TCU geologists find evidence for complex animal life more than 1 billion years ago

THREE TEXAS CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY geologists and a former student have found new evidence that suggests multicellular animals originated more than 1 billion years ago. The discovery of trace fossils by John Breyer, Art Busbey, Richard Hanson and Ed Roy is described in the March issue of *Geology* magazine and challenges the conventional wisdom that places the origin of multicellular animals at less than 650 million years ago.

The fossils were found in a talc quarry in the Millican Hills near Van Horn, Texas and the slab of rock containing the fossils was removed and brought to TCU for examination.

John said the discovery of these fossils may eliminate the apparent long lag time between the first appearance of multicellular plants, approximately 1.3 billion years ago, and what is accepted to be the appearance of multicellular animals. But, if no evidence is found to support the existence of life in the intervening 350 million year period, it could represent a failed experiment in animal life.

"What makes this discovery so exciting," says John, "is that this might prove that multicellular life originated twice. It's possible that complex animal life did exist over a billion years ago, went extinct, and then reappeared 350 million years later, eventually evolving into the human race."

John and his team based their findings on sediment-filled tubes they discovered in rock formations belonging to the Mesoproterozoic, or middle of the Late Precambrian period. The Late Precambrian period refers to the time period between 570 million and 2.5 billion years ago. Sediment-filled tubes are formed by creatures burrowing into the sea floor. These tubes then become filled with sediment and represent an archive of the era in which they were created. ♦
