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Bujones named Choreographer-in-Residence

INTERNATIONAL BALLET SENSATION Fernando Bujones was recently named TCU's first Choreographer-in-Residence, a position created specifically for him. Known as the "greatest American male dancer of his generation," Fernando will share his talents with TCU dance students. He will be on campus for several weeks during the fall and spring semesters, teaching master classes and choreographing pieces for upcoming TCU productions. During his tenure, he plans to restage classical works, choreograph new works and consult with faculty about the dance program.

The artistic alliance between Fernando and TCU will begin this fall with a restaging of "Kingdom of the Shades," the second act of the classical Russian piece "La Bayadère," for the Fall Dance Concert.

Fernando will promote TCU in his national and international travels. He also will choreograph a new dance piece for TCU dancers to perform at the American College Dance Festival Association's south-central region meeting at TCU in March of 1997. About 25 universities will participate in this event.

Fernando has visited the campus on many occasions. He was the Green Honors Professor in February of 1995 and taught master classes that were open to TCU and area dancers. He joined the department again in the fall of 1995 to choreograph pieces for TCU's Diamond Gala Evening, which benefited students from TCU's College of Fine Arts and Communication.

A dance legend

Fernando is the artistic director/choreographer for the Ballet of Monterrey in Mexico and directs The Florida Classical Ballet in Miami. He serves as guest choreographer at many universities and companies around the world.

On June 2, 1995, Fernando danced his farewell performance with the American Ballet Theatre at the Met and received a congratulatory letter from President Bill Clinton noting his lifetime of artistic excellence.

He served as artistic director of a number of his own companies and was a driving force in building the American Ballet Theatre to its current status.

Fernando's repertoire as an international ballet star ranges from classical pieces to contemporary favorites by Jerome Robbins, Twyla Tharp and Maurice Bejart.

He has been teamed with acclaimed ballerinas like Carla Fracci and Cynthia Gregory and has danced and choreographed for such prestigious companies as the Royal Ballet, the American Ballet Theatre and the Boston Ballet. In 1986, the award-winning artist was asked to perform for President George Bush at the White House. ♦

International students study dance at TCU workshop

STUDENTS FROM GERMANY and Mexico are learning about life as dancers and life in Texas at TCU's Annual Summer Dance Workshop, which runs through July 19 on campus. Their participation is part of an ongoing exchange between TCU's dance program and those in other countries, but is the first time international students have attended the popular workshop as part of a formal campus-to-campus exchange, said Ellen Garrison, chair of the Department of Ballet and Modern Dance.

"With the University's growing support of global initiatives, it was a perfect and natural step to incorporate international students into a summer workshop," Ellen said. "The workshop gives these students the same opportunities that TCU students get when they travel overseas and interact with dancers from another country."

TCU's workshop, now in its 31st year, gives dancers ages 13 and up an opportunity to live on campus while learning dance techniques from TCU faculty members and guest teachers. Classes and seminars are offered on subjects ranging from dance injury prevention to eating disorders and relaxation techniques.

This year, more than 80 students enrolled in the workshop, including six students from Trier, Germany, and three from the Universidad de Las Américas — Puebla (UDLA), in Puebla, Mexico.

The students from UDLA who are attending the TCU summer workshop were selected by the head of their dance program. These college-level participants are in the top of the dance department at UDLA and are 18 and older.

The Trier students, ages 15 to 17, will be presented to the Fort Worth City

In March 1995, TCU opened the door for exchange with Trier by sending 20 TCU students and three TCU faculty there to perform, study and make international contacts. In April 1996, 18 TCU students, two faculty members and one technical person traveled to Mexico as part of a similar exchange program. Ellen said such exchanges give dance students valuable job contacts and additional training, as well as a chance to develop friendships and learn about other cultures. ♦

AP summer institute is largest in nation

THIS YEAR'S THIRD ANNUAL TCU Advanced Placement Summer Institute, sponsored by the Office of Extended Education last week, was the largest A.P. institute in the nation. More than 700 high school A.P. teachers were on campus learning teaching methods in more than 30 topics ranging from U.S. history to math and the sciences. A.P. classes are designed to offer students more advanced instruction than they would normally receive. Students then have the option of "testing out" of related college courses.

"The institute gives these teachers a chance to sharpen their methods of challenging students," he said. "It's a great way for them to continue improving the quality of education."
