Campus efforts, San Antonio kickoff move campaign forward

THE KICKOFF OF the San Antonio regional campaign and continuing gains in the campus campaign have pushed The Next Frontier fund-raising effort closer to its \$100 million goal.

With more than \$88 million in gifts and pledges committed so far, those on campus get a visual reminder of the campaign effort every time they pass the emerging Dee J. Kelly Alumni and Visitors Center. Another visual reminder is coming soon: Ground will break March 29 on the F. Howard and Mary D. Walsh Center for Performing Arts at TCU.

In San Antonio, the University officially kicked off its regional fund-raising campaign with a gala and dinner Feb. 29 at the San Antonio Country Club. Some 130 alumni, parents and friends of TCU attended the event. With nearly \$800,000 already committed, San Antonio Campaign Co-Chairs Steve and Peggy Allison ('69, '69) announced a \$1 million goal for their region.

San Antonio's connection to the University is strong. More than 1,000 TCU alumni live in the area. In the fall of 1995, 132 TCU students came from the San Antonio region.

The campus community's involvement in the campaign has exceeded its original \$1.5 million goal and is edging closer to the \$2 million mark, with \$1.89 million in gifts and pledges already in hand.

"We're currently at a 47 percent participation rate with faculty and staff members and we're working hard to get that rate above 50 percent," said Campus Campaign Committee Co-Chair Sandy Ware. "Involving as many TCU community members as possible in this effort is paramount."

Crews are scheduled to begin pouring the foundation for the alumni and visitors center this week. They have worked the last two weekends to make up for time lost due to bad weather, said Will Stallworth, physical plant director.

Dr. Berliner spent nearly 40 years at TCU and was named director of the social work program in 1975. He was awarded the title of Emeritus Professor of Social Work shortly before his retirement from TCU in April 1988.

Before coming to TCU, Dr. Berliner served as a social worker at several health institutions and headed the departments of social work services for the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital and the National Institute of Mental Health's Clinical Research Center.

Form due for General Staff Award

EMPLOYEES WHO WISH TO apply for the General Staff Award for Books and Fees must mail in their Free Application for Federal Student Aid immediately. Forms are available in the financial aid office, Sadler 108. Application forms for the award are also available in the financial aid office and must be returned by May 1.

General staff members employed full time or three-quarters time may submit an application for the need-based award if they have not received it in the past 12 months. The employee must be seeking an undergraduate degree and must meet the University general guidelines for receiving financial aid. 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Saxophonist to add 'racing edge' to Jazz Festival

SAXOPHONE GREAT Tony Campise will add his driving kind of magic to TCU's 19th annual Jazz Festival March 30 in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

Campise, who's been called one of the finest reed blowers in the nation, is famous for his mastery of the saxophone and any woodwind instrument, including the tenor and alto saxophone, piccolo, flute and bass flute. He'll join the TCU Jazz Ensembles in a 7:30 p.m. performance.

Curt Wilson, director of jazz studies at TCU, calls Campise "one of the greatest living jazz saxophonists." Campise stays in the fast lane leading both his own band and a big band, while capturing rave reviews from critics.

He's no stranger to awards, either. His "Once in a Blue Moon" recording was nominated for "Best Jazz Album of the Year" and "Best Instrumental Solo" by the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences for the 1992 Grammy Awards. "Once in a Blue Moon" remained in the Top 20 of the Billboard Jazz chart for three months.

A native of Texas, Campise made his career breakthrough in the 1970s when he was invited to play lead alto in the Stan Kenton Band. Frank Sinatra, Tony Bennett, Ella Fitzgerald, Lyle Lovett and Isaac Hayes are just some of the world-class performers with whom he has worked.

Campise's famous fans also include Clint Eastwood, who became a Campise fan during the filming of "A Perfect World" in Texas.

The jazz festival also will include an area high school jazz band competition from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium. Awards will be presented at the 7:30 p.m. performance.

Both events are open to the public. The competition is free. Tickets for the 7:30 p.m. performance are \$8 for general admission and \$5 for students and senior citizens, and will be sold at the door.
