

COACH BERNARD "TUT" BARTZEN

One of the most well-known and respected men in the world of tennis, Bernard "Tut" Bartzen is going into his fourth year as head coach for the Texas Christian University Horned Frogs.

The first full-time net coach in the school's history, Bartzen came to TCU after serving as tennis director and club pro at Colonial Country Club for 12 years. Prior to that, he was director of tennis for Wilson Sporting Goods in the Southwest.

Bartzen played collegiately at William and Mary where he was undefeated in 50 singles matches during his four years in dual college meets. He was captain of the team his last two years and twice led the Indians to NCAA titles.

In 1953, he broke into the Top Ten of the nation's singles players and remained there nine straight years until turning pro. During that time he played tours all over the world and defeated such leading players as Rafael Osuna, Tony Trabert, Roy Emerson, Charles Pasarell and Rod Laver.

In 1961, Bartzen won the men's National Clay Court title for the fourth time, a feat equalled only by Bill Tilden and Frank Parker. He represented the U.S. in 15 Davis Cup matches, never losing. In 1959, he was assistant playing captain of the United States Davis Cup team and in 1960 was non-playing captain.

He was recipient of the 1959 Johnston Award given annually at the National Championships for sportsmanship and greatest contribution to tennis development.

He currently serves on the U.S. Davis Cup committee.

For the past 18 years he has hosted a summer tennis camp. It is held at TCU's new million dollar Mary Potishman Lard Tennis Center.

A native of San Angelo in West Texas, Bartzen and wife Sara have four children, all of whom (naturally) are avid tennis players. Son Tut Jr. is a sophomore on the TCU team and helped win the Southwest Conference doubles championship in 1976. The other Bartzen children are Angela, a high school senior who advanced to the state meet last year; Fred 16 and Tommy 11.



JIMBO ALLIN, Jr-21 Tucson, Arizona

Had 9-3 singles record last year despite being limited due to back injury . . . has beaten Pem Guerry, Dan Hirst, Keigm Lanham . . . played in Europe during summer . . . reached semis in Birmingham, England, and finals of consolation bracket in National British Under 21 singles . . . also reached finals of doubles in championship division of National British . . . came to TCU after being ranked #4 in Southwest.




Son of TCU tennis coach ... teamed with Randy Crawford to win Southwest Conference doubles in 1976, the first SWC net title in school's history ... had 17-10 singles record ... ranked #15 in U.S. last year in Juniors ... member of Texas Junior Davis Cup team ... has logged wins over Tom Courson, Brian Sakey, Lyndell Pickett, Joe Edles. Dean White, Charles Emily, Chris Delaney, Paul Avis . . . teamed with Crawford to defeat UCLA's Austin-Nichols in 1976 NCAAs . . . that duo also finished 3rd in the Westwood Collegiate Invitational this fall ... played Southern Circuit during the summer . . . defeated Larry Gottfried in straight sets in Tulsa Invitational.





TOM BUERGER, Jr-1L Winnetka, Illinois

Had 1-0 singles mark last year after having earned letter during '75 season... regarded as one of outstanding leaders on team... played several practice and non-conference matches as #8 man on squad... tabbed as one of hardest workers on team... posted perfect 3-0 ledger in doubles action last year.



Fort Worth, Texas Has been Horned Frogs #1 player past two seasons...son of Fort Worth tennis pro and former TCU coach Ken Crawford . . . teamed with Tut Bartzen Ir. to win Southwest Conference doubles in 1976 for first SWC net title in school's history . . . had 20-6 singles record ... has wins over Tom Courson, Jim Timmons, Dave Benson, Joe Edles, Steve Wedderburn, Gary Albertine, Todd Reed, Avery Rush, Buddy Bowman, Brice Alexander, Charles Emily, Mark Vines, Dwight Edwards . . . he and Bartzen have teamed for victories over Bohrnstedt-Hufford, Keller-Nunez, Walker Valenticic, Emily-Silberman, Sakey-Grisak, Bowles-Loeb ... they also defeated UCLA's Austin-Nichols in NCAAs.



DAVID KELLY, Jr-21 Fort Worth, Texas

Has played from #2 to #5 since freshman year ... reached the division #5 finals of the Southwest Conference in singles last year ... recorded 17-7 singles mark and was 12-10 in doubles ... played summer satellite circuit ... recorded wins during last year over David McKenzie, Israel Castillo, Steve Hall, Bob Kleinecke, Mark Gonzalez, Rick Northern, Blake Allen, Brian Crozier, Colon Nunez, Russ Rummery, Chris Mullen, Graham Whaling ... was schoolboy teammate of current TCU teammate K.C. Miller and they advanced to regionals in doubles play.



Was 1976 state high school champion for Abilene Cooper where recorded 61 consecutive singles victories... made it to state schoolboy tournament all three years...state 18-and-under champion...nationally ranked in doubles with Jai DiLouie...also ranked nationally in singles...finished 3rd in singles in Westwood Collegiate Invitational this fall...has recorded top wins over Kevin Curren, Tom Courson, Kim Kettleson, David Bryant, Jon Mozola, Steve Johnson, Todd Reed, Jay Goss, Dennis McKuen, Derek Edmunds, Randall Clark...won Tri-State in Amarillo, Abilene Easter Men's and Halloween.



K.C. MILLER, Jr-1L Fort Worth, Texas

Has played #5 through #7 at various times during collegiate career...was 1-0 in singles action last year after having lettered in '75...was also 1-0 in lone doubles action, teaming with Jimbo Allin...was standout schoolboy netter where teamed with David Kelly (current TCU teammate) to reach finals of regionals...taught tennis and worked on game this past summer.



TOM MOTT, Soph-1L Holden, Mass.

Played #3 most of last season, compiling 19-7 singles ledger...made it to finals of Southwest Conference singles action in #3 competition...top victories include ones over Gonzalo Nunez, Mark Hurd, Scott Turpin, Tom Grisak, Paul Trautman, Mark Vines, Jeff Gibson, Allen Chandronait, Tony Giammalva... during summer competition recorded win over Hans Gildemeister and reached third round of National 21-and-under Championships...was 1974 Connecticut state champion.



MARY POTISHMAN LARD TENNIS CENTER

A gift to Texas Christian University, the Mary Potishman Lard Tennis Center was dedicated last spring. It is designed, built and operated to provide the public of Fort Worth, including TCU students, with excellent facilities for the lifetime sport of tennis.

The first phase of the project includes 22 courts – 16 full-size championship courts individually enclosed and six TCU varsity courts and stadium – and a pro shop which serves as the control, management and viewing center for the entire complex. Eight additional courts can be added in the second phase.

The courts are built for medium ball bounce through tough, acrylic finishes. Sloping of the courts and perimeter drainage troughs provide for water control, court washing and improved maintenance. The court construction system — concrete reinforced by pre-stressed steel cables — is such that as cracks develop they will be pulled tightly closed by the "live" slabs. This relatively new system provides for superb play on even surfaces that do not deteriorate over the years.

Lights provide for non-glare night play through 1000-watt high pressure sodium lamps, each providing 150,000 lumens of light at the lowest energy consumption. Light poles are placed for best lighting and to preserve an open feeling to the entire area; lamps are aimed away from existing homes.

In all ways, the Mary Potishman Lard Tennis Center is intended to be the very latest and most complete facility of its kind in the world.
