Throughout the ages of the history of mankind where great battles have been fought and great games have been contested, the names of the places have lived in the memories and in the hearts of mankind just as the names of the warriors and players have lived, and even more so.

I do not know who fought at the battle of Gettysburg, but I do know that the name will live in my mind as long as I live. If one could but stand on this battle ground I am persuaded that he would feel the surging of a great personality, rising up and ending him in its mystical arms.

### Cinch Conference Tie to Reward Frogs for Victory.

T. C. U. plays S. M. U. Saturday.

What more need be said when these two traditional rivals clash. Coach Dutch Meyer's Horned Frogs at 2:30 p. m. Saturday invade Owenby Stadium to tangle with Coach Matty Bell's Mustangs.

The game is far more important to T. C. U. than S. M. U., for they can cinch a tie for the conference championship by defeating the Ponies and perhaps even gain a clear title should Texas upset Arkansas on Dec. 5 in Little Rock.

But Red and Blue fans too have their reasons for winning. A victory over the Frogs would make what so far has been a disastrous season into a successful season. The Mustangs would run their string to three consecutive victories over the Frogs and would again keep their ancient rivals from winning a conference title.

A capacity crowd of better than 25,000 people will jam Owenby Stadium to watch the conflict. They'll also be there to bid farewell to Texas' favorite son and best football player in history, Samuel Adrian Baugh.

Baugh will be piloting the Purple attack for the last time on Texas soil. He'll be cocking his magic arm for his final heaves and will be making his final bid for all-American honors. The eyes of the nation will be on Samuel A. Baugh and the Frogs Saturday. Can he pilot the Frogs to their first victory over the Mustangs in three years?

But Baugh and the Frogs apparently have more than the Mustangs to beat. Old man injuries seems to be riding for the S. M. U. team, especially at the left halfback position in Meyer's lineup.

Scott McCall has a bad knee—a recurrence of an old injury. Pat Clifford has a broken bone in his foot. Bob Harrell is limping with a bad ankle, and there aren't any more left halves.

Vic Montgomery shifted from right over to left may be the solution or Linnon Blackmon may be converted from fullback, but it's a late date for switches. Then right half may also become a question mark as Harold McClure was taken from last Saturday's game because of an appendicitis attack.

And finally Sub-Capt. Drew Ellis has still not fully recovered from his ailments and will not be at top strength at tackle.

The mental attitude is right, however, and Coach Meyer's Frogs will definitely be out for a Southwest Conference title Saturday.

## Polliwogs, Colts Meet Undeclared

### S. M. U. Slight Favorite When Frosh Play at 2:30 p. m. Friday.

For the second consecutive year the Polliwogs and the S. M. U. Colts will be battling to preserve their perfect records as they again face each other in their final game of the season at 2:30 p. m. Friday in the Stadium.

Both records were marred last year as the two clubs fought to a 7-to-7 tie in Dallas.

The Wogs have yet to win a victory over the Methodist freshmen, as they lost the only other game played with the Colts in 1934, by a 19-to-0 count.

The records show that the Wogs this year have defeated the Decatur Baptists 39 to 0 and the Baylor Cubs 13 to 6. The Colts are undefeated upon, having defeated the Baylor Cubs 13 to 0 and Weatherford Junior College 8 to 0.

The Colts boast eight starters with junior college experience, and will be slight favorites over the Wogs. Their backfield averages 185 and their line close to 200 pounds.

The Colt line-up will probably be: Ends, Arthur Hawn and Fred Heitmeyer; tackles, Frank Bray and Will Curik; guards, Frank Scottino and Karl Zschach; center, Wilburn Echols; quarter, J. C. Wofford; full, Wally Bearden; halves, Nolan Jackson and Red Ewing.

Coach Howard Grubbs will probably start the same team that defeated the Baylor frosh. In that event, the starters will be: Ends, Don Looney and Durwood Horner; tackles, Bob Cook and James McWhorter; guards, Wilbur Taylor and Walter Swain; center, Ed Cobb; quarter, Spud Taylor; full, Dave Runnels; halves, Woodrow Duckworth and Bud Lee.

## 13 Seniors To End Southwest Service

Thirteen Frog seniors end their Southwest Conference and Texas football careers tomorrow.

They have two definite aims to accomplish at Owenby Stadium Saturday. First, they want their first victory from S. M. U., second they will be out for their first conference title.

Capt. Walter Roach, Will Walls, L. D. Meyer, and Charlie Needham will be ending three years of valuable service as wingmen.

