Harris College to celebrate 50 years

HARRIS COLLEGE OF NURSING will celebrate 50 years of baccalaureate nursing education with a gala dinner April 26 at the Grand Ballroom of The Worthington Hotel in downtown Fort Worth.

160-voice choir to honor Shirev

A SPECIAL APRIL 28 CHORAL event will honor Ronald Shirey, TCU director of choral activities, for his 20 years of service to the University.

Dr. Lara Hoggard will conduct "A German Requiem" by Johannes Brahms at the free public event, which is set for 7:30 p.m. in Ed Landreth Auditorium. It will feature 160 voices from the TCU Choral Union and the University Christian Church Chancel Choir, as well as Steve Weger, Lorin Larson and Sydney Howell from the Fort Worth Symphony and TCU music faculty. TCU faculty member Janet Pummill will be organistaccompanist.

Dr. Hoggard, an internationally recognized artist-teacher and conductor, published a complete vocal-orchestral score of "A German Requiem" and has conducted it in many places. He presented the piece with TCU and UCC choirs in 1980 before translation and editing were completed on the current edition.

Cyclopedia of Music and Musicians," "A German Requiem" is unique, "first, because it bears no slightest resemblance to any other requiem, and second, because it swiftly established the universal fame of Brahms. Its quick acceptance was due to the beauty and expressiveness of its melodic ideas and its moving communication of resignation and faith." It is believed that the piece was composed from the grief Brahms felt upon the death of his mother and/or that of his friend and fellow composer Robert Schumann.

The choral groups also will perform "Personent Hodie," which Dr. Hoggard wrote for the inauguration of Dr. Bill Tucker as TCU's chancellor in April 1980. ◆

THE SCHOOL OF EDUCATION'S Department of Curriculum and Instruction will host Dr. Nel Noddings as a visiting Green Honors Professor April 25. Dr. Noddings will present "Caring and Equity in Today's Schools" at 5 p.m. in the TCU classroom at Starpoint School.

Dr. Noddings is the Lee L. Jacks Professor of Education at Stanford University. She received a bachelor's degree in mathematics from Montclair State College, a master's degree in mathematics from Rutgers University, and a Ph.D. in educational philosophy and theory from Stanford University. Dr. Noddings has published extensively in the areas of teacher education, mathematics education and philosophy of education.

TCU Theatre to present Tandy RetroFest '96 offering

TCU THEATRE WILL SNARE three historical giants in an elaborate web in its upcoming Tandy RetroFest '96 production of "Travesties," a witty fantasy play by Tom Stoppard. Performances will be April 24-28 in the University Theatre.

In "Travesties," Stoppard weaves fiction from fact. Three revolutionaries, James Joyce, Vladimir Lenin and Dadaism founder Tristan Tzara, all lived contiguously in Zurich during World War I. There is no evidence that the men ever met, but in "Travesties" they do. "The story is told through the eyes of a minor British consulate, Henry Carr, in his senile reminiscences," explained George Brown, the play's director and a TCU theatre faculty member. "Because of his faulty memory, his importance in the events are magnified."

The play probes the relationship of political and artistic revolution, and art's purpose in society. "The heavy political discussions are laced with slapstick comedy," George said. "It ties in the tradition of the British music hall as well as burlesque and vaudeville. At times, the comedy borders on that of Monte Python."

TCU is among more than 60 area cultural and educational institutions participating in the Tandy RetroFest '96 celebration in February, March and April.

Performances of "Travesties" will be April 24-27 at 8 p.m., and April 27-28 at 2 p.m. TCU faculty, staff and students are admitted free. Call Ext. 7626 for reservations. •
