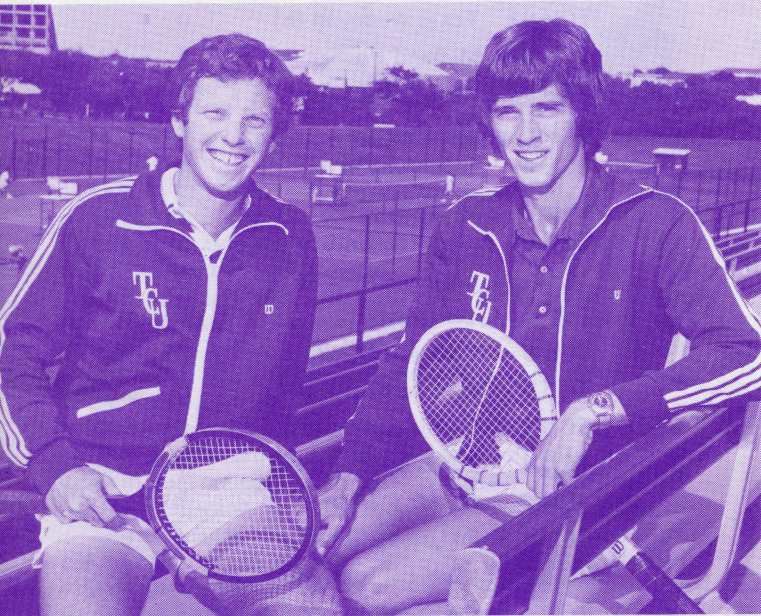

**COACH BERNARD "TUT" BARTZEN**

One of the most well-known and respected men in the world of tennis, Bernard "Tut" Bartzten is going into his fourth year as head coach for the Texas Christian University Horned Frogs.

The first full-time net coach in the school's history, Bartzten came to TCU after serving as tennis director and club pro at Colonial Country Club for 12 years. Prior to that, he was director of tennis for Wilson Sporting Goods in the Southwest.

Bartzten played collegiately at William and Mary where he was undefeated in 50 singles matches during his four years in dual college meets. He was captain of the team his last two years and twice led the Indians to NCAA titles.

In 1953, he broke into the Top Ten of the nation's singles players and remained there nine straight years until turning pro. During that time he played tours all over the world and defeated such leading players as Rafael Osuna, Tony Trabert, Roy Emerson, Charles Pasarell and Rod Laver.

In 1961, Bartzten won the men's National Clay Court title for the fourth time, a feat equalled only by Bill Tilden and Frank Parker. He represented the U.S. in 15 Davis Cup matches, never losing. In 1959, he was assistant playing captain of the United States Davis Cup team and in 1960 was non-playing captain.

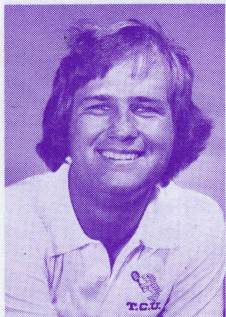
He was recipient of the 1959 Johnston Award given annually at the National Championships for sportsmanship and greatest contribution to tennis development.

He currently serves on the U.S. Davis Cup committee.

For the past 18 years he has hosted a summer tennis camp. It is held at TCU's new million dollar Mary Potishman Lard Tennis Center.

A native of San Angelo in West Texas, Bartzten and wife Sara have four children, all of whom (naturally) are avid tennis players. Son Tut Jr. is a sophomore on the TCU team and helped win the Southwest Conference doubles championship in 1976. The other Bartzten children are Angela, a high school senior who advanced to the state meet last year; Fred 16 and Tommy 11.