Sub-Capt. Drew Ellis will end three years in the starting lineup as tackle. James Nelson, reserve tackle, will also be lost from service after Saturday.

Cotton Harrison and Solon Holt will climax three great, but non-spectacular years of play at guard.

Samuel Adrian Baugh pilots his last Frog attack against a conference foe. Vic Montgomery will end valuable service as a utility man in the backfield, be it quarter or half that was needed.

The remaining three seniors are the Mason trio of Scott McCall, Harold McClure and Donkey Roberts who will end their deeds for Fort Worth fans, action which has kept them in the Panther City mind since 1930.

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## Time Out

The Horned Frogs won their first conference football champion in 1929 and repeated in 1932. In 1930 they finished in third place, in 1931 in second place, in 1933 in a tie for second, in 1934 in fourth, and in 1935, the Frogs defeated the L. S. U. Tigers in the annual Sugar Bowl game in New Orleans, giving the team first place in the Williamson football national ratings.

In 10 official student body trips, during as many years, the Frogs have won eight, tied one, and lost only one contest when they had their own rooters and band in the stands to see them perform away from home.

From the files—Sept. 21, 1933: "Sam Baugh, an all-state man from Sweetwater, is another freshman who will make a name for himself."

If all the 1936 Horned Frogs were placed end to end—well, they wouldn't quite reach the length of the gridiron. The 45 players would reach from one goal line 89 yards and 1 foot down the field.

Donkey Roberts has made the longest gain on a running play from scrimmage for the Frogs so far this season. He tore off 21 yards against the Arkansas Razorbacks for a touchdown. The yardage was made on a "sucker" play through Arkansas' left guard.

The Frogs travel an average of 17 yards on touchdown plays. They have crossed the enemy goal line 20 times so far this season, 13 times on pass plays and 7 times on running plays. Seven of the touchdowns have been pushed over when they were inside the opponents' 10-yard stripe.

The Frogs are 18 points better than themselves. Here's how: T. C. U. beat Centenary, 26 to 0. Centenary beat A. & M., 3 to 0. That makes T. C. U. 29 points better than A. & M. The Aggies beat T. C. U. 11 points (18 to 7), so that leaves the Frogs 18 points better than themselves.

It appears now that something like 25 players will win their varsity "T" this season. In both the Baylor and Texas games the Christians piled up points so rapidly in the early part of the game that wholesale substitutions were made and a number of the boys accumulated a good many minutes toward the total of 60 in conference play that are required for a "T."

**KI ALDRICH** is the type of fighting football player that gladdens the heart of any coach. Although only a sophomore, he is a student at the center position. When the going is the toughest, Ki likes it the best. He is 5 feet, 11 inches and weighs 185 pounds. His home is Temple.

**LINNON BLACKMON**, at 175 pounds, is a power at the fullback position. Injuries have handicapped him this season, but he expects to be in top shape for the last half of the campaign. He comes from Abilene.

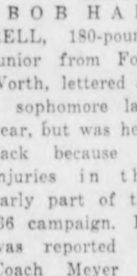

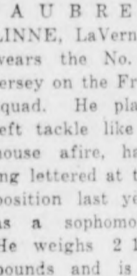

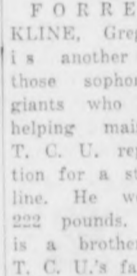
LINNE

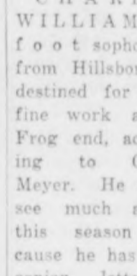
KLIVE

# Baugh and Score (13-0) Both Right Frogs Down Strong Owl Team as McCall, Walls Score.

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 21.—In a great "Baugh" game here today, the championship-bound Horned Frogs crushed the Rice Owls, 13 to 0. Samuel Adrian Baugh and his Frog teammates were absolutely right today. Their activities made Rice homecoming festivities a flop.

Baugh passed, punted, ran and quarterbacked in perfect style. He completed 16 out of 24 passes, punted eight times for 43.5 yards per kick, brought back punts at an average of 12 yards per return and called a game that kept the Kittens guessing all the time.

Sammy's range was long for the first few minutes of the game, but it took him only five passes to sight the bullseye.

T. C. U.'s first touchdown came on Baugh's range-finding shot. With the ball on the Owl 33-yard line, fourth down and seven, Baugh dropped back and shot a perfect pass to Will Walls, 24 yards away and he scampered across for the first six points. Buck Friedman blocked Roach's attempt to convert.

After that Baugh completed 16 passes, with but one incomplete.

