TCU piano student performs at New York's Lincoln Center

TCU MUSIC STUDENT and 1995 World Piano Competition Gold Medalist Kriszta Kovács made her New York debut April 28 in a performance at Alice Tully Hall in New York's Lincoln Center. The program featured the works of Liszt, including his legendary Dante Sonata and the Sonata in B Minor.

Before the performance, Kriszta appeared at a special TCU alumni event. On April 26, she was honored and performed at a reception given by the Hungarian Consul General in New York.

Kriszta was born in Hungary and began musical studies at the age of six. She was awarded several prizes at junior piano competitions in her native country, including the first prize of the National Piano Competition for Music High Schools. She was admitted to the Liszt Academy of Music in Budapest in 1989. In 1993, Kriszta was awarded the prestigious Liszt Scholarship established by Van Cliburn at TCU. She is currently completing the Artist Diploma at TCU under the guidance of Tamás Ungár.

Kriszta has been the recipient of more than 12 awards and distinctions in national and international competitions and has performed at prestigious halls in the United States, Europe and Canada. In 1993, she also received the coveted Yamaha Prize for her achievements in music in her native country.

She recently recorded an all-Liszt program on her debut CD sponsored by Yamaha Piano. ♦

The Excellence in Education Award, which was presented at a recognition and awards reception in the Student Center ballroom, honors an outstanding classroom teacher, counselor, librarian, administrator, school board member or education advocate.

Past honorees were the late M.J. Neeley, who founded TCU's Starpoint School, and former Sen. Bill Haley '63, who fought for educational reform in the Texas Legislature.

Nursing honoree Dr. Hudak, a 1970 graduate of TCU, currently serves as the chief of nursing education and staff development at the Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, D.C. She also is an adjunct professor at The American University's department of health and fitness.

She was given an "A" proficiency designation from the U.S. Army Surgeon General in 1992 for "continuous exceptional professional ability in the field of medical-surgical nursing." ♦

Frogs prepare to battle Longhorns

DON'T MISS ONE of the final meetings between TCU and longtime rival Texas as the Frogs take on the Longhorns Saturday at The Ballpark in Arlington. The doubleheader gets underway at 1 p.m. and Committee of 100 Chairman Roger Williams says he wants to see a record crowd.

Last year's game between the Frogs and the Texas A&M Aggies attracted more than 7,000 fans to The Ballpark. The attendance record for a regular season collegiate game stands at 14,991, set in 1989 for a game between Florida and Mississippi State. Advance ticket sales for the TCU game have surpassed the 13,000 mark.

Season passes are not valid for this game but employees can purchase tickets for half price. For more information, call the ticket office at Ext. 7967. ♦

TCU to co-sponsor Mayfest Parade

TCU WILL BE one of the sponsors of the 24th annual Mayfest Parade to be held at 7 p.m. May 3. The parade route will begin at Farrington Field, continue through Trinity Park, and circle back north on University Drive to Farrington Field. This year's theme will be "Frogs" and the parade will contain more than 30 entries.

TCU's entry will be the Frog Horn, transported by Kenny Vaughn of the physical plant. Showgirl volunteers will pass out 1,000 "frog" clickers and candy along the parade route while they walk beside the truck. KVIL radio will broadcast live and will announce the parade participants. ♦
