Harris College of Nursing Dean named

KATHLEEN BOND, RN, Ed.D., has been named dean of the Harris College of Nursing, Provost Bill Koehler announced last Tuesday. Her appointment will begin July 1.

"I am absolutely delighted that Kathy is joining TCU," said Provost Koehler. "I was most impressed with her when we first met. That such a nationally prominent nurse educator has agreed to join us to share her vision and vitality speaks volumes for the reputation and tradition of Harris College, as well as for the future of the institution."

Kathy comes to TCU from the University of New Mexico College of Nursing, where she has served as dean and professor since 1993. She has had a distinguished career as an academic leader in professional nursing education programs across the country. She

TCU Fine Arts to co-host 'Business After Hours'

TCU FINE ARTS will co-host a "Business After Hours" reception Feb. 1 from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the Kimbell Art Museum. All TCU faculty and staff members are invited to attend this special event, which is being co-hosted by Southwestern Bell and the Kimbell.

The reception is the first event organized by TCU's Fine Arts Board of Visitors, which was launched last year to promote the visibility of TCU's fine arts programs. Board members will attend the event and Board Chair Ron Moore will make a brief presentation highlighting TCU's fine arts programs.

"Business After Hours" is a series of events sponsored by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce for chamber members. The events are typically attended by 300-400 people and give members an opportunity to network and promote new programs and products, said Kristy Dotson, coordinator of the chamber's special events. The Kimbell and TCU were a logical pairing because of the close relationship between the two institutions, she added.

Tickets for "Business After Hours" are \$10 if purchased before the event, and \$15 at the door. The price includes hors d'oeuvres, beer, wine and sparkling water. Attendees may purchase discounted tickets for Kimbell exhibits, including the exclusive Assyrian collection currently on view. They'll also be eligible for door prizes. Inspired by similar festivals in Great Britain and New York City, Tandy RetroFest '96 will celebrate the revolutionary spirit of the 20th century's second decade with exhibitions, lectures, musical and theatrical performances, and other entertaining and educational events relating to this monumental period in world history. The collaboration is designed to create regional and national awareness of area arts programs as well as develop new educational and interdisciplinary ventures, said coordinator Sharon Benge (Class of '68).

served as dean of the College of Nursing at Michigan State University from 1991 to 1993, and was the founding dean at the University of Missouri-Kansas City School of Nursing from 1981 to 1991. Prior to that, she served for 10 years on the faculty at the School of Nursing at the University of Alabama-Birmingham, where her last appointment was chair of the graduate, MSN degree program.

"TCU is a quality institution and very student-centered," said Kathy. "This appointment offers an opportunity to work with a very talented and energetic faculty and staff. One of my first goals will be to get to know them all and learn about their hopes and dreams for the Harris College and develop a shared vision for the future."

Kathy will fill the position vacated by Patricia Scarse, who retired last year after 15 years of service to the University.

Kathy has been involved in rural outreach distance education for more than 20 years. She has done curriculum consultation and lecturing in China and the United Kingdom.

During an American Association of Colleges of Nursing Health Policy Fellowship, Kathy served as a legislative aide for health in the office of Missouri congressman Richard Gephardt. She earned a bachelor's in nursing from the University of Alabama, a master's in nursing from Case Western Reserve University and an Ed.D. from the University of Alabama.

In her new appointment at TCU she will oversee a program that is celebrating 50 years of excellence in nursing education. Harris College was established as an academic department in 1946 through a gift from Dr. Charles Houston Harris. It has since achieved a national reputation for teaching excellence and clinical relevance in its educational program. ♦
