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FROG TRACK SQUAD READY FOR FAT STOCK SHOW MEET

T. C. U. to Enter 14 Men in Big Event to be Held at Worth Field Saturday; Other Colleges to Enter Teams.

One of the most interesting features of the Stock Show this week is the Annual Invitation Track Meet to be held next Saturday. Aided by fairly favorable weather, the T. C. U. tracksters have rounded into pretty fair shape for this early in the season and will enter a team and endeavor to cop the gonfalon and all that goes with it in the collegiate division. As we have not been definitely appraised as to who will compose the entry, we are unable to make a forecast as to the strength of the opposition.

In the dashes we will be ably represented by three men of almost equal ability, Morgan, Dickinson and Nicholson being entered to date in the century and the 220-yard dash. Any of this trio is capable of running the century in close to ten seconds. Nicholson, Crump and Light are entered in the 440; all of them are in fair shape and capable of making good time. There will be no half, but in the mile will be entered Captain Montgomery, White, and Fowler. Montgomery won the mile in the Stock Show Meet last year and he is in good shape and indications point toward his repeating. We will have a fairly strong relay team, composed of Cochran, Horton, Light and Crump.

In the field events we will be equally as strong. Jim Cantrell, facing one of the most promising seasons in his career, will be entered in the discus and the shot put with Scarborough and Othro Adams respectively as his co-entrants. In the pole vault Possum Clark and "Jew" Holcomb, two new men, are entered and will vie for honors. Morgan, Howard and Horton are entered in the broad jump and Cunningham and Howard in the high jump.

This year's track team, while it does not contain scintillating stars of several years past, is on the whole better rounded and balanced than at any time previous. The personnel of the club will contain a large number of comparatively inexperienced men, but this will be made up for partially by the fact that there will be plenty of competition in each event.

Froggy Lovvorn will probably handle the hot corner, although the injury to Homer Adams, outfielder, may send Lovvorn to the garden, leaving Clark or Lane to fight it out for the third base job. These last two youngsters are flashy fielders, so it will probably be their hitting prowess on which their chances will rest.

Frankie Cantelmi and Moco Holland are engaged in a heated battle for the short stop berth. Cantelmi is a flash on defense and at the end of the season last year was whamming the ball on the nose. Holland is a new man, coming up from the Freshman ranks with Wolfe and several others. His fielding is about on a par with that of Cantelmi, but his hitting may not measure up to the conference standard. He was one of the leading hitters for the Freshmen during his kindergarten days and Nance believes he is a comer.

If pre-season predictions are of any worth the outfielders will fully measure up to the infield, if not outstrip them in the slugging department.

Homer Adams, seriously hampered by an injury in basket ball, may be unable to go. T. C. U. will lose a very valuable man if Adams is out. He was a sweet fielder and could hit them when hits meant runs. Harry Taylor is cavorting in his accustomed mead in left field. Don Frazee and Harold Carson are bidding earnestly for garden berths. They will have to hurry to keep the heavy hitting Peebles off the regular line up. All these players are dependable fielders so it will be their work with the willow that decides their fate.

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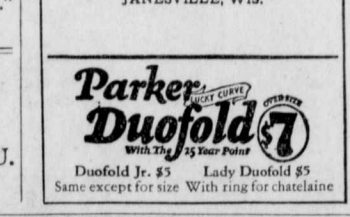
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Miss Smith to Lecture on India
