RECITALS WILL END SOON

Clyde Grissom, Senior in Oratory, to Read from Julius Caesar.

Three recitals will be given during the coming week, one post graduate piano recital, one graduate piano recital and one oratory recital.

Miss McLendon Post Graduate. Miss Anna McLendon, pianist, post graduate pupil of Mr. Lewis Caspersen, will give her recital in the auditorium next Monday night, May 22.

Miss McLendon is the only post graduate student of piano in the department; she was graduated last year and this year has been one of the monitors in charge of the practice rooms. She is president of the Music Study Club.

VARSITY TENNIS MEN DOUBLES CHAMPIONS

Clyde Tomlinson and Paul Pirkle, representing T. C. U. in the state tennis tournament held at the University of Texas, Friday and Saturday, May 12 and 13, captured the doubles, thereby becoming state champions in this phase of the game.

The Varsity men beat Baylor in the singles but lost to Texas. One of the matches between Pirkle and Bradley of Texas, which Bradley won, was credited as being the hardest and best played match ever played on the University of Texas courts.

Due to the nervousness of Morrow and McDade, the Baylor racquet men, the T. C. U. men snatched a couple of sets from them, 6-3, 7-5. The Varsity men used a smashing game throughout.

Dr. Penick, tennis coach at Texas, said he had two teams of equal ability and he didn't know which to pit against T. C. U. He decided to have a match and let the winner play our men. This he did, putting Thomas and Bradley, the team which

VARSITY DEFEATS METHODISTS BY A SCORE OF 12 TO 5

First Part of Game Goes in Favor of Dallas School, but Christians Tighten up in the Sixth Inning.

REVENGE FORMER GAME

Rooters' Activity on Side Lines Big Help to Players; Southwestern Last Game.


Varsity retaliated for their defeat at the hands of S. M. U. some weeks ago in Dallas by trouncing the Methodists by the lop-sided score of 12 to 5 on the University diamond Tuesday afternoon.

Willis and Raley were announced as batteries for the Christians; Wilhite and Coffman were the batteries for S. M. U. The pitchers were the same that met in Dallas on the former game.

The Methodists, taking advantage of Willis' wildness, and the unsteadiness of the Christian infield, started scoring in the first inning. Westfield was hit by a pitched ball. Birdsong lived on Willis' error. Henderson grounded to Gunter, who caught Westfield at the plate on a perfect pass. Kincannon then came through on a screaming double to right, scoring Birdsong and Henderson. Glenn rolled to Nelson, who overthrew first base, Kincannon scoring. Willis then struck out Longino and Primm, checking the Methodists.

The Christians scored in the second inning on a couple of errors and singles by Baker and Raley. S. M. U. scored in the third on hits by Birdsong and Kincannon and again in the fourth on a walk to Westfield and a double by Birdsong.


EXAMS ON JUNE 3, 5, 6, 7

Combining these hits and two walks the Christians made nine runs before they could be stopped, Baker counting twice. It is thought that this rally was due entirely to the pep shown by the rooters on the side lines, led by John Keith. It is possible that if the rooters had not grown tired and returned to their seats that the Christians would never have been put out.

The Christians scored one each in the seventh and eighth by long drives off Caldwell. Willis was relieved by Harry Lee in the eighth.
