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ADD-RAN SOCIETY OPEN SESSION

A Splendid Programme Shows Merit
of Members.

The thirty-seventh annual open session of the Add-Ran Literary Society took place in the auditorium of the university on Monday evening at 8 o'clock. The programme withal was an excellent one, bestowing much credit upon the participants and showed a marked increase of interest and efficiency in society work.

The numbers were of different variety and so arranged that the diversion kept the audience enjoyably entertained throughout the evening.

Mr. Ben C. Moulden made the first appearance and in a few well chosen words, stating a few facts concerning the society, welcomed the audience and expressed his thanks for the good attendance.

Mr. Robert G. Williams delivered the oration of the evening. He treated his subject, "Alfred the Great," in a worthy manner, it being strong and well written. His delivery was forceful and clear, holding the profound attention of the audience.

Miss Hannaford's paper, "English as She is Spoke," was greatly enjoyed. She dealt with her subject in a unique and pleasing manner, showing literary ability in her composition.

Miss Lillian Green delighted the audience with her reading "Sombre," which she interpreted realistically and with a charming grace. She has always enjoyed a fine reputation as a reader, but last night's performance gained new laurels for her. She answered to a hearty encore, giving a short humorous selection.

Mr. Gordon B. Hall read a paper in eulogy of Texas' most famous son, James S. Hogg. As this great man has an abiding place in the hearts of all his countrymen, the paper was enjoyed, coming so soon after his untimely demise.

Mr. Howell G. Knight read the journal of the evening, entitled "A Day's Record." Mr. Knight made several huge hits at the famous people in the university and launched out some hard knocks which necessarily had to be enjoyed by his hearers. The journal left a decided impression upon a good many students which will linger about them for several days to come. The musical part of the program,

interspersed throughout the entertainment, was of unusual interest. The piano duet, Liszt's chromatic Galop was bright and attractive and introduced new performers to the appreciative audience. Miss Morgan's voice showed much improvement under Miss Ward's excellent instruction and gave genuine pleasure to her many friends, who have heard her with enjoyment before. Both her selection and that of Miss Holloway tested both musical and technical abilities and they both reflected credit upon themselves and their society.

The two quartets gave a pleasant variety to the program and were heartily enjoyed.

Stang's Lyrische Fantaisie was masterfully played in the violin quartet by Misses Perkins, Andrews, Miller and Clark. It showed a great strength in Prof. Dyksterhusi's department. The quartet of male singers in the "Good-night" selection was an enjoyable feature, as the Add-Ran Lit. is the first society to introduce a number of this kind.

Altogether, the Add-Ran Society is to be congratulated upon having so much literary and musical talent and its ability to render one of the best open sessions ever given in Texas Christian University.

T. S. O. A. CONTEST.

Vance, Baylor, First—Dallas, T. C. U.
Second.

For the twelfth time orators from the colleges and universities comprising the Texas State Oratorical Association met, this time at Southwestern University in Georgetown and contested for the honor of representing Texas at the Interstate contest. At no other previous contest has there been such keen rivalry, college spirit and such representative orators as there were at Georgetown.

The main feature of the meeting was the oratorical contest held Friday evening. The large chapel was completely full of enthusiastic students and alumni and for nearly an hour before the contest began the rosters of the rival schools kept things busy. The representative of Baylor was the first speaker and Mr. Dallas was second on the program, followed in order by Austin, S. W. U., Trinity and Fort Worth. The orators all showed careful preparation and splendid delivery but only a few of them held the undivided attention of the vast audience as did Mr. Dallas. Throughout Mr. Dallas' speaking it was almost perfectly quiet and he could be heard distinctly in every part of the large hall and when he had finished he was greeted with general applause. To say that T. C. U. delegation was proud of their representative is putting it somewhat indifferently. The victory was lost by a point, or it should be said that it was won by a point, and although victory would have been better, yet we are proud that T. C. U. receives the compliments of the state and that Mr. Dallas outranked five colleges. T. C. U. was outranked herself. No T. C. U. orator has ever done so well as did Mr. Dallas.

Mr. Vance, of Baylor, in his oration, "South America, Our Commercial Necessity, Obligation and Opportunity," was the winner of the first honors. He made a powerful impression upon the great audience, but was outranked by Dallas on delivery, however this loss was amply made up on manuscript grade. We congratulate Mr. Vance and Baylor upon the deserved victory and now pledge to assist the T. S. O. A. winner in the coming Interstate Contest.

