Open Season on Owls Tomorrow

Rice Favored to Win, Steers Win 20 to 0 But Frogs Lay Plans To Surprise Visitors

at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon when the Horned Frogs ram a round into the chamber for a shot at Rice.

Rice will attempt to win the first of two necessary victories (T. C. U. and Baylor) to gain at least a tie with Texas for the 1945 conference title, or, should the Aggies trip the Longhorns, the championship.
