16 Frog Favorites Chosen in Election

Two boys and two girls from each class were chosen as 1945-46 formal Frog favorites in a general student body election Tuesday.

Miss Polly Terrill, with 122 votes, and Miss Peggy Glover, with 88, were selected senior girls' favorites. Runners-up were Misses Alice Loden, 93; Therylene Knox, 90; Janet Krall, 50, and Marylou Miller, 41.

Norman Hoffman, who polled 50 votes, and Jim Jones, with 146, were named senior boys' favorites. Others who were nominated were Roy Tomlinson, 125; Earl Bissex, 90, and Clifford Taylor, 23.

Junior girls' favorites are Miss Ed Epperson, with 211 votes, and Mary Claude Scott, with 103. Runners-up were Misses Rosemary Gray, 97; Jackie Clardy, 53, and Ruth Morphis, 24.

Henry Rase, with 122 ballots cast for him, and Jesse Mason, with 106 votes in his favor, were elected junior boys' favorites. Other nominees were Beekie Ezell, 56; Bob Buschman, 56; Bryce Davis, 50; Dave Randall, 48, and Jack Kholer, 21.

Selected as sophomore girls' favorites were Miss Kay Sims, with 119 votes, and Miss Elizabeth Sims, with 94. Runners-up were Misses Peggy Simms, 77; Kathryn Dent, 65; Smokey Moore, 56; Elizabeth Griffith, 38, and Charlotte Childress, 35.

Harry Mullens, with 208 votes, and Bill Craft, with 75, were elected sophomore boys' favorites. Others who were nominated were Leon Smith, 73; Leroy Pasco, 56; James Cooper, 49; John Cooke, 47, and Bob Ruff, 17.

Miss Pat Perkins, with 95 votes, and Miss Pat Timbes, with 93, were elected freshman girls' favorites, winning over Misses Ruth Hankersley, 84 votes; Jean Webb,

83; Betty Mosley, 68; Beverly Chambers, 37, and Billie Weachman, 20.

George Mitcham, who received 160 votes, and Carl Koch, who had 99, were chosen freshman boys' favorites. Runners-up were Billy Joe Smith, 79; Bob Young, 74, and Lawrence Bridges, 46.

Dean Moore Chairman Of Planning Committee For Diamond Anniversary

Texas Christian University will celebrate its Diamond Jubilee in the spring of 1948 with an appropriate program of commemoration and celebration.

The Horned Frog Band left for Temple this morning, where the organization will play a concert this afternoon for the wounded veterans at McCloskey Hospital.

The 60 members of the band are making the trip in cars furnished by the Red Cross. They will have dinner at the hospital and return to Fort Worth this evening.

"The band is making the trip at the request of the wounded veterans themselves," reports Director Leon Breeden.

"Numerous men from the hospital have heard the band play at the football games here and at the Texas game in Austin. McCloskey officials tell us that their reports were so enthusiastic that the other veterans decided they wanted to hear the band too. So a special request was made that the Horned Frog Band be invited down for a concert."

It is also unusual for such a large organization to visit the hospital, Breeden says, because of the transportation problem involved.

"We consider it quite a compliment to the Horned Frog Band to be asked by the wounded veterans to come to McCloskey for the concert," he concludes.

Needed: One Election

Running elections over is getting to be a habit on the campus.

The last two student elections have been recalled because of an infraction of constitutional law, or because of some irregularity in the election procedure. It might also be noted that in those elections only about 250 of a student body of 1300 bothered to cast a ballot.

Considering these facts and the useless delay of time and effort incurred by them, it is obvious that a better system of running student body elections should be planned—a system organized so that any electioneering at the polls, the confusion as to student qualifications and the general unenlightened and uninterested student attitude toward elections themselves may be eliminated.

To arouse student interest in elections, a publicity campaign comparable to one put on for a class dance might be the solution. Student campaigns for offices would arouse interest in elections and result in an active class leadership.

To avoid technical difficulties in running off elections, the posting of election rules a week before the actual voting date should give dissenters time enough to voice their complaints without necessitating a complete re-election.

Though comparatively few students are concerned with elections judging from the number who actually vote, elections as a form of student expression are important.

