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#### AT UNIVERSITY CHURCH.

Owing to the absence of Bro. Hall at the Louisville Convention, Prof. Exley kindly consented to preach for us Sunday evening. After the simple and beautiful communion service, which was in charge of Prof. Hamner, Prof. Exley came forward and read from the 12th chapter of Romans a portion of the ninth verse as his text: "Therefore, abhor that which is evil and cleave to that which is good." It was a new sermon on an old text.

The speaker started out with the thought of the number of methods there are of carrying on the strife of good with evil in the world. "One of them is denunciation." The speaker went on to say; "You may denounce dime literature and the saloon and all the various enemies of truth and virtue-but what then? The keeper of the vinyard may go into it and remove that broken down trellis-but what then? Those beautiful grapes will attach themselves to some other objectmaybe to a powerful oak, maybe to a poisonous vine. Have we any assurance that the young people to whom we denounce the dime novel are going to read anything better? 'Every person's affections have a grasping tendency. Detach them from one thing, and they will attach themselves to something else,' he said.

"In the North, the oak leaves cannot be shaken loose by any frost nor any, even the strongest, of Winter's winds; but in the spring-time when the new leaves come the old ones fall gently one by one. And so it is in life. We must give people something nobler and worthier to cling to, and then the old habits will fall like the oak leaves in the springtime, one by one."

Prof. Exley brought out this theme in some beautiful and touching stories. He said: "We would all like to do this, but some of us do not know how There are two conditions: "First, you must cultivate the attitude of seeing and nurturing and developing that which is good." He pointed out that "Jesus never looked at a single life in which he did not find something that Yes, The Shining Circle B was good." His second condition was: 'We must manifest day by day in our own lives that which is good. In order t do good we must BE good-in order to be good we must DO good." Speaking of those who were absent, he said: more profitably in my room.' I am not going to discuss that question. But let me suggest this to you: No one of you can tell just how much your presence here means to someone tonight.

The writer wishes to say for himself that he never appreciated so fully as now the maxim given him in childhood, that "reading maketh a FULL man." Prof. Exley's sermons are full of the mental weath of the man who reads much; and are crowned and garnished and enriched by the reflections of a deep and religious nature. May we hear from him often.

MAKES RECORD IN CALI-FORNIA WITH THE BRUSH

Frank W. Cuprien, known in T. C. U. circles as "Professor" Cuprien, is now located in California. Mr. Cuprien was for two years head of the voice department of music in T. C. U., and won many friends while here. Mr. Cuprien was also known here as a skilled artist, and his paintings took a number of valuable prizes at Texas exhibitions. After leaving here he has followed the artist's profession altogether, and all who know the genial vocalist will be glad to read the following criticism of Mr. Cuprien's paintings. This is only a short clipping from a long and able criticism of Mr. Cuprien's works which appeared at a certain exhibit in Los Angeles, taken from a daily paper of that city. Some of the pictures mentioned are familiar to T. C. U. people. The clipping follows:

"The biggest canvas in the exhibition is entitled, 'The Atlantic.' It is big in feelieng as wll as size, broad and loose in treatment. We have nothing but ocean and sky; that huge intamed monster, the sea, restless, neavy, cold, treacherous, under palid blue light that is reflected on the dull-green waves. The immense clouds that sweep over it are full of vitality. The far horizon is of a lumnous light green. There is no living hing to be seen on this tremendous waste of waters. In this, as in all of Cuprien's canvases, the weight of the sea is felt and indicated.

'Cuprien's predilection is for the sea, but he has painted woods and mountains with success. 'Pool in the Woods,' from Thyringen, Germany, is either side are tall trees that make an fresh and cool and restful. The dark pool lies in the foreground and on inviting vista into the heart of the orest, where the sunlight lies in orilliant spots of yellowish pink on the duller pink made by rotting leaves on the slopes above big mossy stones. It is all very idyllic.

"The artist's color is almost always good, often very harmonious and beautiful. He shows a sincere and genuine love for nature, an appreciation of its grandeurs and subtleties, a desire to record faithfully and truly. Southern California has made its appeal to him, and he cannot get away from it."
