New visibility for TCU athletics

YOU MAY HAVE SEEN a big Horned Frog looming over the major freeways around town lately. The donated billboards are part of the Committee of 100's efforts to make TCU everyone's "home team."

Three full-size billboards can be seen from the I-20 & I-35 "mixmaster," along eastbound I-30 near Loop 820 and along eastbound I-30 near Cherry Lane. The outdoor advertisements promoting football and basketball will be in place for 90 days.

"This type of athletics visibility is exciting for TCU," said Larry Lauer (communications and public affairs). "We're pleased that Committee of 100 chairman Roger Williams helped secure the billboards."

New library exhibit features books that shaped America

THE HISTORY OF AMERICA has been molded and mirrored by the printed word. From the revolution-inspiring 18th-century pamphleteering of men like Thomas Paine and Thomas Jefferson to such classics of 20th-century investigative journalism as "Unsafe at Any Speed" and "Silent Spring," American writers have had such an impact on historic events that when President Lincoln met Harriet Beecher Stowe, he reportedly said: "So you're the little woman who wrote the book that made this great war."

Now, in an exhibit celebrating the "Books That Shaped America," these and other American literary milestones have been given a history of their own. The exhibit features reproductions of historic photographs, drawings, manuscripts and other items from the Library of Congress. The exhibit is on display at Mary Couts Burnett Library lobby through Jan. 10. ◆
