Brite names first Baptist studies director

WILLIAM HENDRICKS, senior professor of Christian theology at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Ky., has accepted appointment to Brite Divinity School as director of the Baptist studies program and lecturer in theology. The Rev. Hendricks holds master of divinity and doctor of theology degrees from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He also has an M.A. and a Ph.D. in theology from the University of Chicago and is an alumnus of the Disciples Divinity House in Chicago. In addition, he has studied at Union Theological Seminary in New York, Tübingen University in Germany and Cambridge University (King's College) in England.

The Rev. Hendricks will join Andrew Lester, also a former faculty member of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, as Brite's second Baptist faculty member. His appointment is effective Aug. 15, 1996.

Prior to his appointment to Brite Divinity School, the Rev. Hendricks taught at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary and Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary. An ordained Southern Baptist minister, he has served 12 Baptist churches as pastor and is a frequent speaker and teacher before congregations, assemblies and other religious meetings. The author of eight books and numerous articles, his writings include *Who Is Jesus Christ?* and *A Theology for Aging*.

"Dr. Hendricks will add to the richness of our offerings in theology and religion and the arts," said Leo Perdue, Brite's dean. ♦

Executive Breakfast to feature UDLA's Cárdenas

DR. ENRIQUE CÁRDENAS, president of Mexico's Universidad de Las Américas-Puebla, TCU's sister academic institution in Puebla, Mexico, will kick off the fall 1995 Executive Breakfast series on Tuesday, Oct. 10. Dr. Cárdenas will discuss "Technology and Mexico's Long-term Development" during the event, which is sponsored by the Neeley School's Charles Tandy American Enterprise Center.

More than 250 area business and civic leaders are expected to attend the invitation-only breakfast beginning at 7:15 a.m. in the Student Center ballroom.

A noted economist, Dr. Cárdenas will highlight how technological innovations both propel and are driven by economic development between Mexico and the United States.

TCU student receives national accounting scholarship

THE ARTHUR H. CARTER Scholarship Fund has awarded one of 50 scholarships valued at \$2,500 to senior accounting major Clark B. Davis.

Davis, a triple major also studying finance and Spanish, is vice president of the national business honorary society Beta Gamma Sigma and treasurer of the national honor society Order of Omega. He has been selected for numerous national honors and has interned with Coopers & Lybrand and Chevron.

"This is a prestigious program and Clark's receipt of a Carter Scholarship recognizes him as one of the top undergraduate accounting students in the United States," said Bob Vigeland, accounting department chairman. Davis is the 10th Neeley School recipient of the award. ♦

Engineering program prepares for first graduates

THE TCU ENGINEERING PROGRAM recently welcomed its first senior class. This important milestone puts the three-year-old program on the road to gaining accreditation. Before becoming accredited, a program must have an official graduating class.

Hal Nelson, chair of the program, said there are still many hurdles to clear before a request for an accreditation visit can be submitted to the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology.

Hal also said that despite not having a permanent engineering facility, he remains optimistic about gaining accreditation. With well-known, established programs at University of Texas at Arlington and at Texas A&M, it's been a task for TCU to attract prospective engineering students. However, although the current senior class is only about 12 students strong, Hal said the outlook is extremely encouraging. This year's incoming freshman class includes 42 engineering majors. The goal is to have 200-250 once the program is in full swing. ♦

Forms will help eliminate exemption hassles

TCU EMPLOYEES WHO TRAVEL should drop by the controller's office to pick up two forms to eliminate difficulties they may encounter in receiving a tax exemption from hotels and motels. A recent change enacted by the Texas Legislature precludes state employees from receiving the Hotel Occupancy Tax exemption. TCU Controller Larry Calloway said unfortunately some hotels and motels are misapplying the legislation and are trying to include TCU employees in this category. The controller's office can provide a Hotel Occupancy Tax exemption form along with a copy of the House Bill to ensure that you receive the exemption. ♦

Library exhibits feature, explore banned books, New World

COLUMBUS' DISCOVERY of the Americas and its effects on the American and European continents are examined in an exhibit titled "An Ongoing Voyage" currently on display in the Mary Coats Burnett Library. The exhibition details the exploration trend among Europeans prior to 1492, Columbus' journey and the subsequent interactions between the Europeans and Native Americans.

Maps, manuscripts, artifacts and engravings tell the before-and-after story of the intermingling of the two extremely diverse cultures. From now until Dec. 15,

"An Ongoing Voyage" will be on display in the lobby during the library's regular business hours.

A number of books by American and international authors that have been targeted for censorship are also featured in the library's lobby until Oct. 12. The exhibit was assembled in conjunction with Banned Books Week (Sept. 23-30), which focused on the right to read as guaranteed by the First Amendment. ♦
