**Gough Contest To Be Held Here Friday Evening**

**Five Contestants Will Try for Oratorical Awards.**

**DONOR TO BE CHAIRMAN**

Brown, Hellman, Lowther, Buck and Scott Are Entrants in Annual Event.

Five contestants have entered the Gough Oratorical Contest, to be held in the T. C. U. auditorium Friday, March 7, at 8 p.m. The contestants are Sterling Brown, Stewart Hellman, John Lowther, Hugh Buck and John Scott. Dr. R. H. Gough, sponsor of the contest, will act as chairman, and Cecil A. Morgan, Roy T. Tomlinson and Walter A. Nelson, all of Fort Worth, will be judges.

Dr. Gough awards a \$25 gold medal and \$25 in gold each year to the winner of the contest, and the winner of second place receives \$5, given by T. C. U. The Gough winner also receives a letter "T" and represents the University in the Intercollegiate State Oratorical Contest.

Stewart Hellman won first place in the contest in 1928 and in 1929.

**125 Delegates At Conference**

**Dr. Mendenhall Is Chief Speaker at Student Meetings.**

Approximately 125 registered delegates and about 100 others attended the sessions of the North Texas student Christian Conference held at T. C. U., Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Twelve Texas colleges and universities were represented.

Dr. W. O. Mendenhall, president of Friends University, was the chief speaker of the conference. He addressed the group on the subject "The Master Is Here," at the Friday night session. Saturday morning he talked on "Pharisee" and at the Sunday morning session his address was on "Apostles."

Dr. J. M. Culbreth, secretary of religious education of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, was the speaker at the Saturday evening session. He spoke on "Students and the Church of Tomorrow."

**Christian Missions Discussed**

The Saturday afternoon session was devoted to a discussion of Christian missions with Dr. Mendenhall present. Dr. C. T. Wharton, return missionary from the Congo region of Africa sent by the Presbyterian board, told of his experiences in Africa and of the need for ministers there today. Miss Lucile Day, return missionary from Turkey, and traveling secretary of the Student Volunteer Movement, told of the conditions in Turkey and stressed the conflict encountered with the Turkish government.

George Steinman, Stephen F. Austin State Teachers' College, directed the worship services for the conference. Ned Pope, Southwest regional secretary of the Y. M. C. A., led the song service for the Sunday afternoon session. It was made up of negro spirituals.

A talk by Miss Fern Babcock, Southwestern regional secretary of the Y. W. C. A., on the Houston Industrial Project was the feature of the Sunday afternoon session.

The conference closed Sunday afternoon with a worship service on "Resources," led by Dr. Culbreth.

Approximately 150 T. C. U. students will work and take part in the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show to be held March 8-16.

The T. C. U. band will play two concerts daily, the first from 1-2 p.m. and the second from 7-8 p.m. Concert music and popular selections will be played at these concerts, and members of the band will sing the choruses of the popular songs. Each member of the band will receive \$1 for every program played and their uniforms will take them free to every attraction in the show.

The handball entries must be made by March 12 and first round play will begin March 17.

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
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
