Holiday 10 O'clock

Ike Silver's Orchestra to Play at Aggie-Frog Dance in Basketball Gym.

College students, some 6000 strong, will visit Frogland tomorrow. The student bodies of both Texas A. & M. and Texas State College for Women (C. I. A.) are making official trips here.

The 4000 cadets, who are, of course, the honor guests because of tomorrow afternoon's Frog-Aggie tilt, will arrive on three special trains at 10:15, 10:30 and 10:45 a. m. The Denton girls will arrive at different times as they are coming by various means.

An official holiday has been declared at Frogland from 10 o'clock on, in order that all students may feel free to meet the Farmer specials.

Coeds to Meet Trains. As the Aggies arrive, they will be greeted by the Purple coeds, who will pin pennants on them and introduce themselves. It is expected that the T. S. C. W. girls will also participate in this feature.

Immediately following the arrival at the station, the entire cadet corps, including two 90-piece bands, will stage a parade downtown.

The Frog supporters themselves will stage a parade to town and back with busses, firewagons and the many students' cars. This parade will be on the order of the two pep-rally parades held recently.

"Every student with a car should get a 'Hop In Aggie' sticker and meet the cadets," urges Student Body President Byron Buckeridge. Besides students, every civic organization has been asked to help in the transportation problem. The local A. & M. Mothers Club is also working on this problem.

Flags to Be Displayed

Buckeridge has also made arrangements for the downtown business firms to display their flags, and for 100 direction markers "To Frogland" to be posted all over the city, especially on the roads from Denton and College Station.

"Come In, Aggie" signs are also available for dormitory rooms and town homes which will be open for cadet use, according to Buckeridge, and students should get these cards and register their address with some Council member, in order that the information bureau will be able to give them to the cadets.

The information bureau will also act as a date bureau, with 25 Frogland coeds acting as hostesses. The bureau is under the supervision of Misses Ann Day Jarvis, Frances Buster, Mary Frances Hutton and Martha Fallis.

This bureau will operate during the free barbecue luncheon that will be given the cadets by the school. The luncheon will be held on the front campus.

Dance Tomorrow Night

Tomorrow night the official Aggie-Frog dance will be held in the Basketball Gymnasium, with Ike Silver's orchestra playing.

Complete arrangements have been made to take care of the huge crowd. The admission price will be 80c per couple and \$1 for stags.

Frogland plays host to these two tomorrow. There's no need to say, "Welcome," for it's already been said and Frogland belongs to those of the khaki, and those of the blue and white uniforms.

Make them feel at home. Answer their every request. The official committee has worked all week and has every detail in readiness. Now the students must carry the plan out.

Hurrah for the Mounted!

The mounted rides again, and this time it's the National Guard Cavalry, to guard the fences at the Stadium.

The guard is a commendable and a necessary step. Capt. James L. Stitt, commandant of the cavalry, and Athletic Director Howard Grubbs deserve credit for this forward step.

However, the general attitude of the students and the crowd is that the cavalry are "bullies" picking on little boys. Such is not the case, for they are policemen keeping out trespassers, who have absolutely no rights.

It's also entirely unnecessary for the boys to slip in, as they are admitted for 50 cents, or many may secure jobs inside the Stadium.

But without arguing the case as to how the children should be admitted to the games, the practice of letting them come over the fence at their will, because of insufficient guards, can be condemned on the history of the practice.

Last year a boy who had slipped into the game was killed, and a law suit resulted when a boy was injured climbing the fence.

That anybody could slip into the games was an understood fact among Fort Worth's boys by the end of last season, so to prevent reoccurrences of the tragic happenings by this practice the boys must be taught that such is not the case.

No other school in the Southwest has this problem, for ample policing shows that they mean business. The mounted rides again to do this for the Horned Frogs.

Packed Stadium, Colorful Crowd, For Aggie Game

Cadets Will Try for Second Straight Over Frogs.

Contest Is "Krushel"

Leg Injuries May Hamper Todd, Nestrsta—Clifford, Cook Possible Starters.

Frog stadium is expected to be jammed and packed tomorrow at 3 p. m. when the mighty football forces of the Maroon and White Texas A. & M. Aggies line up against 11 determined Horned Frogs in the season's most important conference game.

Backed by 3500 cadets, due here tomorrow morning, the Aggies will attempt to make it two straight over the Purple, having defeated T. C. U. the first time in 13 years last season, by a score of 18 to 7.

Todd, Routt, Aggie Stars.

This year A. & M. is reported to have its greatest team since the immortal Joel Hunt led the Ags to gridiron glory back in the late twenties. Back from last year's tough eleven are such stars as Dick Todd, who scored two touchdowns against the Frogs in the game at College Station last season, all-American Joe Routt, mighty guard, hefty Roy Young, giant all-Southwest Conference tackle and bounding Bob Nestrsta, elusive half.

