Hutchison to speak at winter commencement

SENATOR KAY BAILEY HUTCHISON (R-Texas) will be the keynote speaker during this year's winter commencement ceremony Dec. 16 at 3:30 p.m. in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum. Hutchison will be addressing a graduating class of approximately 460 students, their families and friends.

The ceremony also will feature the presentation of the Deans' Teaching Award. Each winter, three faculty members are recognized for significant and meritorious achievement in teaching. This year's nominees are: Gregg Franzwa, philosophy; David Minter, chemistry; James Riddlesperger, political science; M. Eugene Boring, Brite Divinity School; In-Mu Haw, accounting; Joel Mitchell, physical education; Thad Duhigg, art and art history; Gerald Grotta, journalism; and Patricia Bradley, Harris College of Nursing.

Previously, this award was known as the Burlington Northern Foundation Faculty Achievement Award. Last year's winners were Rhonda Hatcher, mathematics; Linda Moore, sociology; and Robert Vigeland, accounting.

Daniel-Meyer gets new scoreboard

AS TCU ENTERS ITS FINAL basketball season as a member of the Southwest Conference, Daniel-Meyer Coliseum is being prepped for the first season of play in the Western Athletic Conference. The addition of a new 16-color message center scoreboard, along with a new state-of-the-art sound system installed earlier this year, have brought the coliseum up to par with some of the finest arenas in the nation.

The 9,000-pound Fair Play scoreboard was provided by the Dr Pepper Bottling Co. of Texas. Larry Teis, TCU's athletics marketing director, says advertising space on each panel could generate several thousand dollars in revenue for the University. The board stands 16 feet high, with each of its four panels

measuring up to 17 feet across. It features more than 50,000 bulbs. Horned Frog fans are now treated to a variety of images, on-screen messages and statistics generated by the board's Pentium computer. The scoreboard also comes complete with a video camera for instant replays as well as the capability to do live television feeds, and Beta and VHS tape playback.

University bad weather closing policy

Days when the University is officially closed because of weather conditions are designated as bad weather days. When the University is officially closed, all students, faculty and staff members will be excused from reporting, except for those employees providing essential services related to (1) health and safety, (2) the presence of a residential student community and (3) agreements with the public for the use of University facilities.

The decision to close the University will be made by 6 a.m. on the day in question and will be communicated to local news media. Members of the University community are encouraged to obtain their information from that source.

Procedures will be developed for communication with employees in the event the University is closed on a Saturday or Sunday.

The Office of Communications is responsible for making all public announcements to radio, television and newspapers regarding changes caused by weather conditions. In the event of severe weather, please monitor the following broadcast outlets for immediate information regarding campus announcements:
