Committee of 100 discusses latest marketing efforts

COMMITTEE OF 100 CHAIRMAN Roger Williams reported the progress of the committee's latest athletics marketing efforts and offered a preview of initiatives to come. Among the many items Roger covered, he said that sales of Amon Carter Stadium billboards to sponsoring companies have been brisk this year, and there is already a waiting list of sponsors for next football season. Sponsorship billboards have also been sold for Daniel-Meyer Coliseum.

It's official! Roger said sales of Frog Chill, the new flavor of frozen confection made by Lemon Chill and Moore, have matched sales of the company's staple product, the Lemon Chill, in Amon Carter Stadium this season.

Roger also said the Committee has installed purple banners in the Rickel Building to decorate the home court of the VolleyFrogs, TCU's women's volleyball team.

The TCU Frog Club, assisted by the Committee of 100, is now raising money to offset the cost of reconditioning the Daniel-Meyer Coliseum seating in purple next summer. In return for each \$100 gift, a donor may have a name and class year engraved on a brass recognition plaque and attached to a seat in DMC.

This basketball season will usher in two major promotions. The first is the Dodge Shootout, sponsored by Roger Williams Chrysler-Plymouth-Dodge, West Loop Dodge and Longhorn Dodge. The second is the \$25,000 Shootout, sponsored by Overton Bank and Trust. Fans who make it to the final round of the shootouts could win a 1997 Dodge pickup or \$25,000 in cash. ♦
