## House officer elections today

### President

The president's duties are: to serve as chief executive of the student body and chairman of the Executive Board; to preside over all regular and called meetings of the House; to chair the student delegation to other official University bodies, or to delegate this duty; to call the House to

special session; to recommend removal by the House of any member thereof for incompetence, negligence of duty, or conduct unbecoming a student officer; to countersign all checks disbursing money from the Student Body Fund; to serve as official representative of the

student body except in those instances in which the House may choose others to act in such capacity for special events; to cast a vote in the House in the event of a tie; and to perform any and all duties properly incumbent to the student body.



**BRUCE GIBSON**

Gibson's listed qualifications are: experience in University Council, Faculty Senate Liaison, House of Student Representatives, officer in his dorm council, Evening College Council officer, co-chairman of Student Regulations Committee and chairman of the Evening College Activities and Planning Committee.

His platform: improving parking conditions, giving students the right to decide whether they want a yearbook or a magazine, protecting the privileges of dorm students and expanding student rights and freedoms.



**JIM MARSTON**

Marston's listed qualifications are: two terms in the House of Student Representatives, member of Student Programming Board, member of Courses of Study Committee, member of Student Affairs Committee, chairman of Dormitory Problems Committee.

His platform: more options in campus living, including coed dorms; improved parking regulations; re-evaluation of meal ticket program; elimination of excessive spending of money by the House; abolishment of chapter room rent; a more responsive House; more access to the administration; more freedom for student publications, speakers and entertainment.

### Vice President

The vice president's duties are: to assume the duty of acting president in the event of the absence of the president; to assume the office and title of president with all powers and duties pertaining thereto in the event of the

inability of the president to serve his elected term and to serve in this capacity for the remainder of the unexpired term; to serve as a delegate to other official bodies of the University where necessary or to delegate this duty; to

serve as chairman of the Administrative Cabinet and to supervise and coordinate the activities of the Cabinet with the approval of the president; to act as regular voting member of the House; and to perform additional duties.



**KAREN DAYTON**

Miss Dayton's listed qualifications are: Colby representative for two years, secretary and co-chairman of the Elections Committee, chairman of the price reductions board, secretary of the Bill of Rights Committee, member of internal affairs, Campus Alumni Board member, Public Relations, Spirit Committee member, International Students Committee member, Campus Crusade for Christ, Delta Delta Delta sorority member, TCU recruiting and Bryson Club member.

Her platform: to complete parking revision, change meal ticket policies, review core curriculum, to re-evaluate the pass-no credit system and to strengthen the Student Bill of Rights.



**BOB STANLEY**

Stanley's listed qualifications are: two terms in the House; appointments to University Council, Student Publications Committee and Courses of Study Committee, Academic Affairs Committee member, Health Center Committee member, Student Bill of Rights Committee member, Documents Revision member, Reapportionment of House Committee member; Dorm Council offices and Branchman Centennial Council member.

His platform: continuous review of core curriculum, overhaul of academic advising, get Bill of Rights enforced by entire TCU community, modify meal ticket system, work more closely with legal counsel to the House.

### Secretary

The secretary's duties are: to keep accurate written records of the proceedings and attendance at all House meetings; to attend to all matters of correspondence

concerning the House and to keep a record thereof; to keep appropriate executive and congressional files; to direct appropriate election officials to call elections and

referenda required by the Constitution and the By-Laws; to act as a regular voting member of the House; and to perform any additional secretarial duties prescribed.



**BECKY RAMBIN**

Miss Rambin's listed qualifications are: administrative assistant to the director of Forensics, two years secretarial experience, member of Delta Gamma sorority, holder of Nordan and McCorkle fine arts scholarships, member of Tom Brown-Jarvis program, member of Jarvis Standards Board and member of the Association for Women's Awareness.

Her platform: hopes to increase communication between student body, student government and administration.



**STEVVI STITES**

Miss Stites' listed qualifications are: member of Alpha Lambda Delta, vice president of Los Hidalgos, member of the Association for Women's Awareness, a member of Chi Omega sorority and secretary of Student Programming Board.

Her platform: hopes to establish better communications between the House and everyone else.

# Committee eyeing coach candidates

Football coaches both in and out of the University are busy checking classified ads this week as present head coach Billy Tohill pulls himself through his final week of employment here. Athletic director Othol "Abe" Martin is keeping the official list of applicants for Tohill's job while the Frog mentor is drawing

up a list of ideas for his own future.

Martin's list now includes the names Bartosh, Shofner, Wright, Akers and Enis, among others. "There's not many people calling about this job, though," Martin notes.

Gil Bartosh, now an assistant coach at Texas A&M, is due here Friday for an interview. The Frog-ex, who also coached at

Rice, led Odessa Permian to two state high school titles. He joined the Aggie staff last spring.

Ex-Purple Hunter Enis, who left the Denver Bronco professional organization a year ago to enter the real estate business here, is expected "some time this week."

Jim Shofner, held by some observers to be a "shoe-in," plans to drop by Monday for a talk with the coach-finding committee, headed by Senior Vice-Chancellor Dr. Earl Waldrop. Shofner is now an assistant coach with the San Francisco 49ers.

A new name on the list is that of Jim Wright, an assistant at the University of Tennessee, who has contacted Martin that he is interested in the coaching position. Wright plans a trip to Fort Worth on Monday or Tuesday to talk it

over. Tennessee, incidentally, downed the Frogs 39-7 earlier this season at Knoxville.

