Trustees Raise Tuition, Rent

The TCU Board of Trustees voted Wednesday to increase tuition and fees as a means of supporting their goal for a "greatly improved faculty and staff compensation" by 1975.

Trustees set three new student charges to begin next fall. Tuition has been raised to \$60 per semester hour for all students enrolling for the first time as compared to the \$50 that is being charged now.

There will be a new General University Fee of \$30 per semester for each full-time student and \$6 per course for part-time students. It is intended to help defray costs for such things as special library holdings, specialized laboratory facilities and University scholarships.

The change that may bring about the most protest from students is the increase of \$20 to \$25 per semester in residence hall

room rentals. Rates will range from \$200 to \$250 per semester as opposed to the \$180 to \$225 presently charged.

In raising tuition for new students, the Board voted to continue TCU's guaranteed tuition plan which assures students and parents that their tuition will not be increased for four academic years. This means that student's now at TCU will not pay a higher tuition rate. Therefore, the Uni-

versity will not gain fully the benefit of higher tuition income for four years.

"Particularly during times of inflation, the guaranteed tuition plan works to our financial disadvantage," Chancellor James Moudy said. "But we think this is more than offset by the assurance we can give students and parents. External forces might cause us to abandon the guaranteed tuition plan in the future,

but we hope more normal conditions will return soon."

The Trustees all agreed that there needs to be a major raise in the level of faculty and staff salaries at TCU. The Board adopted a goal of bringing "faculty and staff compensation up to competitive levels by 1975," a goal first recommended by Chancellor Moudy in his state of the University address in September.

Services Set For Coed Kathryn Hay

Mary Kathryn Hay, 21, a senior at TCU, died early yesterday morning in a local hospital. Funeral services will be at University Christian Church at 10 a.m. Saturday.

Miss Hay, 3800 Glenmont in Fort Worth, was a member of Delta Gamma Sorority, Alpha Lambda Delta, and Young Republicans.

She left school last week feeling ill and was hospitalized Wednesday for what was diagnosed as infectious hepatitis. According to Mrs. Helen Williams, of the TCU Health Center, Miss Hay had never been a patient at the campus health center.

Dr. Ed Etier, Jr., athletic team physician, said the disease cannot be spread through the air and can only be passed on by direct contact. He stressed there is no need for panic since proper precautions have been taken.

'Century' Coffer Half Full

Citing the most recent gift of \$300,000 from the Carter Foundation, Chancellor J.M. Moudy announced TCU reached its half-way mark in the "43 by '73" campaign Wednesday night.

Having gathered \$21.5 million in the first two years of the four-year New Century Campaign the University kicked off the third-quarter phase of the drive with a dinner program attended by nearly 400 persons at Ridglea Country Club.

Dr. Moudy also introduced William C. (Bill) Conner, vice-chairman of the Board of Trustees, who is taking the reins of the new phase. Retiring chairman of the drive, Beeman Fisher, was honored with the title Founding Chairman.

The dinner, held not only to honor the leadership of the New Century Campaign, but as an integral part of that campaign itself, was followed by perhaps one of the most inspiring "PR"

shows the University has put together.

A dual-screened, stereo sound slide show, "TCU Sights and Sounds" began with pictures of Sadler Hall, strains of the alma mater, and action shots of the Horned Frogs. The finale was juxtaposed frames of commencement exercises with the Vietnam conflict, plus additional pictures of ghetto areas and slums, with air pollution. Immediate reaction was evident on the faces of the guests, but the true impact should come in future donations to TCU.

Robert A. Smalley, president of Hertz, Inc., keynoted the affair with a speech on the coalition of two "number one's": TCU and Hertz.

Dr. Moudy also recognized three other recent gifts that pushed TCU over the half-way hill. Mrs. L. A. Nordan of San Antonio, long connected with the support of TCU, contributed

\$935,000 in memory of her husband, Dr. Nordan, to perpetuate the interest of the couple in fine arts at TCU.

Dr. and Mrs. Hugh Wolfe of Stephenville committed not less than \$500,000 for the benefit of Brite Divinity School.

The other gift is in the form of an estate settlement, in excess of \$200,000, the details of which

will be made public later.

The drive for \$43 million by 1973, TCU's centennial year, represents the largest goal ever set for a four-year campaign by a private university in the Southwest. Of this total, roughly half is sought for endowment, \$12.8 million for capital construction and \$5 million for annual operations.

