Former presidential candidate George McGovern added to debate panel

ON-CAMERA AUDIENCE MEMBERS are invited to participate in a Nov. 30 taping in Ed Landreth Auditorium for three nationally televised programs exploring ways to overhaul our federal income tax system.

Michael Kinsley of CNN's "Crossfire" program will moderate a two-hour debate, "Resolved: A flat tax would be better than the income tax," to be aired at later dates on PBS television stations across the country.

In addition to new recruit George McGovern, panelists will include commentator William F. Buckley, Texas congressman Dick Armey, former California governor Jerry Brown, MIT economist Lester Thurow, economics professor Robert Kuttner and former Delaware governor Pete DuPont.

The debate also will feature results of a TCU student poll on the flat tax question being conducted by the Neeley School of Business.

Immediately following the debate, two 30-minute "Firing Line" programs, hosted by Buckley, will be taped for broadcast later on PBS. According to "Firing Line" producer Warren Steibel, the half-hour shows promise to be lively, free-for-all discussions also addressing the flat tax issue.

The television audience for the two-hour debate must be seated in Ed Landreth Auditorium by 2:45 p.m. Taping for the two "Firing Line" programs begin immediately following the debate. Audience members will be encouraged to stay for all three programs.

All faculty, staff and students are invited to participate as long as office phones are covered. To assure a full TV audience, you will be asked to register to attend these events. Journalism and Enterprise Center co-host conference for newspaper executives

MEDIA EXECUTIVES FROM TOP newspapers and media organizations across the country are converging on the TCU campus today (Nov. 13) to explore the future of news industries and journalism into the next millennium.

The high-powered conference, "News Industries and Journalism: Preparing for 2010/ News and Content Roundtable" runs through Wednesday at Tandy Hall and in the Moudy Building. The conference is being hosted by the journalism department and the Charles Tandy American Enterprise Center, with support from the *Fort Worth Star-Telegram*.

On the first day, news media executives will receive a full day of cutting-edge insights into news content issues and uses of technology from prominent media thinkers and technical demonstrators, including Gerry Grotta, Tommy Thomason and Anantha Babbili (journalism).

The second day will introduce participants to the elements of "scenario planning," a powerful technique used by international corporations and governments to project possible futures.

The McCormick Tribune Foundation, a non-partisan, non-profit organization is underwriting the program, which is sponsored by New Directions for News, an independent journalism think tank housed at the University of Missouri School of Journalism.

The conference is the second of four media roundtables being held across the country. The first one, which explored advertising, was held in September at Stanford University. ♦