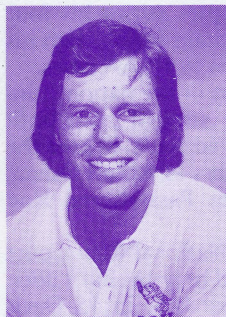




**JIMBO ALLIN, Jr-21**

Fort Worth, Texas

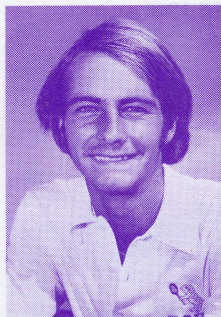
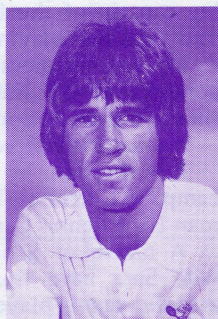

Fort Worth, Texas

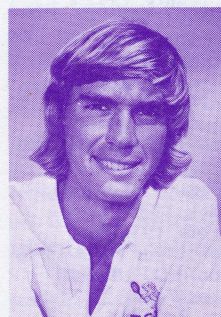
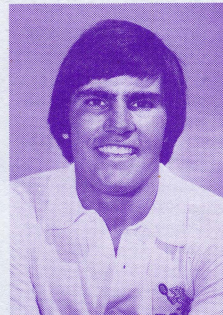

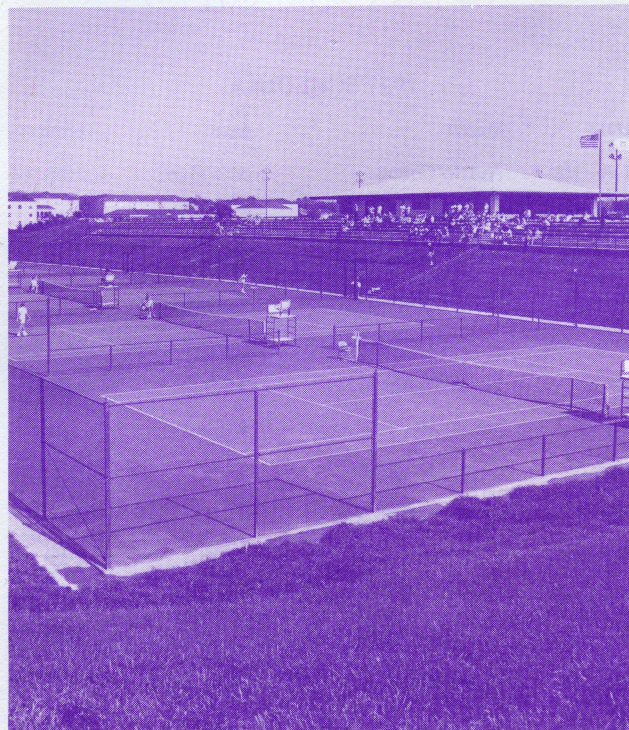

### MARY POTISHMAN LARD TENNIS CENTER

A gift to Texas Christian University, the Mary Potishman Lard Tennis Center was dedicated last spring. It is designed, built and operated to provide the public of Fort Worth, including TCU students, with excellent facilities for the lifetime sport of tennis.

The first phase of the project includes 22 courts — 16 full-size championship courts individually enclosed and six TCU varsity courts and stadium — and a pro shop which serves as the control, management and viewing center for the entire complex. Eight additional courts can be added in the second phase.

The courts are built for medium ball bounce through tough, acrylic finishes. Sloping of the courts and perimeter drainage troughs provide for water control, court washing and improved maintenance. The court construction system — concrete reinforced by pre-stressed steel cables — is such that as cracks develop they will be pulled tightly closed by the "live" slabs. This relatively new system provides for superb play on even surfaces that do not deteriorate over the years.

Lights provide for non-glare night play through 1000-watt high pressure sodium lamps, each providing 150,000 lumens of light at the lowest energy consumption. Light poles are placed for best lighting and to preserve an open feeling to the entire area; lamps are aimed away from existing homes.

In all ways, the Mary Potishman Lard Tennis Center is intended to be the very latest and most complete facility of its kind in the world.