Construction Management Course To Be Offered

A Distinguished Accountants Program, designed to attract outstanding professional accountants and accounting scholars to Texas Christian University, is being inaugurated by TCU's M. J. Neeley School of Business.

Individuals selected for the program will present major papers, conduct seminars and colloquia or teach at the University. General theme for the continu-

ing program is "Accounting in Society."

Initial presentation is set for today and will feature John L. Carey, former executive director and administrative vice president of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

The session will be at 1:45 p.m. in lecture hall 2 of the Sid W. Richardson Physical Sciences Building.

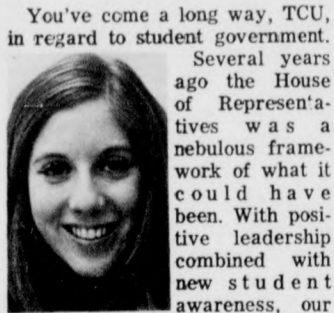

'Lowe' Road Is House's Way Up

ROUTT You've come a long way, TCU, in regard to student government. Several years ago the House of Representatives was a nebulous framework of what it could have been. With positive leadership combined with new student awareness, our student government is now beginning to be a force 'he administration must reckon with.

There seems to be only one presidential candidate in today's runoff election—Tom Lowe—who recognizes and has been actively involved with the evolution of our student government. Evidence of his understanding of 'he maturation of the House can be found in his campaign slogan: "TCU Student Government is Ready to Come of Age."

Lowe's involvement in committees ranging from the chairmanship of the House Academic Affairs Committee to chairmanship of 1971 Homecoming certainly are indicative of his active participation in student affairs.

Perspective Vital

On the other hand, Lowe's opponent, Jody Ambrose, in his campaign slogan "Communication with Commitment" seems to lack the necessary perspective for the present position of House president.

For example, Ambrose supports the pass-fail grading system. However, Lowe who was responsible for its passage in the House last year calls for its implementation.

What we, as students, are being asked to choose between today are two candidates who see the role of student government from distinctly separate viewpoints.

"Communication with Commitment"—what exactly does that mean? Certainly all the candidates were committed or they never would have run for office. No one could deny that a student leader should be committed to the student government cause.

Some have called this election an issue-less one. This is a misnomer since issues such as the Bill of Rights, speaker policy, class preregistration, and curriculum and requirement reform vitally affect the present and future student.

Lowe Follow-Through

Both candidates have expressed support of these issues. However, Lowe has asked the student body to elect him so that the proposals he has already started can be lifted off desks and into action.

Starting from scratch with Ambrose would be wasting students' time.

A fellow House member of Lowe's, Eric Smylie, himself a presidential hopeful, has official-

ly thrown his support to Lowe, citing Lowe's necessary qualifications and experience.

We agree. Let's elect a president who can build on the successes of the past administration in which he played a significant

role. Let us elect a president whose goals go further than "Communication with Commitment."

Yes, TCU student government has come a long way. Better yet—it's ready to come of age.

Symphony To Present Century-Old 'Coppelia'

One of the oldest ballets in existence, more than 100 years old, will be presented by the Fort Worth Symphony.

Two performances of "Coppelia" or "The Girl With the Enamel Eyes" are scheduled at Tarrant County Convention Center at 8:15 p.m. Sat., Nov. 20, and 2:30 p.m. Sun., Nov. 21.

This ballet, which is included in the repertoire of ballet centers such as the Royal Ballet in England and the American Ballet Theater in New York, will include many TCU students in its performance here.

Fernando Schaffenburg, director of the Ballet Division at TCU, described the basic story outline as the story of a girl, Swanhilda, and her fiance, Franz, and the conflict that ensues because Franz believes he has fallen in love with another girl.

The final act is the scene of a great party during which Franz and Swanhilda are married. Included in this is a play with characters such as "War" and "Prayer." The work ends in a

general tone of happiness.

Players with major roles include Nancy Schaffenburg, as Swanhilda; Royes Fernandez, guest dancer and star of the American Ballet Theater, as Franz; and Zac Ward, graduate student at TCU, as Dr. Coppelius.

