SPECULATION IS 25 A. B. DEGREES, RIFE ABOUT **PRESIDENT**

Following the publication of a story in the Star-Telegram last Sunday concerning the presidential situation in T. C. U., speculation has again sprung up regarding the most likely presidential possibilities.

Here is the story:

If. Rev. L. D. Anderson, pastor of the First Christian Church, is not released by his congregation to accept the presidency of Texas Christian University, it is the belief of faculty members, student body and individual members of the board that Acting President W. B. Parks will be chosen. The board will meet on June 8 and hear the final report of the committee waiting on the church in regard to releasing Anderson. A new president will be selected at that time unless the congregation will accept the pastor's resignation.


