Fall fine arts season sparkles with exhibits, recitals and Diamond Gala

TCU'S 1995 FALL FINE ARTS SEASON will glitter with exhibitions and performances highlighting the talents of faculty, students and guest artists.

Culminating the season will be the TCU Diamond Gala Evening, a series of scholarship benefit performances featuring choreography by international ballet artist/choreographer Fernando Bujones and the TCU dance faculty. The production, set for Oct. 26-29, is sponsored by the TCU Fine Arts Guild as the primary fund-raising event for the scholarships it provides for students in the College of Fine Arts and Communication.

Two diverse exhibits featuring the works of guest artists will be on display in the Moudy Building gallery space this season. The first, set for Oct. 9-27, will feature paintings, prints and sculptures by faculty members from the Universidad de Las Américas-Puebla, TCU's sister academic institution in Puebla, Mexico.

The second exhibit, which will be displayed Oct. 30-Nov. 22, will include works by master metal caster Thomas Walsh. Walsh, who is head of sculpture at Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, will also critique student works and conduct a series of workshops for TCU students and others as TCU's artist-in-residence Nov. 6-10.

The wealth of TCU's piano program will be at the forefront this fall with performances by students and three acclaimed faculty pianists in Ed Landreth Auditorium. The talents of student pianists will be exhibited when they perform Mozart's piano sonatas in a series each evening from Oct. 31 to Nov. 3.

A faculty performance on Oct. 2 will feature John Owings, who beguiled local audiences a few years ago by playing all 32 Beethoven piano sonatas in a series of seven recitals within a month.

On Oct. 30, Jose Feghali, TCU artist-in-residence and 1985 Grand Prize Winner of the Van Cliburn International Piano Competition, will demonstrate his precision and clean technique.

On Dec. 3, the TCU Choral Union and TCU Symphony will present a concert featuring holiday selections and Janet Pummill, TCU's director of accompanying, performing a rarely heard piano concerto: *The Rio Grande*.

Shakespeare's madcap *The Taming of the Shrew* will launch TCU Theatre's fall season Sept. 27-Oct. 1. The season's second theatre offering, *Quilters*, is a musical celebration of American womanhood featuring an all-