On Thursday evening the annual T. S. O. A. banquet was held at the Girl's Annex of Southwestern. After the reception the banquet hall was opened and for four hours the fifty-four guests feasted on the delicious menu and the wit and wisdom of the toasters. The annual T. S. O. A. contest will be held next year at Baylor and with such a crowd of roters as we have here to yell for the T. C. U. orator we should have first place.

Let us begin now. Increase the already enthusiastic oratorical spirit in T. C. U. and as a fitting climax claim first honors in '07.

Mr. Vance will compete in the interstate contest which will be held sometime in August at Nashville, Tennessee. Mr. Dallas will be his alternate.

BAYLOR GOES DOWN AGAIN.

In Exciting Game—Won in the Ninth Inning.

What looked like victory for the green and gold for a long time yesterday afternoon was finally changed to a defeat in the ninth by the T. C. U. Varsity. The third game of the season with Baylor was played on Carroll Athletic Field yesterday before a small but intensely enthusiastic crowd, ending in the score of 8 to 5.

Such rooting and enthusiasm as was prevalent at this game has never been witnessed on any previous game this season. The fact that Baylor kept in the lead all of the time until the ninth, caused a revival of spirit in the Baylor ranks and their cheering was loud and long. The T. C. U. crowd never gave up the fight, not ceasing its enthusiastic yells despite darkening looks of a defeat. Especially should the young ladies be praised for their plucky valor in not allowing their spirit to abate even a minute

during the contest. With such support who could not play ball?

The game started off with the aspect of a close match and as it progressed Baylor took the lead and with one exception retained it until the last round. Cole for Baylor pitched an excellent game and deserves praise for his work. He is one of the best college pitchers in the state and with good support could make a fine record. His support yesterday was decidedly the best ever given a twirler by the team this season. Procter who did five innings of the slab work was difficult for the Baylorites to hit but he was sadly wild, giving a large number of free trips to the initial sack. He had good speed and a variety of curves but his control forced him to retire from the box. The support given him by the team was not as good as he deserved. Burnett went in the rubber in the sixth and held the opponents down doing his usual excellent work. The fact that he had pitched the game the day before did not seem to hinder him in the least as he had perfect control of his powerful wing. His support was fast and sure, every man being in the game all the time.

In the first inning T. C. U. starts with two singles and a walk, by Bush, Moulden and Kinnard, but with two outs Procter fouls to Punchard and the side is retired without a run. In the next Carnes on a walk, Shirley's sacrifice and a stolen base gets third but dies there after two strike-outs.

In the fifth round T. C. U. lands on Cole for four hits and tallies three scores. Burnett is up first and gets a pretty double, Gallaher beats one out and steals second; Bush is out on first but Burnett scores. Moulden singles, scoring Gallaher, then steals and comes in on Kinnard's single.

The next few innings pass without any headway for T. C. U. But in the ninth five runs are piled up on three hits and several errors. Burnett walks and Clark gets first on Cole's error, both men stealing on pass ball and score on Gallaher's single over first. Gallaher steals second and scores on Moulden's single, who after stealing

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Varsity Takes Second Game From Baylor.

One-sided and Uninteresting—Score Ends 13 to 2.

The second game of the season with Baylor, was an easy walk-over for Varsity ending in the one-sided score of 13 to 2. The game, full of errors on Baylor's side, together with poor pitching by Buster, was a sick one. Buster was hit at will and scores were piled up sky-high on singles, doubles, three-baggers and many costly errors. Burnett did his work at an easy gait and did it splendidly. His support was of the usual good order, only two errors being made behind him. The two runs were netted on one of these errors or the fame would have been a shut-out but the team-work as a whole was superb.

Baylor gets to second in the first and dies there. In the third Womble gets to first on an error and it looked like Wilkinson's fly was going to score him but Procter made a long pretty stab at it and swallowed it up. Procter makes another fine catch in the seventh.

In the fourth two scores are made for Baylor. Wylie on a double and Byrd on a single get on base and score on Gallaher's wild throw in home. After this Baylor does not see second and only rarely gets to first. T. C. U. takes two scores in the second. Carnes after two outs walks and steals two bases, Shirley walks and with Carnes comes in on Burnett's three-bagger over center.

