

University role traced

History, growth topics

Dr. William E. Tucker, dean of Brite Divinity School, traced for the Fall Convocation Tuesday in Ed Landreth Auditorium the role

of the University throughout its history.

He commented on its educational purpose and growth. "Let me introduce myself,"

Dr. Tucker began, "I am Texas Christian University." Impersonating TCU, Dr. Tucker commented on several points as if he were the University itself.

He explained, "People and institutions are just about alike in their response to the new and the different."

Change

Dr. Tucker followed the University from its beginning at Thorp Spring to the present. As the University grew, he said, so did problems.

"Change left me dizzy, but the alternative was death." But, Dr. Tucker said, "Long ago I realized the impossibility of pleasing everybody."

The University, said Dr. Tucker, "does not wish to turn the clock back and revert to a simpler order."

Commenting on the purpose of education, Dr. Tucker said no matter how well an education provides for material success, "we can ill afford to imprison education within a narrow utilitarianism."

Greater Whole

Dr. Tucker continued, "Generally speaking, the whole of a thing is equal to the sum of its parts, but in a University the whole should be greater than the sum of its parts."

Chancellor James M. Moudy

introduced Dr. Tucker, who attended Atlantic Christian College, Yale University, and Brite Divinity School.

"It's been said," Moudy noted,

"that Bill Tucker was the best student who ever went through Brite. Which always makes me feel bad, because I went through Brite."

Columbia official gives nod to campus gay lib lounge

NEW YORK (AP)—Columbia College Dean Peter Pouncey announced recently he agreed that homosexuals are as much entitled to a "minority lounge" as are blacks, Latins and Asians.

The other minorities have separate lounges recognized by the undergraduate college of Columbia University, but Gay Liberation leaders have charged they were being denied the same recognition.

A lounge frequented by homosexuals has been functioning at Columbia, but without official recognition.

Pouncey said he wanted to clarify his position on the issue and added: "I acknowledge the validity of the claim to parity between the gay lounge and the ethnic lounges, to the extent that it is a facility providing a social focus on campus for a minority which has been, and is, seriously discriminated against by society at large."

Faculty, students retreat to Oklahoma

The 1972 University retreat, a conference of students, faculty, administrators and trustees, will be Friday and Saturday at Lake Murray Lodge in Ardmore, Okla.

The conference is designed to provide the student with as much information as possible concerning the operation of the University.

All student offices and organizations will be represented. Any student wishing to make the trip should apply at the University Programs and Services Office. Acceptance will depend on the amount of space available.

No transportation will be provided by the University, so those needing transportation should be at the Student Center prior to noon Friday in order to secure rides.

The first program, an introduction to the retreat, is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. Friday. Then the first of four two-hour discussion sessions will begin (two sessions Friday and two Saturday).

Choose Topics

Participants will choose one of four discussion topics at each

session. Friday's topics are: trustee selection—method and consequence, endowment and financial costs, curriculum—requirements and change and University programs and services.

Friday's sessions will be separated by dinner. The topic for discussion during dinner will be "Priorities and the Centennial."

Rap Session

Following the second discussion session Chancellor James M. Moudy will hold a "rap session" with students.

Saturday's events will begin with breakfast, followed by the first of two Saturday sessions. The four topics to be considered are: counseling—academic and psychological, housing—costs and programs, administrative services and bookstore and food services. As with the previous sessions each participant will select one topic for consideration.

Faculty and administrators will serve as panel members for the discussion sessions.

At the end of the last Saturday

session lunch will be served. Topic for discussion during lunch will be "University Committees." The conference is scheduled to adjourn at 2 p.m.

News digest

LAREDO, Tex.—A group of black airmen locked themselves inside a mess hall at Laredo Air Force Base for eight hours Tuesday to protest alleged mistreatment on and off base.

Base officials said the men voluntarily agreed to leave the building after lengthy discussions with their commander. Details were not available at once.

President Nixon is scheduled to land at the base Friday during his Texas tour.

WASHINGTON—President Nixon's proposed \$250-billion spending ceiling appeared Tuesday to have the votes to clear the House Ways and Means Committee.

Contributing to the margin were some Democrats who said they would vote for the limit, but were not happy about relinquishing congressional control over the purse-strings and wanted to know who would advise the President which programs to cut back.

SAIGON—The U.S. 7th

Fleet joined in support of South Vietnamese troops Tuesday along the northern coast in a drive aimed at checking North Vietnamese assaults that have overrun one district town and three hamlets in the last four days.

Hundreds of South Vietnamese reinforcements were reported to have embarked on a new sweep in Quang Ngai Province to save Mo Duc, the largest of 10 districts with a population of more than 100,000.

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.—The annual U.N. General Assembly opened on Tuesday to a call from its new president for an end to the war in Vietnam and advice from a subordinate body to keep U.S. troops in Korea.

Deputy Foreign Minister Stanislaw Trepczynski of Poland, in a speech prepared for delivery after his election as president, said the war in Indochina "cannot be justified any longer on logical grounds" and "violates every rule of ethics."

