Open Season on Owls Tomorrow

Rice Favored to Win, But Frogs Lay Plans To Surprise Visitors

Open season on Owls will be declared in T. C. U. Stadium at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon when the Horned Frogs ram a round into the chamber for a shot at Rice.

Rice will attempt to win the first of two necessary victories (T. C. U. and Baylor) to gain at least a tie with Texas for the 1945 conference title, or, should the Aggies trip the Longhorns, the championship.

The Owls have won the crown twice, in 1934 and in 1937. Both seasons they were defeated 7 to 2 by the Frogs.

Such a loss tomorrow will blast any chance at top honors for Rice. Though slight favorites to hand the Purple its third consecutive defeat, a Frog victory will be no great surprise.

A lot of head-knocking and careful planning has been going on down at the Stadium this week, and the potent charge of powder to be used by the Frogs tomorrow may surprise and atomize the eager Owls.

There will be a pep rally for the T. C. U.-Rice game at 7:30 o'clock tonight in the Basketball Gymnasium. A dance is scheduled for after the pep rally.

With the loss of Bob Nemir to the Navy, George Walmsley may move out from behind Huey Keeney to become his running mate instead of competitor for the same backfield post. There will be a few minor changes in the Frog starting line-up unless injured James Cooper, Beekie Ezell and Norman Morrill are ready to go.

In the way of statistics, Rice holds a slight edge in total net gains, with 2061 yards to T. C. U.'s 1759. The Frogs lead in passing, with 71 completions in 150 attempts to Rice's 30 completions in 77 tosses. Punting is just about even, with Rice having a 34.1 and T. C. U. a 34.9 yard average.

Steers Win 20 to 0 To Take First Place

The Texas Longhorns drubbed the Frogs 20 to 0 Saturday, to take undisputed lead in the conference grid race and drop T. C. U. into a fourth-place tie with S. M. U.

Bobby Lane tossed passes to Dale Schwartzkopf and H. K. Allen in the first and second quarters, respectively, to give Texas a 14-to-0 lead at the half. In the final period, Arthur Sweet drove over from the 1, to finish the scoring.

T. C. U.'s first scoring chance came late in the second quarter, when three completed passes put the Frogs on the Texas 4. Four plays later the ball was still on the Longhorn 4.

Bubba Schmid, freshman end who played a fine game Saturday, recovered a Steer fumble on the Texas 18 in the third quarter, to give the Frogs another chance.

A pass gained 10, but Allen of Texas intercepted, the next toss to halt the threat.

In the fourth, the Frogs passed their way inside the Texas 20, and again an interception broke up the attack.

A similar type of defense to that used by Texas Tech held the Pur-

ple ground game to a gross of 43 yards.

In the air, the Frogs did fairly well, but receivers were well covered by the Longhorns and were never able to break away. T. C. U. completed 12 of 27 passes for a total gain of 153 yards by the aerial route.

Texas completed two of nine attempts for 92 yards and two of its touchdowns.