Others include Barbara Copeland, assistant director of the Ballet Division as "War"; and Thomas Nicholson, a Norden scholarship recipient, as another "War." Wayne Soulant, an instructor of ballet at TCU, is another character in the "play" scene, as is Kathy Ward, gradu-

ate student. Two Norden scholarship winners, Annette and Karen Peterson, alternate as "Prayer."

Schaffenburg is directing the company in this work. The technical director is James C. Monroe, of the TCU Theater Department. The scenes were designed by James Greenleaf III, a TCU graduate student, and executed by the Peter Wolf Studio of Dallas.

Tickets can be purchased at the Scott Theater box office and the Central Ticket Agency. Prices are two, three, four and five dollars.

Coach Tommy Runnels takes his TCU freshmen football team to Dallas this afternoon for their season finale. The Wogs are coming off a hard-fought game with the Texas Shorthorns and Runnels hopes his squad will go into the SMU game as fired up as they were against Texas.

"If we play like we did against Texas its going to be a heckuva ball game," said Runnels.

The SMU Colts are also coming off a big game. The Colts blasted Baylor 40-21 in their last outing.

"SMU has several outstanding players," said Runnels. "They've got a kid playing quarterback that really makes things happen."

The Colt signal caller, John Blackburn, played high school ball at Dallas Thomas Jefferson

Both squads are 2-2 for the season and will be battling to finish with a win. The kick-off is set for 2 p.m. in SMU's Ownby Stadium. The game will be broadcast by KTCU 89.1 FM.

Local basketball fans will get a chance to preview the 1971-72 TCU basketball teams Tuesday night when the Horned Frogs take on the Wogs in the fourth annual Amos Melton Scholarship Game.

Tickets for the 7:30 p.m. contest at Daniel-Meyer Coliseum are available from TCU Lettermen's Association members, from various Fort Worth merchants, and at Daniel-Meyer. The ticket plus 25 cents will admit persons to the game. TCU students will be admitted free upon presentation of I.D. cards.

The defending Southwest Conference champion Frogs return four starters from last year's squad, including Simpson Degrate, Ricky Hall, James "Snake" Williams and Jim Ferguson.

Six additional lettermen will be back with the Frogs this season,

too, including senior Evans Royal who is expected to start at the post position. Junior Mark Stone will back Royal up.

Hall and Degrate will get starting nods at forwards where depth will be provided by sophomore Rosey Brown, junior John Hurdle and senior Jimmy Parker.

Williams and Ferguson will handle the guard spots and will be backed up by redshirt Herb Stephens and senior Tim McClendon.

Top players for the freshmen are 6-6 center Chuck Elsey and guards Dickie Walker and Eddy Fitzgugh.

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TCU-Rice

Home Finale Tomorrow For '71 Football Squad

The TCU Horned Frogs play their final home game of the season tomorrow afternoon in Amon Carter Stadium, hosting the Rice Owls in an important Southwest Conference contest.

The Frogs must have a victory in their remaining two outings to retain at least a chance for a tie for the league championship.

Owls Want Win

Meanwhile, Rice, already eliminated from title contention, will be eager to get back on the winning track, having lost each of their last two games (Arkansas and A&M) in the final minute of play.

TCU is now 4-4-1 on the season and 3-2 in SWC play. Rice is 2-6-1 overall and 1-3-1 in league games.

In the TCU-Rice battle last year, the Owls pulled out a vic-

tory with a 31-yard field goal in the final 26 seconds of the game. Trailing 14-0 at halftime, TCU had rallied to take a 15-14 edge only to fall 17-15.

Also on the line tomorrow will be a home game winning streak for the Frogs. The Purples are unbeaten this season on their home grass, having downed UTA, Texas A&M and Texas Tech while tying Oklahoma State.

Injuries Plague Frogs

TCU will be without the services of senior defensive tackle Craig Fife due to a knee injury and safety Harold Muckleroy is again doubtful with vision problems. Fullback Bobby Davis is also questionable with a hamstring pull and defensive end Bob Schobel is reported to be hobbling on a bad ankle.

However, starting halfback Steve Patterson and backup defensive tackle Rob Richey have both recovered from an apparent case of food poisoning which caused them to miss the Texas game last week.

Kickoff time is 2 p.m. with a crowd of around 20,000 expected. Humble will broadcast the game over KFJZ radio in Fort Worth and on 20 other regional stations.

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