In the fifth when the clouds clear away five more men have passed across the plate. Bush takes a single and Moulden gets first on center's error. With two men gone Procter singles and scores Bush, then steals second. Carnes singles, scores Moulden, and after Procter scores on Shirley's fielder's choice, scores on Burnett's single.

Shirley makes the fifth run on Clark's single. The fire-works continue in the next when Bush leads off again with a single and Kinnard follows on second's error. Procter forces Bush out at third. Carnes gets in a good pinch hit and scores Procter and on a throw to second to catch Carnes,

Kinnard scores and on a throw to catch Kinnard in home, Carnes takes third. Shirley walks and steals second. Burnett takes a single, scoring Carnes and Shirley, and then scores, after advancing to second on Clark's single. Clark goes to second and scores on Gallaher's ball and Womble's error. The balloon comes down for a time. No more runs are made after this trip.

Another double-play is pulled off in the third after Wilkinson gets first on wild throw. Buster hits out to Bush who scoops it up and shoots it to Shirley, who in turn speedily throws to Clark forcing Wilkinson out on second.

In the fifth T. C. U. thought they saw their Waterloo when Baylor took the lead again by adding three more scores. Wilkinson again lucky, walks and Buster gets hit by ball, Wylie sacrifices followed by Byrd who takes an easy trip to first. Newton lines out to Bush who in an attempt to put in home throws wild and Wilkinson and Buster score. Punchard up next gets free passage. A fly to Carnes lets Byrd get in the third score of the innig.

In the eighth one more run appeared to put a cinch on the game. Cole beats a slow one out but Womble forces him out at second. Wilkinson picks out a nice out and gets it lost in the bleachers over center field for a good three-bagger, scoring Womble but is out on sliding off third. This ends the game for Baylor.

VARSITY SHUTS OUT TRINITY.

The Game One-sided—Ends 12-0.

The Trinity university baseball team accompanied by a large delegation of supporters came down on a special train Saturday and crossed bats with T. C. U.'s team. The game was distressingly one-sided ending in Varsity's pile-up of twelve runs to Trinity's goose-egg.

The interest manifest in the game so far as rivalry is concerned never abated during the contest; the interest in the playing however was only at its height when Trinity on two occasions attempted to score.

Varsity had a swell suit of batting clothes on and went after Templeton in hitting fashion, which resulted in his retirement in the fifth. Fancher, his successor, fared but little better. Burnett, T. C. U.'s slab artist, despite his wildness, held the Trinitonians down. He was not compelled to pitch exceptionally good ball and took his ease in the box. A bad finger caused him to give several bases on balls but when he got caught in a hole, he tightened up on his opponents and marched out with deliberate ease. His

support was excellent, not an error being counted against T. C. U. The team's work was always fast and snappy. Every man on Varsity deserves especial praise for the victory for every one put out good work.

Gallaher has a three-bagger to his credit and Procter secured a pretty double. Carnes showed up well against old comrades—red-socks. Moulden was ever behind the bat and caught an unusually good game. Shirley, Bush, Clark and Kinnard in the infield worked like one man, supporting each other and covering all the ground without a fumble.

One of the features of the game was the pretty run of McCulloch, of Trinity, after a long fly in the left garden. Orr got a pretty line-drive for a single.

T. C. U. crossed the plate twice in the first. Gallaher lands out a three-bagger and with Bush, who is hit by pitched ball, scores on Moulden's single.

The score is made four points better in the second by both hits and errors. Procter singles, Carnes gets free passage and both score on Clark's single and a dumb play.

Not until the fifth did another T. C. U. man circle, when Bush on a single and sacrifice by Moulden goes around on Procter's double. Then Carnes singles and brings in Procter.

In the sixth innig, Clark singles and advances to third on an error and free passage scoring on Moulden's work. Gallaher scores after a walk and stolen bases. Carnes' single scores Bush and Moulden, making four more for T. C. U.

Two more in the eighth end the score-getting. Fancher weakens and lets Moulden and Kinnard walk, who after a double steal and Procter's single cross the plate.

Trinity is almost regularly retired in quick order. In the second a single and two free transportations allowed Trinity to take third but no glimpse of home was permitted. Several men were caught attempting a steal to second or sleeping off second but only in the second were they able to get past the second sack.

Trinity puts up a good plucky fight regardless of the heavy opposition. T. C. U. has found this out in every department of athletics. We look for closer contests in Waxahachie at a later date.