The Aggies are undefeated and untied so far this season and will be striving to keep their slate clean, in addition to sensing the importance of the game, which could well determine this year's conference champions.

Everything is not so well in the A. & M. camp, however. Word from Aggeland is to the effect that the "army" suffered several injuries in last week's brawl with Mississippi State which they won handily, 14 to 0.

Injuries May Bother.

Todd and Nestrsta both sustained leg injuries which may or may not handicap them tomorrow. The condition of these two backs no doubt will have a great deal to do with the outcome of tomorrow's game.

Head Coach Homer Norton, Aggie grid mentor, in a statement early this week, said, "All of 'em probably will play against Texas Christian. They'll have to, if we want to win, but I'm afraid none of them will be 'tops'."

Head Coach Dutch Meyer has been holding secret practices all this week—a good sign that he intends to "shoot the works" tomorrow.

The Frogs have the remembrance of last year's defeat as an incentive to "take" the Aggies, which is just one of the angles that will make tomorrow's scrap a battle from start to finish.

Probable Starters Named.

Changes in the Frog's line-up will probably see Pat Clifford, red-headed speed merchant, at a halfback at kickoff time and Bob Cook, rough and tough tackle, may take Forrest Kline's position.

Don Looney and Durwood Horner will probably be at ends, I. B. Hale as one tackle, Capt. Mason Mayne and Co-capt. Bull Rogers at guards, Ki Aldrich at center, Davey O'Brien, quarter, John Hall and Clifford, halfs and Linnon Blackmon at full.

A. & M.'s probable starting lineup will be: Ends, Herbert Smith and Bruno Schroeder; tackles, Roy Young and Joe Boyd; guards, Zed Coston; quarter, Owen Rogers; halfs, Bob Nestrsta and Dick Todd; fullback, Jim Shockey.

Joe and Jimmy Make New Clock Tick Off Scores

Two students, Joe Fredrick and Jimmy McBride, are the operators of the new \$5000 scoreboard.

"Dime a Dozen" Price of Thrills At Tulsa Battle

Frogs "Out-Hurricane" Hurricane to Win 20 to 13.

Game Is Spectacle

Every time the Frogs collide with the Tulsa University Golden Hurricane on the gridiron, thrills are worth a dime a dozen, and last Saturday's melee in the Purple stadium, when the Christians won 20 to 13, was no exception.

Everything that makes for a spectacular football game was displayed by the two elevens. Long, dazzling runs, equally dazzling passes, sensational kickoff returns, crushing power plays and jarring blocks and tackles were witnessed by about 7,500 persons, who saw Coach Dutch Meyer's charges "out-hurricane" the Hurricane and blow it back to Oklahoma.

The Frogs got the first break of the day when Linnon Blackmon, who started at fullback for the Meyermens, recovered the great Morris White's fumble on the Tulsa 40-yard line. A beautiful kick from the toe of Davey O'Brien, spearhead of the Frog's attack, bounced out on the Tulsa one. The Hurricane was in a hole for the rest of the first quarter.

O'Brien Scores for T. C. U.

A few plays after O'Brien got off his great punt, he shot a long high pass to sophomore end Bob Jordan, who took it on the Tulsa goal line and scooted over into pay dirt. O'Brien's place-kick was perfect, giving the Frogs a lead which they held throughout the game.

Early in the second period the Oklahoma boys scored by virtue of two passes, one good for 22 yards, and three line plays. Sub-Capt. Bull Rogers protected his team's lead when he broke through to block the kick.

There was no more scoring until the final quarter, but then the fireworks started. Taking the ball on their own 48-yard line, the Frog eleven passed and ran their way to the Hurricane 3-yard line, where O'Brien rammed it over in two tries and again place-kicked the extra point.

Tulsa Makes 2nd Touchdown.

Tulsa scored within the next two plays. White electrified the fans with a 58-yard kickoff return, and a pass and run accounted for the Tulsa's final touchdown, but not the final touchdown of the game.

A 34-yard heave from the paw of O'Brien found a resting place as Bob Harrell gathered it in on his five and trotted across the goal.

Little O'Brien, the big gun for the Frogs throughout the game, was the classiest back on the field. He completed 17 out of 32 passes, did a smart job of punting in keeping the ball away from the speedy White, carried the ball with speed and power and played a great defensive game.

White Stars for Tulsa.

White was probably the most dangerous ball-carrier on the field, but his yards-gained average from scrimmage was not as much as that of Johnny Hall, the Frog's fleet running half. Hall picked up 50 yards in 12 attempts while losing five, for an average of four and one-half yards per try. He also took two of O'Brien's passes for a combined gain of 45 yards.

Big I. B. Hale and Ki Aldrich played their usual sterling games at tackle and center respectively, while Capt. Mason Mayne and Rogers held down the guard positions in all-conference fashion.