Running Game Also Strong But passing wasn't all the Frogs did. The hard running of Donkey Roberts, Scott McCall and Harold

McClure tore the Rice line to shreds. The Frog backs pierced the Owl forwards for 179 yards and 11 first downs.

Besides opening up holes for the backfield, Coach Mike Brumbelow's line played great defensive ball. The Owl backs could net but 55 yards through the line and only two first downs.

Followers on the official student trip got an extra thrill in the waning minutes of the game as Bill Brandon piloted an Owl aerial counter attack.

The Owls succeeded in advancing the ball to the Frog 29, but Ki Aldrich ended prospective nightmares of a one-point victory by intercepting one of Brandon's heaves.

77 Yards for 2nd Marker As if in revenge for the scare, Baugh and his mates there began a triumphant 77 yard march to another touchdown. Scott McCall climaxed the drive, slanting off tackle for five yards and the tally. L. D. Meyer kicked goal to keep his college record for conversions 1000 per cent.

The gun cut short another Frog touchdown drive on the 4-yard line. It, too, began with an interception of a Brandon aerial—this time by Ward Wilkinson.

Baugh's advantage over Brandon, John Neece, and Johnny Schuehle as a punter contributed a great deal toward the Frogs' victory. It was a punt exchange which put the ball in scoring position for the first score, and Baugh kicked another 50 yards three times, once for 68 and twice for 54.

# RIDINGS RITINGS

Good Dallas Idea Sam's Statistics Tillie Doing Well Prayer for Texas

JAKE, of "Uncle Jake's Sports News" in Dallas, said in his paper last week, "Every loyal Texan shud now boost for th' T. C. U. Frogs 't git sum kind o' bowl invitashun. Th' team deserves it an' in Sammy Baugh they has a real all-American if they ever was one." And he is absolutely right.

Ed Prell of the Star-Telegram suggests that the winner of the Frog-Bronc tussle in California get the Sugar Bowl bid. Why not? You thereby eliminate any possibility of a defeated entry and you've got the two best teams of the nation fighting for the honor.

Samuel Adrian Baugh (pronounced "Baw") is being called by Southwest sports writers the greatest football player in history. Let's look at his record to date. He's passing at a percentage of .517, completing 91 passes out of 176 attempts; 72 have been incomplete and 13 intercepted. His average gain per completion is 11.7 yards and average per pass is 6.2 yards. He has punted 59 times for an average of 37 yards, and more than half his punts, 32 to be exact, have gone out-of-bounds away from the safety. Only twice has he kicked over the goal for a touchback and extra yardage. He has brought back 21 punts at the rate of 11.7 per returns. He has carried the ball 35 times for 73 yards. Statistically, or otherwise, he's the greatest quarterback in America today.

Another football treat is in store for fans at 2:30 p. m. next Wednesday when Prof. Thomas Prouse matches his two all-star intramural teams. The managers and captains selected a first team and a second team at the end of the tag season, and the second team will be out to show them that they should have been first-team choices.

Frog fans will be glad to know that Tillie Manton's golden toe is still functioning. To date this season he has kicked 13 points after touchdown and scored one touchdown. He has risen from reserve fullback to starting fullback on the New York Giants.

Well, the Frogs' season in Texas is about over and I hope they really smear those Mustangs for a gala finish. I'm also saying prayers for Texas over Arkansas Dec. 5.

And today for the first time I'll use the scribes' privilege of picking the scores: Polliwogs 13, Colts 6. T. C. U. 26, S. M. U. 6. Arkansas 13, Tulsa 0. A. & M. 20, Texas 7. Rice 21, Baylor 14.

# Grid Honors Are About Even Between Frogs and Mustangs

Gridiron honors, over the years, are just about even between the Texas Christian Horned Frogs and the Southern Methodist Mustangs.

In 18 games played by the two schools, the Frogs have been victorious eight times, the Mustangs have won seven, and three have been ties. The competition began back in 1915. T. C. U., with some 18 years of football experience behind her, found the S. M. U. elevens, just starting play, rather easy opponents for the first few years. But in Southwest Conference competition (since 1923) the Pones hold a slight edge, with eight victories to four losses and two ties.

For eight successive years (1926 to 1933, inclusive) the T. C. U.-S. M. U. contest wound up the grid season for both elevens. But this season is the third straight that both teams have scheduled an additional game after the annual Fort Worth-Dallas clash.

Three times in the past eight years the two schools have met with both teams as candidates for the conference flag. In 1929 the Frogs needed at least a tie to gain the title—and the game ended 7 to 7.

