MILITARY TRAINING PROSPECTS

Sec. Baker Gives Assurance of Training.

After many trials which have had varying successes—in most cases extremely varying—T. C. U. has been practically assured at last that the boys will have an opportunity to receive adequate training. The following is the letter recently received by President Waits:

To the Presidents of all Institutions of Collegiate Grade—
Dear Sirs:

In order to provide military instruction for the college students of the country during the present emergency, a comprehensive plan will be put in effect by the War Department, beginning with the next college year, in September, 1918. The details remain to be worked out, but in general the plan will be as follows:

Military instruction under officers and non-commissioned officers of the Army will be provided in every institution of college grade, which enrolls for the instruction 100 or more able-bodied students over the age of eighteen. The necessary military equipment will, so far as possible be provided by the government. There will be created a military training unit in each institution. Enlistment will be purely voluntary but all students over the age of eighteen will be encouraged to enlist. The enlistment will constitute the student a member of the Army of the United States, liable to active duty at the call of the President. It will, however, be the policy of the government not to call the members of the training units to active duty until they have reached the age of twenty-one, unless urgent military necessity compels an earlier call. Students under eighteen and therefore not legal.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR NAMED

E. M. Tipton Comes With Wide Reputation.

Texas Christian University has just passed through one of the most successful years of its history, in an athletic way. It not only succeeded in having the greatest football team yet, but has just closed a most successful baseball season. The Board of Trustees and the President of the Institution, knowing the full value of athletics to a college at the present time, have planned for the furtherance of the work next year in an unusual way. They have recently succeeded in getting a director of athletics to take the place of Mr. Daniels, who has gone into the war service. Mr. E. M. Tipton, the new director of athletics, who has recently been elected by the board, is a graduate of the University of Missouri, both in the College of Arts and Sciences and in the Law School. He took an active interest in athletics while in college, where he won his "M" and where he also assisted Hollenbeck of Pennsylvania, and Roper, of Princeton University, to condition their men.

After his graduation from the University of Missouri, Mr. Tipton was persuaded to take the


BIBLE CHAIR TO BE ENDOWED





ly legible for enlistment, will be encouraged to enroll in the training units. Provision will be made for co-ordinating the Reserve Officers' Training Corps system, which exists in about one-third of the collegiate institutions, with this broader plan.

This new policy aims to accomplish a two-fold object: First, to develop as a great military asset the large body of young men in the colleges; and second, to prevent unnecessary and wasteful depletion of the colleges through indiscriminate volunteering, by offering to the students a definite and immediate military status.

Later announcement will be made of the details of the new system. In the meantime, presidents of collegiate institutions are requested to call this matter to the attention of all their students. Those who do not graduate this spring should be urged to continue their education and take advantage of this opportunity to serve the nation.

I trust that the policy above stated will have your support and co-operation.

While at the University of Missouri, Mr. Tipton acted as trainer of football, basketball, and track team. Mr. Tipton has the unqualified endorsement of men like Dan M. Nee, who is in charge of athletics at Drury College and who for the past five years has been president of the College Conference. He is also heartily endorsed by Mr. C. P. LeMire, Attorney General of Missouri, the Kansas City Athletic Club, and also the Athletic Editor of the Kansas City Star. With such leadership as this and the fact that eight of the eleven old winning team

will be with us next year is a guarantee that T. C. U. will be able to sweep the boards in an athletic way next year.

The school is fortunate in securing a man of the character and ability of Mr. Tipton, and the prospects look good for next year.
