Roe vs. Wade attorney to speak on campus

SARAH WEDDINGTON, KNOWN FOR her winning argument in one of the most famous legal cases in American history, Roe vs. Wade, will speak about "Leadership: A Critical Skill for Tomorrow" on Nov. 8 at 8 p.m. in the Student Center Ballroom.

Weddington has advanced national awareness of women's issues as an assistant to the President of the United States from 1978 to 1981, when she led the White House efforts to extend the time for ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment. She also co-chaired the U.S. delegation to the United Nations Mid-Decade Conference on Women in Copenhagen in 1980. She has served on the Texas House of Representatives, where she helped to reform Texas rape statutes, provide equal consideration for both mothers and fathers in custody disputes and pass a pregnancy leave bill for teachers.

Weddington has received numerous awards and honors, including the Planned Parenthood Federation of America's Margaret Sanger Award and recognition as Time magazine's "Outstanding Young American Leader." In 1990, she was named "Lecturer of the Year" by the National Association for Campus Activities.

Weddington's lecture is sponsored by the Programming Council's Forums Committee and is free and open to the public. Her book, A Question of Choice, a documentation of the historic Roe vs. Wade case, will be available following the presentation.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF WOMEN athletes will take center court at the first "Celebration of Women in Athletics," on Nov. 7. The event will be held in conjunction with the Lady Frogs' basketball exhibition game against Central Texas AAU.

Festivities begin at 6 p.m. and will include music, face painting, a clown/ balloon artist, Superfrog, the TCU Frog Horn and free food.

Both the event and game are free and open to the public. The game begins at 7 p.m., and will include an introduction of the current women's teams and former letterwomen during halftime. •

Nursing faculty members learn Spanish

FACULTY MEMBERS IN THE Harris College of Nursing are going back to the classroom... to take Spanish, that is.

Many of TCU's nursing faculty members and their students work with Spanishspeaking clients, so faculty members saw a practical need to be bilingual role models for students and clients alike.

"More and more of the clients we see in health care settings speak only Spanish," said Pat Bradley (nursing), who oversees the college's community health nursing program. "In our new curriculum we are requiring nursing majors to take six hours of a foreign language. We advise them to take Spanish, especially if they plan to work in Texas. We need to prepare our students as well as be good role models for them."

Pat, who conceived the Spanish language training idea, also coordinates the program. Laura Bevere (modern languages) is teaching two customized, 10-week courses especially for 12 faculty members.

"We need to learn how to communicate in clinical settings where frequently more than half of the clients speak only Spanish," said Pat. "Rather than how to read a menu, or ask for directions — the topics typically covered in conversational Spanish courses — we learn how to ask clients about their symptoms, the drugs they've taken or how to relieve their pain."

Faculty members are making a professional as well as a personal commitment to foreign language training. Each of them is paying for the course, which also is supported in part by the Harris College of Nursing. ◆

TCU students reach out to community through Day of Caring

ON SUNDAY, OCT. 29, 55 TCU students donned their grubbiest jeans and picked up their brushes to paint the interior of a residential facility of St. Teresa's Home for children in Fort Worth. The project was part of a United Way of Tarrant County's Days of Caring program coordinated by TCU students through the University's Community Action Network (CAN) organization. CAN is designed to involve students in community service.

From 9 a.m. to 2 p.m., TCU students tackled a 4,000-square-foot building which serves as a home for 12 youngsters aged 4 to 6 who suffer from problems stemming from abuse and neglect. The showpiece of the project was a large mural of a tree and pond that students painted on a gameroom wall. "We really do appreciate the help," said David Chumchal, St. Teresa's facilities manager. "Without volunteerism, a lot of this wouldn't get done or it would take a lot longer."

The United Way's Days of Caring program helps groups of volunteers conduct community service projects or activities that benefit local non-profit organizations and the people they serve. "The students worked with United Way very closely to determine which project they would do," said the Rev. John Butler, TCU's University minister. ◆
