### Convocation recognizes Franzwa's contributions

HONORS STUDENTS last Thursday gave popular philosophy associate professor Gregg Franzwa the 1996 Faculty Recognition Award at the 34th annual Honors Convocation. Kerri Elyse Rieger, student honors cabinet chair, presented the award, which is given every year to a faculty member who makes "outstanding contributions to the intellectual life of the University."

Gregg came to TCU in 1976 as an assistant professor of philosophy. Since then, he has been active on the Honors Council and numerous other University committees. He has served as chair of both his department and the Faculty Senate.

"This professor has continually served both the University and the honors program, doing so quietly but effectively, without fanfare, and indeed with a self-deprecating humor that may lead the unobservant to overlook the contributions made to the life of the University and its students," Kerri said before presenting the award to Gregg.

Others recognized during Honors Week activities included 30 1996 Phi Beta Kappa Electees and 29 Departmental Senior Scholars. Other awards included presentation of the Phi Beta Kappa Award to the outstanding senior in liberal studies to P.D. Magnus, the Sigma Xi Award to the outstanding undergraduate student in science to Yuji Nishimura and the Boller Award for outstanding Senior Honors presentation to Deborah McCosh.

The Sally L. Bohon Service Award, which recognizes Sally's nearly 20 years of service to the program, is awarded annually to one of the honors program's outstanding graduating seniors. This year's winner of the Sally Bohon award, Elaine Willey, received the award at the Honors Banquet on April 11. ◆

## TCU opera production to feature comic works

TCU STUDENTS WILL PRESENT Mark Bucci's "The Dress" and Gian Carlo Menotti's "Amelia Goes to the Ball" April 18-20 in a joint TCU Opera Theatre/TCU Symphony/TCU New Music Festival production. It is the first full opera production with orchestra performed by TCU students in 15 years. The events are free and will begin at 7:30 p.m. each night in Ed Landreth Auditorium.

Menotti's and Bucci's works have been presented on Broadway and in opera houses.

"Menotti's works are quite conventional in the sense that they can appeal to a larger audience," said opera faculty member Raymond Bazemore, who will direct "Amelia." Bazemore described the work as a comical, tongue-in-cheek text of the Italian tradition. "It's romantic and the music drips with verismo, with blood, guts and love and death and passion."

"The Dress" also deals with grand passions, but on a "domestic scale," said Richard Estes, TCU's director of opera theatre, who will direct the work. "Though it was written in 1953 and premiered on Broadway in 1957, it has a very contemporaneous aspect to it," he added.

Bucci revised his opera's original scores for TCU's performance and had planned to visit campus this month to give student lectures and public seminars as a composer-in-residence. His visit was canceled because of illness.
