Hutchison encourages graduates; winners of Deans' Teaching Awards announced

SEN. KAY BAILEY HUTCHISON, R-Texas, encouraged the winter '95 graduating class to participate in the political system to keep it working at TCU's winter commencement ceremony Dec. 16 in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

Chancellor Bill Tucker welcomed approximately 400 graduates and their families and friends before introducing Hutchison, who delivered the keynote address. The University conferred 310 undergraduate, 51 graduate and eight doctoral degrees, and Brite Divinity School conferred 19 degrees. The winter class included 19 cum laude, 18 magna cum laude and four summa cum laude honorees and one 4.0 grade point average student, Jodie Allison Smith.

The ceremony also included the presentation of the Deans' Teaching Awards for significant and meritorious achievement in teaching. This year's honorees were: David Minter (chemistry), James Riddlesperger (political science) and Joel Mitchell (physical education). ♦

Longtime TCU supporter M.J. Neeley dies at 97

DR. M.J. NEELEY, TCU business school namesake and longtime friend and supporter of the University, passed away Jan. 9. Although a graduate of Texas A&M, Neeley became one of TCU's most avid supporters from the time he and his wife, the late Dr. Alice Neeley, moved to Fort Worth in the 1920s.

Dr. Neeley was elected to the TCU Board of Trustees in 1947. He served the board for 25 years: from 1964 to 1969 as vice-chairman and from 1969 to 1972 as chairman. A member of several board committees, Dr. Neeley served as chair of the Building and Grounds Committee from 1951 to 1970. That period was one in which TCU underwent major expansion and saw the construction of at least seven major buildings, including the one that first housed the M.J. Neeley School of Business: Dan D. Rogers Hall.

Dr. Neeley's generosity provided for the business school's Center for Productive Communication as well as the M.J. Neeley Professorship of Marketing and the Research Professorship of Management and Organizational Behavior.

Dr. Neeley's support also resulted in the development of TCU's Starpoint School, which has served the needs of children with learning differences for more than 20 years. The Neeley trust also defrays costs for four education graduates to teach at Starpoint while they pursue their master's degrees.

Because of his unfaltering support of the University, both personal and financial, Dr. Neeley was awarded the honorary Doctor of Letters degree in 1967.

Chancellor Bill Tucker said Dr. Neeley's dedication to TCU was immeasurable. "Wise and generous of spirit as well as substance, M.J. Neeley favored the University in ways beyond measure," he said. "He will truly be missed."

A private entombment service at Greenwood Mausoleum and a memorial service at University Christian Church were held Jan. 12. Dr. Neeley is survived by two daughters, Marian Neeley Nettles of Abaco, Bahamas, and Kathleen Neeley Williams of Sedona, Ariz.; nine grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren. His family requests that any memorials be made to the Union Gospel Mission or to a charity of choice. ♦

Police chief clarifies TCU's concealed weapons policy

WITH TEXANS BEING GRANTED the right to carry concealed weapons, it's important to note that state law prohibits individuals from possessing firearms or deadly weapons while on the grounds of an educational institution. This applies even if the individual has been issued a license. The term "deadly weapon" includes ammunition, martial arts devices, slingshots, air-powered guns, blow guns, fireworks or flammable liquids.

TCU Police Chief Steve McGee said many times people don't consider stadiums and other athletic venues part of the university and might think they have the right to carry a concealed weapon to athletic events. That's not the case, Steve said. Possession of a weapon on university grounds is a third-degree felony and could land the offender in prison.

Use or threat of use of a weapon by any TCU employee or student will result in disciplinary action. If you have any questions concerning TCU's weapons policy, please call campus police at Ext. 7777. ♦

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March 10 TCU's Wind Symphony will premiere faculty member Curt Wilson's "Concerto for Trumpet and Wind Symphony."

March 30 Saxophone great Tony Campise will add his magic to TCU's 19th annual Jazz Festival.

April 18-20 The TCU Opera will perform Mark Bucci's "The Dress," and Gian Carlo Menotti's "Amelia Goes to the Ball." Bucci also will be an artist-in-residence at TCU in April.
