Meet Undefeated

S. M. U. Slight Favorite When Frosh Play at 2:30 p. m. Friday.

For the second consecutive year the Polliwogs and the S. M. U. Colts will be battling to preserve their perfect records as they again face each other in their final game of the season at 2:30 p. m. Friday in the

Both records were marred last year as the two clubs fought to a 7-to-7 tie in Dallas.

The Wogs have yet to win a victory over the Methodist freshmen, as they lost the only other game played with the Colts in 1934, by a 19-to-0 count.

The records show that the Wogs this year have defeated the Decatur Baptists 39 to 0 and the Baylor Cubs 13 to 6. The Colts are unscored upon, having defeated the Baylor Cubs 13 to 0 and Weatherford Junior College 8 to 0.

The Colts boast eight starters with junior college experience, and will be light favorites over the Wogs. Their backfield averages 185 and their line close to 200 pounds.

The Colt line-up will probably be: Ends, Arthur Hawn and Fred Heitmeyer; tackles, Frank Bray and Will Curik; guards, Frank Scottino and Karl Zschach; center, Wilburn Echols; quarter, J. C. Wofford; full, Wally Bearden; halves, Nolan Jackson and Red Ewing.

Coach Howard Grubbs will probably start the same team that defeated the Baylor frosh. In that event, the starters will be: Ends, Don Looney and Durwood Horner; tackles, Bob Cook and James McWhorter; guards, Wilbur Taylor and Walter Swain; center, Ed Cobb; quarter, Spud Taylor; full, Dave Runnels; halves, Woodrow Duckworth and Bud Lee.

13 Seniors To End Southwest Service

Thirteen Frog seniors end their Southwest Conference and Texas football careers tomorrow.

They have two definite aims to accomplish at Owenby Stadium Saturday. First, they want their first vic-tory from S. M. U., second they will be out for their first conference title. Capt. Walter Roach, Will Walls, L. D. Meyer, and Charlie Needham will be ending three years of valuable service as wingmen.

Sub-Capt. Drew Ellis will end three years in the starting lineup as tackle. James Nelson, reserve tackle, will also service after Saturd Cotton Harrison and Solon Holt will climax three great, but non-spectacular years of play at guard.

Samuel Adrian Baugh pilots his last Frog attack against a conference foe. Vic Montgomery will end valuable service as a utility man in the backfield, be it quarter or half that was needed.

The remaining three seniors are the Mason trio of Scott McCall, Harold McClure and Donkey Roberts who will end their deeds for Fort Worth fans, action which has kept them in the Panther City mind since 1930.

> Ed Prell of the Star-Telegram suggests that the winner of the Frog-Brone tussle in California get the Sugar Bowl bid. Why not? You thereby eliminate any possibility of a defeated entry and you've got the two best teams of the nation fighting for the honor.

Samuel Adrian Baugh (pronounced. "Baw") is being called by Southwest 39 40 sports writers the greatest football 41 player in history. Let's look at his 43 record to date. He's passing at a percentage of .517, completing 91 44 passes out of 176 attempts; 72 have 46 been incomplete and 13 intercepted. 48 His average gain per completion is 49 11.7 yards and average per pass is 6.2 yards. He has punted 59 times for an average of 37 yards, and more than half his punts, 32 to be exact, have gone out-of-bounds away from the safety. Only twice has he kicked over the goal for a touchback and extra yardage. He has brought back 12 21 punts at the rate of 11.7 per returns. He has carried the ball 35 14 times for 73 yards. Statistically, or otherwise, he's the greatest quarter- 16 back in America today.
