He then bucked for 2 more. A forward pass failed. Cox punted 40 yards and the ball crossed the goal line. It was put in play on the 25yard line. Austin failed on their short end run twice in succession and were forced to punt. Bussey returned the ball 5 yards. A forward pass failing, Cox punted 40 yards and Richards was downed in his tracks. Prince made 9 yards on a triple pass. Austin was penalized 15 yards for holding. Richards dropped back to punt and Fields blocking his kick ran for a touch-down. Cox failed at goal. Score: Austin 6, T. C. U. 5. The period was up just as Fields finished

Second Quarter.

T. C. U. kicked to Austin's 5-yard line and the man was downed in his tracks. Varsity was penalized 5 yards for offside. Austin then easily made first down. Failing to pull off their short end run, Richards punted 40 yards. Bussey returned it 10 yards. Daniel was good for 5 yards. Fields failed to gain. Cox fumbled and Ware recovered. Fields again failed. Cox punted 20 yards and there was no return. Varsity held 'em again and forced the Austinites to kick. The ball sailed 45 yards and Bussey returned it 5 yards. A forward pass to Bussey netted 15 yards. The same to Fields failed and Cox punted 45. Parker recovered. Cox made 6, Dan 3 and Ware made it first down. Bussey and Dan failing to make the required distance, Cox was called upon for a place kick. He executed it easily and the score stood: Austin 6, T. C. U. 8.

T. C. U. kicked to Austin's 25-yard line and downed the recipient in his tracks. On a fake punt Austin made 15 yards and then made 5 yards on an end run. Mason made 10 yards on a tackle play. The ball went over on the next two plays. Dan made 6 and 3. Bussey again essayed a forward pass to Parker. Prude caught it and ran 15 yards. Time was called with the ball on T. C. U.'s 35-yard line.

The second half was a duplicate of the first half in many ways. Both teams punted frequently and used short end runs for their best ground gainers. Austin scored a touch-down in each quarter of the second half. 405 Main St. The first one came from a drop kick formation and the second was made from a punt.

The remainder of the game was as hard fought as the first half.

The Austin boys ran interference in splendid style and were always in the game. Lever's boys showed a greater variety of piays and tricks, but they were not used to the best advantage. Capt.