In 1931 the Mustangs had to have at least a tie to beat out the Frogs—and the game ended 0 to 0.

Last year the eyes of the nation

were on the two undefeated elevens that met in Fort Worth. S. M. U. won 20 to 14, to go to the Rose Bowl, where they lost to Stanford 7 to 0. T. C. U. went to the Sugar Bowl, where they won from the Louisiana State Tigers 3 to 2.

This year the Methodists are out of the running for conference honors, but the Christians can cinch a tie for the flag with a victory over the Mustangs.

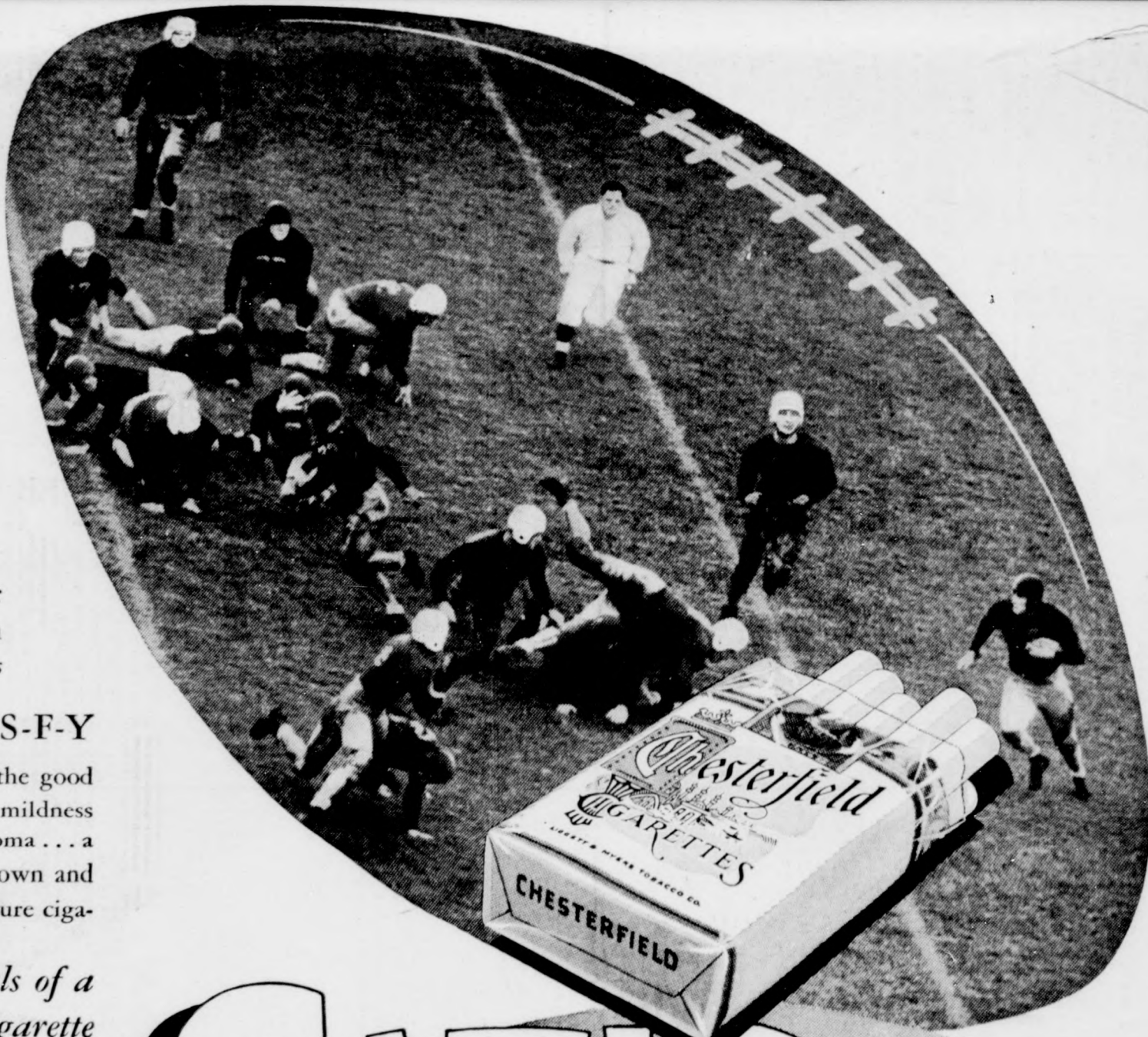
