In fact the Meyermen journey all the way to Chapel Hill, N. C. for a joust with Bear Wolf's Tar Heels. The affair this week will be something like Old Home Week,

with Coaches Meyer and Brumbelow and the North Carolina mentors, Wolf and Johnny Vaught, all former wearers of the Purple and White. However, no holds will be barred and the fur will fly thick and fast.

The Tar Heels were early season favorites in the Southern Conference, but an opening game upset at the hands of Wake Forest knocked them out of the favorite's seat. However, they bounced right back last week to trounce a strong Davidson outfit 27 to 0. Headlining the Tar Heel

attack is Jim "Sweet" Lalanne, the tall, slender passer from Lafayette, La. Lalanne was named on several all-American teams last year and is expected to do even better in this, his senior year. Passing is not the only department that he excels, however. He is his team's chief punter, ball carrier and play selector.

Severin Star End
Sharing the spotlight with Lalanne at the Tar Heel camp is big Paul Severin, the pass snatching end who made the Associated Press' all-American team last year. This big fellow from the Pennsylvania coal fields is the backbone of the team on defense and is also a whale of a scoring threat when the Tar Heels have the leather. He accounted for 40 points last season, five touchdowns, two field goals and four conversions. As a whole, the North Carolina team is a big, fast, experienced outfit. There are 17 lettermen back from last year's fine squad and several promising freshmen have come up.

Coach Meyer took 35 Frogs with him to Chapel Hill. Every man on the squad is in tip-top condition. Everyone can play if needed. Bill Crawford, big first string guard who was kept out of most of the Arkansas game, is ready again and will be in the starting lineup. Ennis Kerlee, the tackle who has been suffering from bruised ribs, is all ready to go once more. Kyle Gillespie, the quarterback genius, came through his baptism of fire last Saturday without a trace of an injury to his tricky knee, and is ready and eager to play more in the Tar Heel contest.

Meyermen Show Power In Downing Arkansas With Greatest of Ease.

The "T. C. U. For Champion" bandwagon is gaining more and more riders each week. Last Saturday the wagon picked up many new supporters after the Horned Frogs blasted the Arkansas Razorbacks in the initial conference go, 29 to 0.

The Frogs displayed a potent passing attack this week in gaining their second victory of the season. While most of the scores of the Centenary game were made on long ground attacks, every one of the three touchdowns against the Porkers were made via the air. Again the Purple threw up a stubborn defense against their opponents. The Hogs were only able to gain 43 yards from scrimmage while they lost 30.

T. C. U. lost little time in the first quarter in obtaining a seven-point lead. After an exchange of punts, the Frogs took the leather and marched 83 yards to a score. Co-capt. Logan Ware and Nolan Sparks gained most of the way on rousing reverses to either side and little Dean Bagley and huge Frank Kring chipped in with their share of the yardage. The final 15 steps came on a pass from Kring to Bagley. The fullback tossed a high shot into the deep flat. It looked for a moment as if Frieberger, the giant Arkansas end, would intercept the pass, but Dean grabbed the ball right out of the Porker's hands and stepped into the end zone. Phil Roach converted.

That was all the scoring done in as if Frieberger, the giant Arkansas boys kept the Frogs backed deep in their own territory. Only spectacular punting by Kyle Gillespie from behind his own goal line saved the Purple.

Soon after play began in the second half, Gillespie re-entered the ball game and quickly engineered the second Frog score. The Purple went 64 yards in exactly three plays. First,

Kyle fired a pass over the middle to Roach for 10 paces. He repeated the dose for nine. Then, with the ball on the Hog 44, Gillespie rifled a perfect toss to his roommate, Nolan Sparks, who was in the clear, for a score. Roach missed the try for extra point.

Jack Odie, second string fullback, set up the final Frog touchdown by running through and over the whole Porker club on a 40 yard sprint that put the oval on the Hog 22. From there it was an easy matter for Bagley to spiral a toss to Gus Bierman in the end zone. Gus made a fine catch of the ball near the sideline. Roach booted the extra point to end the scoring for the afternoon.

