TCU joins fight against asthma

TCU HAS JOINED the Tarrant County Asthma Awareness Coalition in implementing a multi-media asthma awareness campaign. The campaign targets adolescents with asthma with the message that they should take their asthma medication and establish a regular pattern of medical care.

The campaign's main components will be an asthma educational program to be implemented in F.W.I.S.D. schools and an advertising campaign featuring TCU athletes Clifford Barnes and Juan Bragg, both of whom have asthma. Cliff and Juan will be shown engaging in athletic activities with youths who have asthma.

Juan said kids should realize that asthma should not prevent them from enjoying sports.

"I think being active is the best thing to do if you have asthma," he said. "Younger kids think they can't play sports if they have asthma so it's good for them to see people with asthma playing at this level."

Asthma affects more than 11 million Americans and is the No. 1 chronic illness among youth. In 1994, more than 2,500 adolescents visited the emergency rooms at Harris Methodist Hospital and Cook-Fort Worth Children's Hospital for emergency treatment of asthma. Approximately 5,000 people die of asthma each year in the United States. ♦

The Ticket, TCU agree to sports broadcast pact

TCU HAS SIGNED a two-year contract with KTCK Sports Radio 1310 AM - "The Ticket" to broadcast all Horned Frog football and men's basketball games.

TCU athletics director Frank Windegger said that the relationship is a great way to close out the Southwest Conference and get ready to enter the Western Athletic Conference.

KTCK became the official station for TCU sports broadcasts during 1994-95. Chuck Cooperstein will continue to provide the play-by-play, with Craig Miller handling the color commentary. ♦