Another assistant who has indicated interest in the Frog post is University of Texas aide Fred Akers, who plans an interview this week. Akers played on the University of Arkansas team that beat TCU 3-0 in 1959; the start of 15 dismal years for the Frogs against the Razorbacks.

Running in the outside lane in this race is Bill Armspargh, an assistant under Don Shula in the Miami Dolphins organization.

"Shula indicated that as long as they're playing," Martin said, "Bill would not be able to talk, but Armspargh wanted to go on record as saying he was interested in the job."

The Dolphin coach has only an

outside chance, however, since Miami still has three regular season contests remaining plus post-season action. TCU officials have expressed desire to announce a coach as soon after the season is over as possible. Saturday's duel with SMU in Dallas is the season finale.

"And I'm expecting a call from Melvin Brown, an assistant at the University of Houston," Martin said, "because their athletic director called me about it." Brown has been with the Cougars as offensive and defensive coach for 12 years.

Tohill, meanwhile, plans to talk with officials from Southwest Louisiana State University this week about the head job there. Southwestern Louisiana, who contacted Tohill last week after his firing was announced, went winless this fall. Tohill also has indicated an offer for an assistant job at a school in Texas.

The committee in charge of finding a new coach expanded to 10 members over the holidays with the addition of student representative Steve Oatman.

## Lectures continue

Philosopher Paul Ricoeur will lecture on "Speaking and Writing" tonight in the second of a series of Centennial lectures.

Ricoeur is regarded as one of the world's foremost philosophers. He was the subject of the entire summer 1973 issue of "Philosophy Today," the first issue ever devoted entirely to a single living thinker.

Last night's "Language and

Discourse" lecture kicked off the "Discourse and the Surplus of Meaning" series that will run nightly through Friday. "Metaphor and Symbol" will be tomorrow night's lecture, with "Explanation and Interpretation" on Friday.

All lectures will be at 7:30 p.m. in Student Center rooms 207-8. Friday's lecture will be followed by a reception.

## Mini-semester review for troubled students

Students having trouble with classes may get a chance to improve their grades this semester through mini-semester review courses.

The courses, designed mainly for freshman and sophomores, allow students to take an "I" grade two weeks before finals and declare their intention not to participate in the final examinations.

The courses will be taught Jan. 3-16, giving students an opportunity to review the subject matter and take the final for their grade. Courses cost \$100, with a \$50 deposit due on registration. Pre-registration is today in the Registrar's and Business offices.

Review of freshman courses in English, French, German, Spanish, government, mathematics, religion, accounting, art history, music, theatre arts and social science may be held. History 2603 and 2613, German and Spanish 2053

and Religion 3103 may also offer the review.

Mini-semester review courses will also be offered after the spring semester.

## 2 issues face voters today

A constitutional amendment and a referendum are on today's ballot with candidates for student government offices.

If passed, the amendment will abolish the present Activities Council and Student Programming Board replacing them with a Programming Council.

The amendment would create a position of vice president for student programming, which would be filled in a later election.

The referendum will ask student opinion on having popularity contests and on whether they should have titles that denote sex.

Billy Tohill's last home game as head football coach at TCU was not a happy one.

As a matter of fact, it was downright revolting—considering the fact that the Frogs outgained the Rice Owls 281 yards to only 100 on Amon Carter Stadium's soggy billiard cloth, yet still lost 14-9.

And after Saturday's victory that gave his team a clear shot at an undisputed third-place Southwest Conference finish, Rice coach Al Conover was heard to say, "I would rather have won the game 14-13. We had to have the win, but I wouldn't do anything to hurt Billy. I don't see how you can help but like that guy."

Somebody obviously doesn't

see it Conover's way, though, and since Big Al is not the man who does the hiring and firing around TCU Tohill is currently looking for another job. And so far he's had two offers.

"One's an assistant and one's a head," says Tohill. "One's in Louisiana and the other's in Texas. But it's extremely early to tell anything definite right now."

Tohill doesn't expect his terminal employment situation to affect the Purples' preparation for the upcoming season finale against SMU in the Cotton Bowl Saturday afternoon. "We'll go ahead just like I had a ten-year contract," says the ousted Frog mentor.

One thing that will affect TCU's preparations this week, though, is the condition of sophomore quarterback Lee Cook's strained knee ligaments—souvenir of the TCU-Texas scuffle two weeks ago.

"It's hard to say about Lee," says Tohill. "It'll probably go right down to Saturday again as to whether he'll play."

"He didn't hurt it any worse against Rice. I'm sure he'll be able to work this week but we just don't know how much."

What really hit TCU hard last

Saturday was the same thing that's devastated two other Rice opponents this season—an acute case of the Swiercs. Senior Carl Swierc, kick returner extraordinaire, dealt the Purples a lethal blow early in the final stanza when he took a Steve Braddock kickoff a stadium record 99 yards to paydirt—or payturf, to be more exact.

The strike came just after Berl Simmons had booted the Frogs onto the scoreboard with a 25-yard field goal. And it came more than a quarter after lightning

had sent chills up the spines of both teams and the sparse crowd that turned out to watch them frolic in the rain.

This week's TCU-SMU game in Dallas will in some measure duplicate last year's Fort Worth fracas. In that one, the Mustangs were breathing fire following the

dismissal of head coach Hayden Fry the Thursday before the game. Whether this year's affair will be a carbon copy in reverse is academic to Tohill.

"That's up to the kids," says the man who is facing his last battle at the TCU helm. "It's really hard to say."

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
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