Navy Leaves USS Clark Hall

Crew to Weigh Anchor At 4:30 P. M. for New Port After T. C. U. Hitch

"The skipper is always last to leave his ship," says Lt. C. M. Schmidt, who is still awaiting final orders to abandon the USS Clark Hall.

At 4:30 o'clock this afternoon, the last order will be given, the last sea bag loaded for shipping, and the remnants of the "dry-land navy" will up anchor and head for another port.

Only four are left of the crew that saw 754 V-12ers pass through the portals of higher learning, and one of those, Chief Yeoman Gillette is on his way to Terminal Island, Calif., to receive his discharge. "The Chief" has in addition to his hitch at T. C. U., 19 months of overseas duty to his credit.

Lt. Schmidt, who took over the command Aug. 20 after Lt. George C. Decker was transferred to another unit, SK 2/c "Smokey" Guise, PhM 1/c Robert Brotherton, will probably leave today.

Storekeeper Grammar, who received his discharge and left the Hill in October, has gone back to his career as a lawyer and is now in Chicago. Lt. Comdr. J. E. Ross, who was with the first ship's company that came to the campus, has been discharged and left Oct. 31 for Henderson, to continue his practice there.

"Smokey" Guise summed up the months spent at Frogland with this, "The Navy was never like this!"

TCU, SMU to Fight It Out in Air

Both Elevens Boast Top Passing Attack

The greatest aerial battle of the 1945 football season may take place when the Horned Frogs and S. M. U.'s Mustangs take off against each other at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon down Stadium way, before a capacity Homecoming crowd.

Boasting one of finest backs in the conference in Freshman Doak Walker, former Dallas Highland Park star, the Ponies take the field against the Frogs at least one touchdown favorite after their 34-to-0 victory over Baylor.

T. C. U. will go into the game for the first time this season in something approaching good physical condition. Center James Cooper and Ends Beekie Ezell, Merle Gibson and Bubba Schmid will be ready for action. S. M. U. reports Linden Davis, regular Mustang back, is definitely out of the battle because of a broken thumb suffered in the Baylor tilt.

Tomorrow's contest will be the 28th between the two clubs. The Frogs have won 12, lost 11 and four others have been ties. In 1943, when the Frogs last played S. M. U. in Fort Worth, the Mustangs won 20 to 0 and gained a tie for third place in the conference grid race.

"Golden Toe" Halley Mullins kicked the Rice Owls out of the race for the No. 1 spot in final Conference football standings Saturday and gave the Horned Frogs a well deserved 14 to 13 victory. It was the third one-point victory of the season for the Frogs as they came from behind twice to trounce the Cinderella team of the conference.

First-quarter play was about even and ended in a scoreless tie.

As the second quarter opened, an exchange of punts ended with the Frogs in possession on the 4. Jesse Mason booted out and Walmesley ran it back 45 yards for the first touchdown. "Mickey" Macaluso converted.

Highly insulted, the Frogs took the kick-off on their 41 and marched to a touchdown, mostly on Leon Joslin's passing. Joslin tossed to Fred Taylor on the Rice 46, ran end for 6, passed to Merle Gibson for 13, then again to Gibson who ran to the 3.

Norman Cox hit right tackle for the touchdown and Mullins added the extra point.

As soon as T. C. U. got the ball in the third period, the Frogs drove 50 yards on runs by Gus Bierman, Mullins and Elwood "Bulldozer" Turner, but Rice halted the march on its 2.

Another exchange of punts found the Frogs in possession on the Owl 43, but Mason fumbled and August Erfurth recovered for Rice on its own 39. From here the Owls, on runs by Erfurth and Keeney and passes by Jess Mason, marched to a touchdown. Keeney carried the last 17 yards on a brilliant run over right guard and

Macaluso's try for extra point was blocked.

Rice kicked off, and four plays later the, by this time, extremely insulted Frogs had another touchdown, an extra point and a ball game. Joslin tossed a 49-yard pass to Jimmy Jones, who was dropped on the 12. "Bulldozer" Turner, in three plunges, went over for the score and Mullins kicked the point.

The fourth period was highlighted by the sheer intestinal fortitude plunges of Turner, who, along with Koch, Mullins and Joslin, not only held the ball, but carried the attack to the Owls.
