Frogs Face 2 "Hot" Games in 3 Days

Longhorns to Invade T. C. U. Tomorrow—Rice, With 6 Victories, to Follow Monday

Two games in three days—one with the conference leader and the other with the hottest team in the league—is the situation that faces the Frogs tomorrow and Monday.

Topping the Southwest heap, the Longhorns move into the Basketball Gymnasium at 8 o'clock tomorrow night. They have a record of seven victories and one defeat.

Monday night at the same time, the Owls from Rice, with six straight victories, recent conquerors of Texas, move in.

The Longhorns downed the Frogs 47 to 30 in Austin Jan. 19. In an early season game, T. C. U. whipped Rice in Houston, 27 to 23. Leading the Longhorns will be John Hargis, who has 112 points, and Buck Overall, who has 89. A newcomer for the Austin team is John Langdon, a center.

Missing will be Curtis Popham, who has been called into the Army Air Corps. Co-Capt. Frank Brahaney and Jack Fitzgerald will probably round out the starting quintet for Texas.

Tomorrow night's game with the Steers will be the last for Max Humphreys, Bill Conard and Swede Peltó of the Frogs. They go into the Army Air Corps Monday.

Monday's lineup for the Frogs will probably find Harold DeLongy and either Jimmy Pattee or Bob Savage rounding out the starting team, along with Floppy Blackmon, Bob McHenry and Zeke Chronister.

For Rice it will be Bill Tom Closs—the leading scorer of the conference—Harold Lambert, Willie Croucher, John McDonald and David Cook.

Two victories for the Frogs would once again jumble up the conference picture, leaving the Purple two games from the top and Arkansas one. A split would about cinch the Frogs no worse than fourth place.

Next Friday and Saturday's games with Arkansas here will close the season for Coach Hub McQuilian's team.

Bock Advances In Table Tennis

Bill Bock defeated favored Al Roller last week in the intramural table tennis tournament, and by virtue of his victory moved into the finals against the tournament's favorite, Clarence Westapher.

'Show Goes On' Today As It Did During Last War

The show must go on. This was true of the athletic program of World War I as it is today.

The only time that the war stopped T. C. U. athletes during World War I was when the United States first got into the war. Having won all their home baseball games and lost six on "foreign" soil, the Frogs cancelled the rest of their schedule and the baseball season of 1917 ended.

In the spring of 1917 the Frogs tennis team beat the team from Texas University and won the state tennis championship.

The regular football schedule was followed in 1917. That season the Frogs lost to the Rice Owls and an all-star army team from Camp Bowie. Some freshman pre-med students and some student lawyers got together and played a football game that fall. The lawyers won the game.

During the fall of 1917 the Student Army Training course was started. There were 125 boys in this military class.

That season some of the former students were playing on the all-star football team at Camp Travis.

Dutch Meyer played end on the Frog varsity that fall.

"He was a gritty Dutchman and his smashing of end runs became a familiar sight before the season was over. Dutch could also eat his part of a forty-pound cake when the season was over. He was always good-natured but fought hard to the finish," said the 1918 Horned Frog.

In the fall of 1918 all girls in school were required to take physical training, as they are now.

Transportation problems were almost like the modern ones. The basketball game with Decatur College was postponed because trains were running about 12 hours behind schedule.

Baseball in 1918 must not have been hampered by the war, because the Frogs won the conference championship.

The army training on the campus didn't end with the Armistice. The class had its last drill Dec. 14, 1918.

LONGHORNS who will be in the starting lineup tomorrow night against the Frogs are these three boys, Frank Brahaney, Jack Fitzgerald and Buck Overall. Brahaney is co-captain of the 1943 conference leaders. Fitzgerald is not a high scorer but is valuable for his ball handling and floor game. Overall is the junior college transfer from the strong Tyler team. He is second high scorer for the Orange team behind John Hargis. Buck has 89 points for his eight games. They will start action against the Frogs at 8 p. m. tomorrow in the Basketball Gymnasium.



Bears Down "Dead" Frogs
