### UDLA president to address fall convocation

FALL CONVOCATION IS SET for 11 a.m. Sept. 10 in Ed Landreth Auditorium. The event, which marks the official opening of the University's 124th year, will begin with the traditional academic procession.

The guest speaker will be Enrique Cardenas, president of the Universidad de las Americas-Puebla (UDLA) in Puebla, Mexico. TCU has enjoyed an institutional collaboration with UDLA since the 1970s. The two universities have been co-participants in student and faculty exchanges, research and professional projects, resource sharing and academic courses and programs.

In March, Cardenas was appointed president of the Federation of Mexican Private Institutions of Higher Education and has been rector of UDLA since 1985.

Highlighting the ceremony will be the presentation of the Chancellor's Award For Distinguished Teaching.

Music for convocation will be provided by the TCU Concert Chorale, under the direction of Ronald Shirey. Janet Pummill will accompany on the piano. ♦

### Campus construction projects on schedule

YOU MAY BE WONDERING about the status of some of the major construction projects underway around campus. By the end of the semester there will be some notable changes.

The Dee J. Kelly Alumni and Visitor's Center is right on schedule. Completion of the Kelly Center is set for the end of September. Roby Key, assistant vice chancellor for university advancement, says he is hoping to see staff relocate to the Center at the end of September or the beginning of October. This is a critical time since the center's dedication is planned for Oct. 26, Homecoming weekend.

Construction on The F. Howard and Mary D. Walsh Center for Performing Arts is set to begin soon since crews have already done preliminary work on the site. Construction should begin after Labor Day with an estimated completion date sometime in October or November 1997. An opening gala and formal dedication is tentatively planned for early spring 1998.

Reed Hall renovations should be wrapping up soon. Over the summer, crews were hard at work bringing Reed Hall, the oldest academic building on campus, in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. Installation of a new elevator should be completed by early September.

A date for reopening the Faculty Center should also be known shortly after Labor Day. Faculty Center renovations include lowering the ceiling, reconstructing restroom facilities, installing a ramp to make the center more accessible and installing new carpet.

Construction is also scheduled to begin today on three new parking lots on the east side of campus. The first lot will be built across from Dan Rogers Hall. Then, landscaping and construction will begin on a lot at Bowie and Green streets. After these lots have been completed, construction and landscaping will begin on a new lot behind the Moudy building. Will Stallworth, director of the physical plant, estimates that all three lots will be completed by early December. ♦

NANCY LIEBERMAN-CLINE, one of seven females to be inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, will speak about her life in basketball and the importance of community involvement Aug. 28 at 8 p.m. in the Brown-Lupton Student Center Ballroom. The free event is open to the public and a reception will follow.

Lieberman-Cline became the youngest basketball player in Olympic history to win a medal as part of the 1976 Silver Medal-winning U.S. team. She was also a member

of the 1980 Olympic team that boycotted the Moscow games.

Lieberman-Cline began her professional basketball career in 1980 as a member of the Women's Basketball League. There she was the number one draft choice of the Dallas Diamonds, and became known for her scoring ability and style of play. In 1986, she became the first woman to play in a men's professional league as a member of the U.S. Basketball League's Springfield Fame.

Lieberman-Cline has also served as a conditioning coach for the likes of Martina Navratilova and has helped revolutionize the way women train. She was also the first female named to President Reagan's "Sports Drug Awareness Program."

Lieberman-Cline has served as a broadcaster for NBC, ABC and ESPN and has been a keynote speaker to many companies including IBM and UPS. She participates in a variety of charitable organizations and serves as a trustee of the Women's Sports Foundation. She also contributes time to the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation and the Special Olympics. ♦
