Institute offers new Amateurs Weekend

FOR THE FIRST TIME, serious amateur pianists can receive encouragement and guidance from the TCU/Cliburn Piano Institute's distinguished faculty as part of a unique new Amateurs Weekend June 14-16. This year's institute runs June 10-29 on the TCU campus.

About one dozen non-professional pianists will benefit from private lessons, group sessions and discussions with internationally acclaimed pianists. "The Amateurs Weekend has never been done before in the United States," said institute executive director and founder Tamás Ungár. "It's a brand new idea involving non-professional pianists who love music. We're aiming at the people who play music well, but who are playing in a vacuum. We'll be gentle and encouraging because we want them to continue playing and enjoying music."

Since 1981, the TCU/Cliburn Institute has offered a concentrated series of piano studies for participants from around the world. The institute offers aspiring pianists three weeks of intense on-campus study in piano performance, technique and repertoire.

Concerts and recitals scheduled

Concerts on June 18 and June 27 will feature selected institute students playing concertos with the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra — a distinctive feature of the institute. Guest conductors for those respective concerts will be George Del Gobbo, music director/conductor of the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, and Keri-Lynn Wilson, associate conductor of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra.

An impressive array of faculty recitalists will perform at TCU as part of the institute. This year's recitalists include Hungarian György Sebök, who will perform June 13; artist/educator John Perry, who will play June 16; Mozart specialist Paul Badura-Skoda, who will perform the Rildia Bee O'Bryan Cliburn Concert on June 23; and leading Beethoven interpreter John Lill, who will play June 25.

In addition to the recitalists, three TCU piano faculty members will serve as faculty for the institute: Ungár, 1975 Casadesus competition gold medalist John Owings and 1985 Cliburn competition gold medalist and TCU artist-in-residence José Feghali.

All institute concerts and recitals begin at 8 p.m. in Ed Landreth Hall. Tickets can be purchased individually or in a series package and are available through Central Ticket Agency at 335-9000. Information on the Teachers and Amateurs weekends is available at Ext. 7456. ◆

Parking changes under way

DID YOUR PARKING LOT PICK UP and move recently? Don't worry— no spaces have been lost in the move.

Faculty, staff and student parking lots have been shuffled to improve traffic flow around the front of the Student Center.

Faculty members will now park south of Frog Fountain, where 30-minute permit parking once was. Thirty-minute permit parking has been moved to the north side of the fountain, and eight faculty spaces have been added to the quad parking lot to compensate for places lost in the change.

Faculty, staff and off-campus students also will benefit this fall from 200 additional parking spaces that are being built on the east side of campus, said Don Mills, vice chancellor for student affairs.

TCU Campus Police Chief Steve McGee said there will be no increases in the cost of parking permits next year. Steve said new permits will be available at the campus police office beginning Aug. 5. Permits also can be paid for and picked up from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Aug. 7-9 next to the registrar's office in Sadler Hall. ◆

Technical support expert for Olympics to speak

LUIS ESTRADA, IBM PROJECT MANAGER and technical support advisor for the Olympic Games in Atlanta, will speak at the Executive Breakfast Forum sponsored by the Charles Tandy American Enterprise Center in the M. J. Neeley School of Business. The executive forum will be held on June 7 at 7:30 a.m. in the Student Center ballroom and is by invitation only.

More than 10,000 athletes representing nearly 200 nations will take part in the Olympic Games. About 5,000 coaches and team officials and nearly 40,000 volunteers will staff the '96 Games with approximately 2 million visitors expected to attend.

With this mass of people, cultures and events, the disbursement of correct and timely information is essential. Estrada is responsible for making sure all the computer networks and monitoring systems at the Atlanta Olympic Games run smoothly. He will explain how months of systems analysis and programming will add up to a well-timed and well-orchestrated Olympic event.

Estrada has worked for IBM since 1979. A native of San Salvador, El Salvador, he has held various positions in systems engineering and customer support and coordinated his first Olympics in Barcelona in 1992. He has since worked as a member of the results team for Lillehammer '94 and various other sports competitions.
