Burlington Northern CEO to address Class of '96

ROBERT KREBS, president and chief executive officer of the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Corporation, will address more than 900 graduates of TCU's Class of 1996 during commencement ceremonies at 3:30 p.m. May 11 in Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

The Chancellor's Reception, a time for graduates, their families and the faculty and staff of the University to mingle, will be from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. on the lawn east of Sadler Hall. In case of rain, the reception will be moved to the Student Center ballroom.

Krebs began his career in the railroad industry when he joined The Southern Pacific in 1966. He held a number of positions in the operating departments of railroads, including vice president of operations for the Southern Pacific Transportation Company; director of Southern Pacific Transportation; president of Southern Pacific Transportation; president of Southern Pacific Transportation Company and St. Louis Southwestern Railway Company; and chairman, president, chief operating officer and chief executive officer of The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway Company.

Krebs is a member of the board of the Association of American Railroads. He earned a bachelor's degree at Stanford University and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He earned an M.B.A. at the Harvard School of Business in 1966. ◆

Summer construction may close Faculty Center

IMPROVEMENTS to Reed Hall are tentatively scheduled to close the Faculty Center beginning May 13.

Will Stallworth, director of the physical plant, said that's the proposed date for beginning construction. The work is scheduled to be completed by Aug. 23.

The biggest change to Reed Hall will be an elevator to be placed on the south side of the building, to the left of the present entrance. The elevator will go from the basement of the building to the top floor. Some office and storage areas will be reconfigured to accommodate the elevator, Will said.

After a final budget is developed, all the restrooms in Reed Hall as well as the Faculty Center may be made wheelchair-accessible. The Faculty Center "balcony"

could also be altered to allow wheelchair accessibility, and the carpet will be replaced. The Mills glass collection now located in the Faculty Center will be placed in storage during any construction.

Daniel-Meyer, Alumni Center projects 'hit the roof'

TWO HIGHLY VISIBLE campus construction projects — The Dee J. Kelly Alumni and Visitors Center and Daniel-Meyer Coliseum — are getting a roof over their heads.

Crews began placing a new roof on Daniel-Meyer April 1 and should have the project completed by the end of June. Roofing on the alumni center is scheduled to begin this week and should be completed by early June.

Brick work on the alumni center began in late April and should be finished by the end of May, said Will Stallworth, physical plant director.

Interior framing on the project is slated to begin this week.

In Daniel-Meyer, many interior public areas have already received a fresh coat of paint, including restrooms, lower hallways and the concourse around the arena. Painting crews will take a break during early summer, but will resume their project in August. By mid-August, most public areas, including the arena, will have been painted.

The Daniel-Meyer and Reed Hall improvements (see related story) are among more than \$4 million in capital projects for the coming year approved by the Board of Trustees at their March 29 meeting.

Hall to exhibit works of New Zealand painter

THE MOUDY EXHIBITION HALL will exhibit 33 new paintings and silk-screen prints by New Zealand artist/educator Greg Whitecliffe May 13-31.

Whitecliffe is an artist born to two cultures - Maori and European. The paintings are "an astonishing blend of major modern European art movements with specific historic New Zealand imagery," said Ron Watson, chair of TCU's art and art history department. In this midcareer exhibition, the artist, who also uses his Maori name, Kerehi Tikihana Pararaki Wikiriwhi, looks back to his roots and his Maori ancestors.

Whitecliffe has pursued a career that has varied from professional development in higher education at Harvard University to stone lithographic workshops in Switzerland. He is the president and founding family member of the Whitecliffe College of Art & Design in Auckland, New Zealand, an accredited degree-granting private college. His works have appeared in more than 100 exhibitions.

The artist will be on campus May 13 and 14. The exhibition will be open from 5 to 7 p.m. on May 13. Gallery hours for the
