PROFESSIONALS ARE PUSHED TO BEAT T. C. U. TEAM; FEW HITS MADE.

The Fort Worth Panthers, the professional players who represent Fort Worth in the Texas League, were given a stiff battle Wednesday afternoon by the T. C. U. Horned Frogs. The only two runs of the practice game were made by the Panthers on wild throws. The game was interesting and fast. Nelson and Shady Hale of T. C. U. made several good plays.

T. C. U. had one splendid chance to sew the game up. In the second inning, Nelson and Christenberry singled in succession, were advanced to second and third on an out. Baker then layed down a bunt and it looked like a sure score; but the ball rolled foul, and the two runners were left stranded on bases while another out was made.

Only seven hits were made during the entire game. For Fort Worth, Chrichlow made two, and Thompson one. For T. C. U. Nelson made one, Shady Hale one, and Christenberry two.

Young twirled the whole nine innings for the Panthers. Sims pitched five frames for T. C. U., Lee two innings, and Willie one. Sims is a Fort Worth pitcher and was loaned to T. C. U. by Jackie Atz because Daniel wanted to save his moundmen for the long Southern trip.

The Purple and White boys looked well against the professionals, and the crowd of T. C. U. rooters who saw the game predict a successful road-trip.

#### T. C. U. HITS THE BALL HARD.

Result of Game in Doubt Until Last Minute—Willie Fans 14 Men.

In the most exciting game of baseball seen on the T. C. U. lot in many moons, the Christians took the scalp of the Methodists from Dallas, to the tune of 7 to 6, in a ten inning battle. The game waxed hot from start until the last of the tenth when Raley walked, Harry Lee knocked a high fly which was dropped, advancing Raley to second. There were two men on the base and no outs when McKee came to the bat. He picked out a nice offering of Ford's and slapped it in the face hard enough to bring Raley in and win the game.

The first of the game was marked by the fine pitching of Willie and Ford. No scores were made in the first two times at bat. T. C. U. used their clubs effectively, getting 14 hits off Ford. Willie struck out 14 men in his seven innings of pitching, but his support grew bad at times. This shows that the Horned Frogs have two excellent men for duty on the mound, since Lee struck out 19 men in the game with Trinity. The men in the outer garden were hindered in their work by a high wind. Heavy hitting featured the game. McKee of T. C. U. and Cooper of S. M. U. leading with four hits out of five trips to the bat.

**THE NEW GYM.**

The decision of the Board to use the entire amount pledged in the recent campaign for the erection of a first-class gymnasium and the improvement of athletic equipment in all lines was undoubtedly a wise move.

A good gymnasium means that at least a third more young men will be drawn to T. C. U. It means that the physical education of the students, which has long been neglected, will be attended to. It means that a healthful and enjoyable recreation will be furnished the patrons of the institution right here on the campus, and consequently much of the unnecessary "going-to-the-city" will be eliminated.

The purchase of the athletic field is another wise move. If properly controlled, athletics is an important—almost indispensable—part of college life. Good athletic teams prove the best advertisement a school can have. They bind the students together in a common, loyal, interest in the college or university, and furnish them with exhilarating out-door diversion.

It is probable that a large athletic stadium and grand-stand will be constructed in the next 6 months. Such a structure will pay for itself in students alone in two or three years; for high school meets may beheld annually at T. C. U., and large numbers of students will be drawn here that otherwise would have never have visited here.

The Board is now realizing that physical education must extend to the entire student body, and that this is only possible with a gymnasium.