Misses Nell Van Zandt and Jean Tew, students here last year, now enrolled at North Texas State Teachers College, attended the game here Saturday.

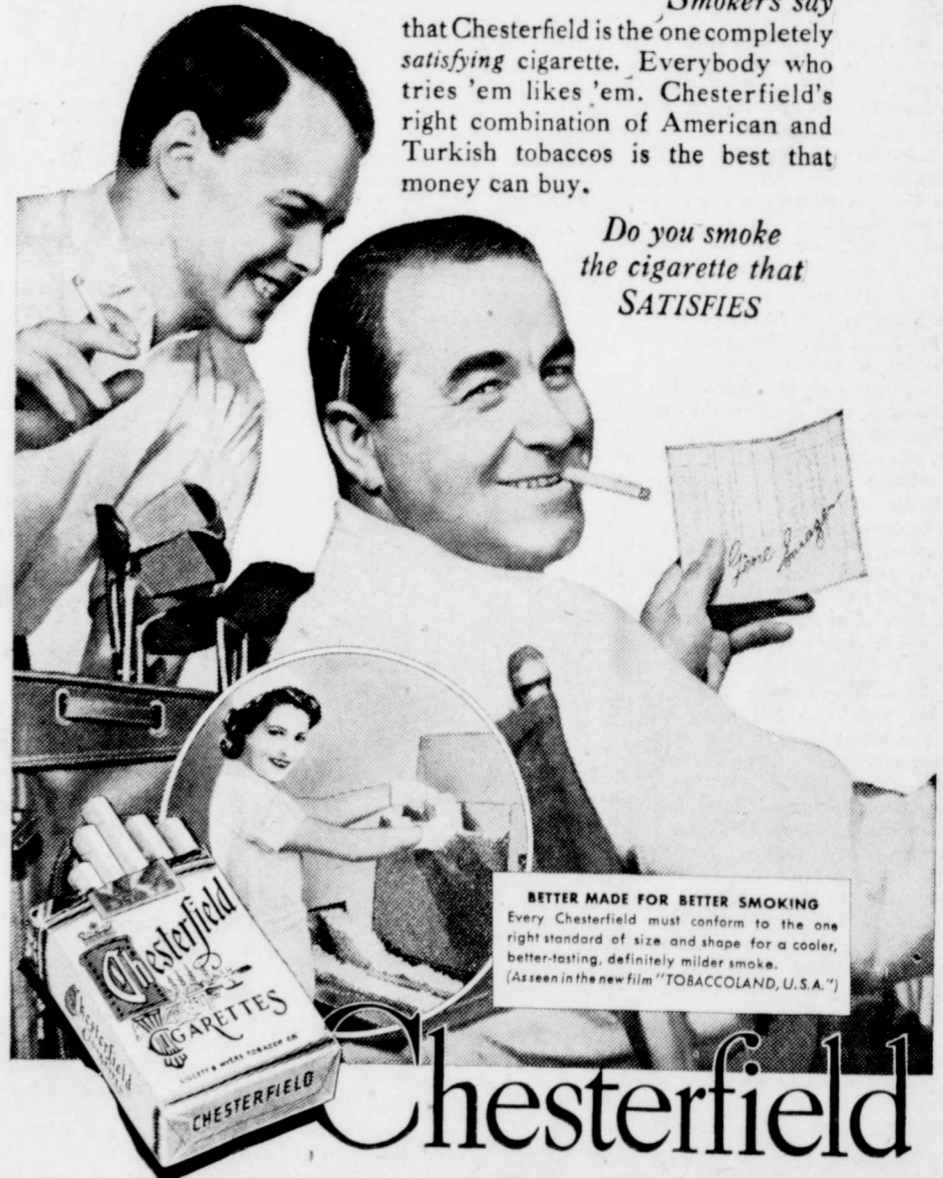


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
