Seniors Lead Classes With 77, Juniors, 61, Sophomores, 54, Freshmen, 53.

Two hundred and forty-five students were named on the honor roll for the winter term, as given out last week by Registrar E. R. Tucker. Twenty-six of the 245 made a perfect scholastic record during the first term, which means a grade of "A" in all subjects carried. The names of 178 girls and 67 boys appears on the list.

The seniors led the four classes in the number of names on the honor roll, which requires an average grade of "B," with no failing grade in any subject. The names of 77 seniors were included in the list, and 61 juniors made their class rank next. The honor sophomores numbered 54, while 53 freshmen were on the list.

Publicity for the convention is in charge of Prof. J. Willard Ridings, who will go to Austin Sunday to take charge of the new coverage of the four-day session.

Skiff Receives Honor Rating in N. S. P. A. Contest

Ranking Made on Point Basis; Scored 845 Out of 1000.

TO RECEIVE CERTIFICATE

644 Papers Were Entered in Critical Service--68 in University Group.

The Skiff has been notified that the National Scholastic Press Association has awarded it the first class honor rating in the annual ranking of university newspapers. This is the highest rating given except for the All-American rating given to a few newspapers each year.

The rating is made on a point basis, with points being given in these divisions: news values and sources; news writing and editing; editorials and entertaining matter; headlines, typography and make-up. The Skiff scored 845 out of a possible 1,000 points.

This is the first year that The Skiff has been a member of the association, which has a total membership in excess of 2,000 high school, college and university publications in every state in the union, in Alaska, Hawaii and British Honduras. There were 644 papers entered in the critical service this year, with 68 papers in the college or university division. All scholastic newspapers, yearbooks and magazines are eligible for membership.

Fred L. Kildow, instructor in the journalism department of the University of Minnesota, is director of the association.

The issues of The Skiff which were entered in the critical service were Nos. 10, 11, 12 and 13. The association required four consecutive issues before Dec. 20, 1929.

The Skiff will receive a certificate of award, which will be framed and placed in the newspaper office.
