## Recital series will feature institute's distinguished faculty

FOUR DISTINGUISHED PIANISTS — including 1969 Cliburn Competition gold medalist Cristina Ortiz — will give public recitals June 12-30 on campus during the TCU/Cliburn Piano Institute.

Since 1981, the annual institute has offered a concentrated series of piano studies for participants from around the world. This year's institute has been expanded from two weeks to three, offering an extra week of intense study of piano performance, technique and repertoire. Audiences also may enjoy concerts on June 20 and June 29 that will feature selected institute students playing concertos with the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra — a distinctive feature of the institute.

- The recital series will begin June 15 with a performance by Russian pianist-teacher Lazar Berman, who is known for grand romantic style.

- On June 18, Brazilian-born Cristina Ortiz will demonstrate the expertise that makes her a popular guest of major orchestras around the world.

- June 25 is a date with John Browning, a Grammy Award-winner who celebrated his 60th birthday last year with a three-concert series at Lincoln Center.

- On June 27, local audiences will be treated to the sounds of Jean-Louis Steurman, a soloist, recitalist and chamber musician who frequently appears with groups such as the Vanbrugh String Quartet.

All TCU/Cliburn Piano Institute concerts and recitals begin at 8 p.m. Tickets can be purchased individually or in a series package and are available through Central Ticket Agency at 335-9000. Information on the institute is available from its director, TCU music faculty member Tamás Ungár, at Ext. 7456. ♦

## Businessman Roger Staubach to speak at commencement

WHILE MANY REMEMBER Roger Staubach the professional football player, fewer know Staubach as a businessman and civic leader. In the 15 years since he tossed his last game-winning pass for the Dallas Cowboys, Staubach has excelled in the business world and community service.

He will address graduates of the Class of '95 Saturday during the combined baccalaureate-commencement ceremony, which begins at 3:30 p.m. in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

Early in his football career, Staubach began building his business success when he joined Henry S. Miller Co. to sell real estate during off-seasons. In 1977, he formed Holloway-Staubach Corp., which focused on general brokerage activities.

Staubach helped pioneer the "tenant representation" concept with the 1982 formation of The Staubach Company, where

he is chairman of the board and CEO. The integrated real estate company represents corporations and professional organizations seeking office, industrial and retail real estate. Some notable clients have included GTE Corp., IBM, MCI, Occidental Chemical Corp., Tandy Corp. and United Parcel Service.

Civic honors for Staubach have included the American Academy of Achievement Golden Plate Award, the DAR Medal of Honor and the Henry Cohn Humanitarian Award. In 1990, Staubach received the Dallas/Fort Worth Entrepreneur of the Year Award. He has been recognized for his service by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and is active with the Children's Cancer Fund and Daytop, a drug abuse center for teens. ♦

## Neeley MBA student one of best in U.S.

NEELEY SCHOOL MBA candidate J. Paige Wertz has been identified by the American Marketing Association as one of the six best MBA marketing students in the United States. She was selected as a 1995 AMA/George Hay Brown Marketing Scholar.

Neeley School marketing professor Dave Cravens says this marks the third time in the 11-year history of the competition that a TCU student has been honored.

"Paige is one of a very small number of

truly outstanding MBA students with whom I have been associated during the past two decades," Dave said.

As a TCU undergraduate, Paige participated in the Honors Program and was recognized by the Golden Key National Honor Society, Alpha Mu Alpha, Beta Gamma Sigma and Sigma Delta Pi. Paige, who graduates Saturday, will begin full-time employment with Burlington Northern Railroad this summer. ♦

## Dallas campaign chair makes \$1 million matching pledge

DALLAS BUSINESS LEADER Robert Wright (Class of '50) and his wife, Mary, made a \$1 million "matching" pledge April 27 at the Dallas regional Next Frontier campaign kickoff. The Wrights had already pledged \$500,000 to the Dallas campaign.

Chancellor Bill Tucker announced the matching pledge during the campaign's gala kick-off dinner at the Wyndham Anatole Hotel. The matching gift challenge means that the Wrights will give one dollar for every dollar donated by another Dallas campaign donor or donors — up to \$1 million, Dr. Tucker said. Campaign leaders also announced that more than \$3.7 million has been raised in the early phases of the \$5 million regional campaign.

Wright, who emceed the event, is a trustee. He also chairs the Dallas regional campaign cabinet. Wright is the president of Medical Cities Inc. He founded Medical City Dallas and has advised hospitals, medical schools and hospital operating companies. He is a nephew of Pete Wright, TCU's business manager during the Depression. ♦
