## Symphony Orchestra Honors Dr. Lockhart

Fallis' Reading of Longfellow's "King Robert of Sicily" Program Feature.

The second program of the T. C. U. Symphonic Orchestra conducted by Prof. Claude Sammis, was given Sunday afternoon in the University Christian Church. The concert was in honor of Dr. Clinton Lockhart's 80th birthday, which the School of Fine Arts and the Woman's Branch of the Alumni Association joined to celebrate. In the spirit of this occasion, the Rev. Perry Gresham spoke briefly a personal tribute to Dr. Lockhart as a teacher.

Prof. Sammis opened with the sparkling overture to Mozart's "Marriage of Figaro," after which the violin choir played transcriptions of Liszt's "Liebestraum" and the poignantly tragic Italian song "Nina," by Pergolesi. The latter, done with mutes, and held to a very steady tempo, but perfectly phrased, was a gem.

Miss Marifrances Bibb, solo harpist, gave a group composed of a Beethoven minuet, "Prayer," and "Brook," the last two by Hasselmann. In the "Brook," a rich resonance, charmingly woven figures, and delicacy of phrasing, of which the harp is capable when handled right, were especially notable.

The unique number was a reading of Longfellow's "King Robert of Sicily," given by Prof. L. D. Fallis, to the musical setting (played from mms.) for orchestra, piano and organ by Cole. Prof. Fallis read the lines with powerful sonority and with an interpretation at once sensitive and dramatic. The medium he chose was placed just right between the normal reading intonation and recitative chant, so that the poetry achieved its own special music, blended its melodic line with the complex orchestral score, and yet never became confused with the music proper. The work does, to be sure, need to be heard more than once for the hearer to attain the same high degree of coordinated attention as that attained by the performers.
