### Student Meet To Feature New 'Brainstorming' Idea

The first of the proposed annual All-School Leadership Conferences will be held in Brownwood this weekend.

Attending the conference will be Student Congress and Activities Council members and representatives from various campus clubs and organizations.

The main feature of the conference will be the introduc-

tion of "brainstorming." Student Association President Jerry Johnson, Arlington Heights, Ill. senior explains brainstorming as "a new technique of thinking and planning which has proved very valuable in bringing out fresh ideas." This technique will be taught by Dr. J. Morgan of the Texas A&M Extension Department in a 9 p.m. session today.

#### PICK 'EM UP

Candidates who turned in pictures to the Election Committee for the fall elections may pick them up at the Student Congress office, Room 211 of the Student Center.

They may be picked up between the hours of 8-11 a.m. and 2-4 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays or between 1-3 p.m. Wednesday.

"Brainstorming" will be put into practice at the conference tomorrow afternoon at 3:45. The technique will be used in exploring and discussing a new spring activity for the campus.

The conference kick-off talk will be given at 7 tonight by the Rev. R. W. Jablonowski of St. Stephen Presbyterian Church.

Following the kick-off talk, L. C. White, business manager here at TCU, will speak to the group on "University Financing".

After the 9 p.m. "brainstorming" talk, the leaders will break into small groups. Specific groups are Student Congress, Activities Council and club interest groups. This will be the final session today.

Meetings will get under way early tomorrow morning. Breakfast will be served at 7 a.m. At 8:15 President D. Ray Lindley will address the group on "The Responsibility of Student Self-Government".

Immediately following, Johnson will speak on "The Student's Role in College Policy Making". He will also include his ideas of a "Committee for Greater TCU".

Following a short break, Dr. Lindley, Assistant Dean of Women Joanne James, Dean of Students Lawrence Smith and Dean



Major Horace L. Cone, officer training specialist, will talk with potential applicants in Room 217 in the Student Center. from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m.

The training program is open to men and women from 20-27 years of age with a college degree.

# Chance Pays Off for Sledge

Two weeks ago when first string quarterback Larry Dawson received a knee injury in the Texas Tech game, it posed quite a problem for Coach Abe Martin.

With the crucial Texas A&M game coming up, he didn't know whether to use second-unit quarterback, Donald George at the starting spot or to dig deeper for a signal-caller.

Since George had been doing a good job in directing the alternate team, Martin decided to give Jack Sledge a promotion from the third unit.

The slim, redheaded quarterback came to TCU with great offensive promise. As a high school star at New London he played under Coach Martin in the high school All-Star game at Lubbock in 1956. His performance there earned him the most valuable player award and convinced Martin that he was a top college prospect.

That fall, the soft spoken East Texan entered Frogland and led the freshmen to a conference championship. In his varsity debut as a sophomore he played only 83 minutes. The main reason for this was the offensive

change Coach Martin made. He put the emphasis on power and defense. Jack wasn't fast enough to play safety man on defense and didn't have the strong arm for long passes.

His junior year he got behind Hunter Ennis, Dawson and George. Later in the year he decided to skip play altogether and thus was a holdout. This decision means that he'll have another year of varsity eligibility.

Up to last Saturday, Jackie was still "warming" the bench and then he got his chance. He definitely made the chance payoff for both himself and the Frogs.

Starting the Aggie contest with

his oldmates whom he played with as a freshman, everything went right. His play selection kept the Cadets completely baffled on defense and the Frogs broke out of their four-game touchdown drouth

Directing the Purple on five possessions during the game, Sledge guided his rejuvenated mates to three touchdowns in the 39-6 Aggie rout.

This fine showing gives Sledge the starting role again tomorrow afternoon when TCU journeys to Pittsburgh for a bout with the Panthers.

### Football Fantastic

In 1934, the longest touchdown run on record was reeled off by Snooks Dowd, an unknown back from Lehigh University.

Dowd became confused and headed the wrong way. After crossing his own goal, he realized the mistake and circled the end zone and reversed his run, racing 100 yards for a Lehigh score. His amazing run totaled 210 yards.



Many of the Eastern sportswriters are booming Tonic, the 5-11, 180 pound passing wizard for All-America honors. The scribes think he is better at throwing the pigskin than the top passers, quarterback Ivan of SMU.

Pittsburgh fans are of the same opinion. They have plenty to back their ideas up with when lauding Tonic. The little passing master has used the pass 97 times in five games and connected on 44 throws for 533 yards.

All hands in the TCU camp are expected to be back in working order tomorrow for the 1:30 p.m. kickoff in Pitt Stadium.

One very good reason why TCU once again looms as a conference threat lies in the dancing toes of Harry Moreland.


During the second quarter of the TCU-Texas A&M tilt, Moreland rounded right end and did a sideline dance while slipping out of the arms of two