We feel the University guidelines should not limit visitation but give the authority to the hall councils to set up a visitation plan appropriate to respective dorm needs.

The University has prepared a set of guidelines and expects the residence halls to abide by them whether the guidelines are suitable to the needs of the dorms or not.

Three Days

The guidelines state a maximum of three days visitation per week is allowed for each dorm. Visitation hours cannot begin before late afternoon, except weekends, and must end before women's residence hall closing hours on weekdays and Sundays, and by 1 a.m. on Fridays and Saturdays.

The most vocal disagreement has emerged from the walls of Tom Brown. The dorm has submitted a proposal asking for a complete change in the guidelines.

Roger Fowler, Tom Brown president, said the dorm is asking for the right to choose the hours and number of days per week for visitation. Last year, there were no restrictions placed on open houses and the program was very successful with very

few violations, Fowler emphasized.

Rick Cassavant, president of Pete Wright, said he doesn't see why the University has to set the visitation guidelines. "The dorms have different personalities and should be able to establish their own guidelines,"

Coed Studying

Cassavant said one purpose of visitation is "to facilitate coed studying."

Last year when Pete Wright was on a seven-day visitation program, Cassavant explained, there were few violations and the atmosphere was more natural and relaxed.

In April, 1971, the maximum number of days for visitation was five per week—even more than the University has set up for this year.

If the maximum number of visitation days per week has to be decreased, we are going in the wrong direction.

William "Buzz" Crist, area coordinator for the Residential Living and Housing Office, said the office is presently considering the Tom Brown proposal.

The dorm residents want the right to determine their own guidelines for visitation. Who knows better what kind of

guidelines are needed and wanted than the persons to whom they will apply?

We urge the administration to approve the Tom Brown proposals, but more than that, to give the hall councils the authority to determine for themselves their own guidelines for visitation—guidelines which will be workable and functional for the atmosphere, life style and personality of each dorm.—N.L.

'Fourposter' flowers with wit, warmth

Opening night of the comedy "The Fourposter" contained some surprises for all who attended.

The plot follows the lives of a man and woman from their wedding night until they finally leave their old house forty years later. The entire action takes place in the bedroom. Since there are only two characters, they must have excellent timing and play at peak performance at all times for the play to be a total success.

At the beginning, it looked as if this was not to be the case. Neither of the characters (played by Suzanne Morgan and Lee Ritchey) were at all natural for the first two scenes and they spent the entire time enunciating at each other. Mrs. Morgan was the first to recover from this condition and steadily increased the quality of her performance to an excellent handling of the final scene. She is a talented actress with excellent control of her delivery.

Ritchey displayed an interesting quality. The story requires the actors to age 40 years during the performance. Although he could not seem to handle a portrayal of a man his own age, he was quite convincing and natural as the middle-aged husband. Moreover, his talents as a comedy actor did not make

themselves known until he played the old man—a role in which he apparently felt more natural.

After Mrs. Morgan and Ritchey had settled into their roles, the natural wit and warmth of Jan de Hartog's play came through to those who watched.

"The Fourposter" is a technically difficult play to carry off. In this respect, the production deserves much praise. Elaborate set and costume changes must be done in a very limited amount of time. Congratulations are in order for James Monroe for his excellent set.

LaLonnie Lehman deserves credit for the costuming. Not only was it beautiful, but it was constantly an excellent example of clothing of the period.

Southwest Conference roundup

TCU's opening football opponent, the University of Indiana, has already earned one grid victory. The Hoosiers, down 10 points in the fourth quarter, fought back for a resounding 27-23 win over Big Ten rival Minnesota.

The Horned Frogs travel to Bloomington Ind., this week to

take on the Hoosiers Saturday afternoon.

Other games involving SWC teams this weekend find Oklahoma State at Arkansas, Missouri at Baylor, Houston at Tulsa, Clemson at Rice, SMU at Florida, Miami at Texas, Texas A&M at LSU, and Texas Tech at

New Mexico.

How did Rice coach Al Conover celebrate that opening victory over Houston last week? "By visiting 14 high schools on Monday," he said. "I want to strike while we've got things going our way."

Georgia coach Vince Dooley checked the statistics after the 24-14 victory over Baylor (Baylor led in first downs, 20-12, and in total offense, 314-267) and asked, "Who won this game?"

Jim Carlen's one-word analysis of Texas Tech's offensive explosion in that 45-2 victory over Utah: "Speed." The Tech coach pointed out that Tech wasn't able to turn the corner last year as the Raiders averaged 170.9 yards rushing. Saturday the Raiders rushed for 481 yards, had a total offense of 615, using the new ten-yards-and-a-cloud-of-dust offense.

Of 76 offensive plays run by the Raiders, no less than 28 gained ten or more yards. And the average distance covered on Tech's six touchdowns was a mere 42 yards. There were runs of 79, 56, 38, 25, 24, 23 and 20 yards

during the game, a couple of 20-yard passes—plus Quintin Robison's 79-yard interception return for a touchdown.
