## Date set for "Firing Line" flat tax debate broadcast

OFFICIALS AT TWO NORTH TEXAS public television stations have confirmed broadcast dates for the PBS "Firing Line" debate, "Resolved: A flat tax would be better than the current income tax." The two-hour program was taped Nov. 30 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. It will be broadcast on Dec. 22 at 8 p.m. on Channel 13, KERA-TV, and on Dec. 24 at 2 p.m. on Channel 2, KDTN-TV. The program also will air nationally on PBS in prime time on 238 U.S. stations in December. An audience of 2.6 million households is expected.

An enthusiastic audience turned out for the event, completely filling the 1,250-seat auditorium. An overflow audience of at least 100 watched the taping on a large-screen television in the Student Center ballroom.

TCU co-sponsored the debate with the National Center for Policy Analysis, a free-market think tank with headquarters in Dallas. The program also was sponsored by the Hatton W. Sumners Foundation as part of its lecture series.

A poll of TCU students conducted by business students in John Thompson's marketing special studies class was featured in the program. Of 509 students surveyed, 35 percent agreed that a flat tax would be better than the existing income tax, while 26 percent disagreed. The survey indicated that 22 percent of respondents said they had no opinion, and 17 percent said they didn't understand the issue. The survey had a 5 percent margin of error.

Michael Kinsley of CNN's "Crossfire" program moderated the program. The debate team arguing for the flat tax included "Firing Line" host William F. Buckley, former California Gov. Jerry Brown, former Delaware Gov. Pete du Pont and John Goodman, president of the National Center for Policy Analysis in Dallas. The opposing team included former presidential candidate George McGovern, MIT economist Lester Thurow, economics writer Robert Kuttner and Steven Mann, Neeley School assistant professor of finance.

Dick Arney and Colorado congresswoman Patricia Schroeder were originally scheduled as panelists, but both of them decided to remain in Washington D.C., to monitor pending legislation.

Two 30-minute "Firing Line" programs on the flat tax issue also were taped for broadcast later on PBS. The regular "Firing Line" programs, hosted by Buckley, will air nationwide on PBS stations in January. Local broadcast dates for those programs have not been announced. ♦

## Community heroes sought to carry Olympic torch

NOMINATIONS ARE BEING ACCEPTED now through Dec. 15 for "community heroes" to carry the official Olympic torch as it makes its 15,000-mile journey across America to Atlanta, Ga. Tarrant County United Way is looking for individuals who have served other people in exceptional ways to carry the 3 and 1/2-pound torch on the Tarrant County leg of its journey.

To be eligible, nominees must be 12 or older and must be able to advance the torch up to one kilometer. Nominees do not have to be runners and individuals may nominate themselves or more than one person. Each nomination must include a paragraph describing why the nominee is a community hero in 100 or fewer words.
