### Hill to Take Holiday Tomorrow For Student Body Trip to Austin

Tomorrow has been designated a holiday, so that all students and teachers who can arrange to do so may attend the T. C. U.-University of Texas football game in Austin, says President M. E. Sadler.

The decision to have a holiday for the student body trip instead of one for Thanksgiving was made by the administration in consultation with the Student Council, President Sadler adds.

Thus the official stamp of approval has been given to some 500 students who will leave for Austin in private cars, trains or in special buses.

Buses will leave the Arch at 6 a. m. tomorrow and will arrive in Austin in time for the pre-game pep rally which will be held at 12:30 a. m. at the corner of the Regatta F. Austin Hotel, according to Miss Nel Epperson, head of the band. After the pep rally, the band will lead the students in a parade through town to the football stadium.

### Plans Continue For Expansion

Committee Starts Drive For Funds for Second Half of 5-Year Program

T. C. U.'s Building Program Committee, after announcing a \$2,000,000 expansion program last week, immediately launched plans for financing the second half of the \$4,000,000 five-year improvement plan.

Later improvements will include a new science building, a field house, enlargement of the Library, and rehabilitation of the Administration Building, Brite College, and Goode and Clark halls.

The immediate program includes a new women's dormitory, a men's dormitory, warehouse and shops, fine arts building, rehabilitation of Jarvis Hall and enlargement and beautification of the Stadium.

The new women's dormitory will be erected immediately north of Foster Hall, and will be a duplicate of this building.

The men's dormitory will have the same general plans as the two housing units for women, but will be smaller, housing some 140 men. It will be built just west of Clark Hall, facing north.

The warehouse and shops will be built west of the Administration Building, on the west side of the campus, and will eventually be an architectural part of the new field house.

The fine arts building will be erected at the northeast corner of the campus, facing south, and will (Continued on Page 2)

### 4000 More Seats for Stadium

Enlargement of the Stadium calls for the raising of the east-side stands an additional 16 rows, providing seats for 4000 more spectators. Space under the new unit will be utilized for the building of rest rooms, dressing room for visiting teams and concession stands.

Beautification of the Stadium grounds will include new roads, parking areas, fences and landscaping. Later the landscaping program will be extended to include all of the main campus.

"The difficult we do immediately. The impossible may take a little longer."

That's an old Air Corps slogan that may well apply to the Horned Frogs in their grid classic with the Longhorns at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon in Austin's Memorial Stadium.

According to statistics, the task assigned Coach Dutch Meyer and his gridsters isn't difficult—it's impossible—so it may "take a little longer."

However, the same familiar cry was heard when T. C. U. handed "Rose-Bowl Bound" Texas a humiliating 14-to-7 defeat in 1941. In 1942, the underdog Frogs again embarrassed the Longhorns, 13 to 7.

In 1943, T. C. U. was embarrassed. When the final gun sounded the score was Texas 46, T. C. U. 7! Last year the Frogs again upset the highly touted Texans by a 7-to-6 decision, and went on to add insult to injury by winning the Southwest Conference Championship.

After so many kicks where it hurts most, it is no surprise to hear the tea-sippers are brewing a potent offering for tomorrow.

Since Texas and T. C. U. started their grid battles in 1897, the Horned Frogs have won 10, lost 19 and tied one. The all-time score stands Texas 485, T. C. U. 275.

In passing alone do the Frogs surpass the Longhorns this season, and the Steers balance the books by boasting the second strongest pass defense in the conference this season.

In this season's scoring, Texas leads with 177 points in eight games while the Frogs have chalked up 77 points in seven battles.

The Steers have held their foes to an average of 6.1 points per game and the Purple has allowed an average of 12.7 points a game.

There are the facts and figures. T. C. U. can't possibly win—but the "twelfth man"—nearly 500 students making the trip—will be rootin' for another surprise branding of the raging Steers.

### Plans Continue For Expansion Committee Starts Drive For Funds for Second Half of 5-Year Program

T. C. U.'s Building Program Committee, after announcing a \$2,000,000 expansion program last week, immediately launched plans for financing the second-half of the \$4,000,000 five-year improvement plan.

Later improvements will include a new science building, a field house, enlargement of the Library, and rehabilitation of the Administration Building, Brite College, and Goode and Clark halls.

The immediate program includes a new women's dormitory, a men's dormitory, warehouse and shops, fine arts building, rehabilitation of Jarvis Hall and enlargement and beautification of the Stadium.

The new women's dormitory will be erected immediately north of Foster Hall, and will be a duplicate of this building.

**Men's Dorm to House 140**  
The men's dormitory will have the same general plans as the two housing units for women, but will be smaller, housing some 140 men. It will be built just west of Clark Hall, facing north.

The warehouse and shops will be built west of the Administration Building, on the west side of the campus, and will eventually be an architectural part of the new field house.

The fine arts building will be erected at the northeast corner of the campus, facing south, and will (Continued on Page 2)

# Frogs to Shoot for 'Impossible' Victory

## Statistics Demonstrate TCU Can't Win, but 500 Fans Will Be There 'Just in Case'

"The difficult we do immediately. The impossible may take a little longer."

That's an old Air Corps slogan that may well apply to the Horned Frogs in their grid classic with the Longhorns at 2:30 o'clock tomorrow afternoon in Austin's Memorial Stadium.

According to statistics, the task assigned Coach Dutch Meyer and his gridsters isn't difficult—it's impossible—so it may "take a little longer."

However, the same familiar cry was heard when T. C. U. handed "Rose-Bowl Bound" Texas a humiliating 14-to-7 defeat in 1941. In 1942, the underdog Frogs again embarrassed the Longhorns, 13 to 7.

In 1943, T. C. U. was embarrassed. When the final gun sounded the score was Texas 46, T. C. U. 7! Last year the Frogs again upset the highly touted Texans by a 7-to-6 decision, and went on to add insult to injury by winning the Southwest Conference Championship.

After so many kicks where it hurts most, it is no surprise to hear the tea-sippers are brewing a potent offering for tomorrow.

Since Texas and T. C. U. started their grid battles in 1897, the Horned Frogs have won 10, lost 19 and tied one. The all-time score stands Texas 485, T. C. U. 275.

In passing alone do the Frogs surpass the Longhorns this season, and the Steers balance the books by boasting the second strongest pass defense in the conference this season.

In this season's scoring, Texas leads with 177 points in eight games while the Frogs have chalked up 77 points in seven battles. The Steers have held their foes to an average of 6.1 points per game and the Purple has allowed an average of 12.7 points a game.

There are the facts and figures. T. C. U. can't possibly win—but the "twelfth man"—nearly 500 students making the trip—will be rootin' for another surprise branding of the raging Steers.

## Frog Passes Backfire For 12-0 Tech Victory

A guy named Walter Schlinkman and a Homecoming-Happy Tech line played themselves a whale of a ball game in Lubbock Saturday, to spank the Frogs 12 to 0. It was the first time since the gridiron battle with Oklahoma A. & M. in the Cotton Bowl that the Purple has been held scoreless.

Ironically enough, it was the Frog passing game and best offensive weapon that gave Texas Tech its first score and set up the second Raider touchdown.

In the first two minutes of the fourth quarter, little Bennie Tidwell, 140-pound Tech left half-back, snagged one of Leon Joslin's passes on the Red Raider 30, then sprinted down the sidelines 70 yards to break the scoreless deadlock.

In another example of heads-up ball playing, Tech Center Otis Turner, with five minutes remaining to play in the final period, intercepted another Joslin heave on the Frog 35 and raced back to the Purple 20 before being hauled down.

Here Schlinkman took over. In four mighty plunges "Walloping" Walter rammed his way to the second and clinching Tech tally. Both extra point attempts failed.

However, it was actually a fighting Tech line and Schlinkman that beat the Frogs. Walter, gaining 132 of the Raiders 133 yards gained rushing, turned in an amazing performance while Tech's line kept
