
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

One Way Out

DR. WILLIAM C. SMITH.

For two long years the cigarette stubs in the hallways and stairways of the Administration Building have offended my aesthetic taste. I found, however, that mere indignation, no matter how righteous, brought no worth while results. As I meditated on this subject I was on the point of concluding that the cigarette stub, like the poor, would always be with us.

At last a great light dawned on me. One day, while waiting for a T. C. U. car at Houston Street, I noticed a large number of cigarette stubs on the street. I noticed that the stubs were of different lengths. It then occurred to me that by measuring these stubs with a caliper it would be possible to calculate with a high degree of accuracy how long the smokers had to wait for cars at this point. On the basis of these conclusions it would be possible to make demands upon the street railway company to provide better service. With the savings in time, many persons could register in the evening courses at T. C. U. and thus become eligible for seats in the cheering section at football games.

As I boarded the car, I saw a number of cigarette stubs on the floor. By measuring these with the caliper it would be possible to calculate the length of the ride of the smoking passengers. This would provide accurate data to present to the state utilities commission in any hearing relative to an increase of fares.

Educators and psychologists are developing tests of various kinds but in a short time research on the cigarette stubs of college students will displace all other tests. A

measurement of the stubs of cigarettes smoked between classes will give an accurate index of temperamental persons of phlegmatic temperament will throw away longer stubs. If, the stubs are closely examined, they will be found to have been flattened in certain ways. This will indicate nervousness and worry. If the cigarette paper has been partially cut by the nail of the third finger, that is an unfailing indicator that the smoker is worried about his girl in Jarvis Hall.

All these data will be collected in an objective, impersonal manner and there will be no bias against the person concerned as in the ordinary tests where the tester knows the subject. After all the measures have been made, the cigarette stubs will be examined under the microscope and drawings will be made of the finger prints on the paper. Then finger prints will be taken of all the smokers in the university and these will be compared with the drawing from the stubs. In such a procedure there can be no possible errors and all subjective factors will be compltely eliminated from the examination.

Several persons have said that T. C. U. girls smoke cigarettes. Research on the cigarette stubs in the hellways will definitely show this accusation to be false, unfounded, and beside the truth. Observation of women smokers reveal the fact that girls are more skillful than boys in flicking off the ends of cigarettes with the third finger. A girl will flick a cigarette so the end is squared off. Measures and drawings made of a large number of stubs in the hallways show the ends to be conical; they reveal no feminine traits. Hence there are no smokers among the girls.

During the second semester, the psychology department is to institute an extensive research program and this will remove the unsightly cigarette stubs from the hallways. Attractive depositories for the stubs are to be placed at convenient locations in the hallways. Andrew Mellon, Secretary of the Treasury, has consented to provide aluminum receptacles for this purpose. Incidentally this will provide work in the aluminum industry for many of the unemployed and thus relieve pressure upon the Community Chest. Furthermore, extensive research in this field will demand considerable equipment, calipers, microscopes, paper and ink for recording the data, etc., etc. This will stimulate industry and thus the present depression will be ended before the more dilatory schemes of Dr. Edwin A. Elliott and Herbert Hoover can be put into operation.
