Walshes to receive third annual Horizon Award

THE COLLEGE OF FINE ARTS and Communication will honor long-time university contributors Mary D. and F. Howard Walsh as recipients of the prestigious Horizon Award this Friday at noon in the Brown-Lupton Student Center.

The Walshes will be honored for, among other contributions, their financial commitment to the \$11 million, 56,000-square-foot Center for Performing Arts to wrap around the existing Ed Landreth Hall on the northwest end of campus. Their contribution was by far the largest received for the Center, which will bear their names.

The Horizon Awards were established in 1993 to note the contributions of community leaders and college alumni to the fine arts at TCU as well as in Fort Worth and the Metroplex.

Mr. Walsh, class of '33, is president of Walsh and Watts Inc. of Fort Worth and was a member of TCU's Board of Trustees from 1968 to 1983. He is currently an honorary trustee. The Walshes have established two scholarships in their names for TCU students, and all five of their children have attended TCU.

"The Walshes," Chancellor Bill Tucker said, "are among the very best friends of Texas Christian University and have been for a solid generation. Their magnificent commitment adds a bold exclamation point to their grand and unfailing generosity and puts the University in position to take another step forward." ◆

United Way campus campaign falls short

CONTRIBUTIONS TO THIS YEAR'S United Way campus campaign totaled \$83,141. The figure fell shy of the \$89,381 goal and represents a slight drop off from last year's figure of \$83,496.

TCU engineering students host industry expert

TCU ENGINEERING STUDENTS got a dose of what a real-life engineering position is all about when they hosted a McDonnell Douglas Corporation specialist, last Wednesday (Oct. 18). Don Hagemaier, who is one of eight senior fellows for McDonnell Douglas, discussed the effects that years of wear and tear can have on aircraft.

As a principal specialist in nondestructive testing, Hagemaier's research has a direct impact on the safety of large aircraft. During his presentation, he noted that many of the airplanes students fly on are as old, if not older, than the students themselves. He also pointed out that aircraft such as the DC-9, which were originally certified for 40,000 take offs and landings, are now being asked to withstand 102,000 take offs and landings.

Patrick Walter, who heads the senior design lecture sequence in engineering, said Hagemaier's visit was a great opportunity for the students to get a first-hand account of the importance a job in engineering can carry.

"The research Don conducts affects all of us," he said. "I'm glad he could find the time to come talk to our students and I think this shows the direction in which our program is headed."

Hagemaier has lectured extensively on nondestructive testing for 40 years and has published more than 100 technical articles. In addition, he has received numerous awards including the American Society for Nondestructive Testing's Gold Medal Award in 1991 and the Institute for the Advancement of Engineering's Fellow and Outstanding Merit Award for 1993. •

The Indonesian exchange group arrived as part of Fort Worth's Sister Cities Week. Indonesian faculty members visited with TCU faculty and students for a week and their students spent an additional three weeks here. Danna Strength (nursing) says the students, Dewi Oktaviana and Nia Wyuhiawati, sat in on nursing courses, visited several area hospitals and public health clinics, spoke to TCU and grade school students about their country and their Islamic faith, visited area sites such as Casa Manana, the Botanic Garden, the State Fair of Texas and participated in the Intensive English Program.

Danna says the exchange has been three years in the making and is hopeful that arrangements can soon be made to send TCU faculty and students to Indonesia in the future. •
